CANCELLATION OF NYA PROGRAM FOR NISEIS EXPLAINED

WASHINGTON, D.C., June 15—War Relocation Authority announced today that, following the recent unfounded allegations made by an investigator of a Congressional committee, it has been notified by the Administrator of the National Youth Administration of the cancellation of arrangements made early in April for the training of American evacuees of Japanese ancestry in resident training centers of the NYA.

Within recent weeks a total of 275 young men and women in relocation centers, all of them American whose records and reliability have been carefully checked, have enrolled in vocational training courses conducted by NYA with the objective of preparing themselves for war work.

Approximately 215 of them had moved to NYA centers at once.

Arrangements are being made to re-locate the displaced trainees outside the relocation centers in jobs or in training courses under other auspices than NYA. War Relocation Authority officials feel that it is not in the public interest for these young people to return to the relocation centers.

Grant Assistance

One hundred nine individuals left this center with grant assistance during May, while fifty-seven left unaided by government loans. Senior Escort Ruth Cushion disclosed this week.

In issuing this statement, Mrs. Cushion revealed that the total amount paid out for these grants was \$8473.52 while money to be paid later to dependents of the resettled wage earners will amount to \$1026.48. She also declared that eighty-three grants were approved while no application was rejected.

MAY PAY CHECKS ARRIVE FRIDAY

Approximately \$19,338.79 were distributed among fifty-three departments Friday as the first batch of May pay checks arrived. Budget and Finance Head R. C. Bozkiewicz announced this week.

Departments paid were Motor Operation Mechanics, General Warehouse and Property Control, Finance Section, Lodging Crew, Evacuee Property, Public Works, Block Managers Assembly, Community Alteration, Gardeners, Linoleum Layers, Oil Crew, Painters, Maintenance, Bean Sprouts Factory, Machinists, Shop, Mattress Crew, Back Checkers, Peace Committee, Cabinet Makers, Lumber Graders, Boiler Crew, Survey Crew, Motor Pool, Fire Department, Industrial Office, Woodcraft, Lumber, Stove Maintenance, Machine Maintenance, Office Administration, Office, Housing, Ceramics, Typewriter Repair, Relocation Office, Police Department, Garment Factory, Mail Delivery, Electricians, Sign Shop, Apiary, Procurement, Refrigeration, Property Control, Employment, Legal Aid, Garbage Disposal, Mails and Files, Maint. Water System, Carpenters, Landscapers, Statistics and Records Department.

TIME-PIECE FOR WORKERS ERECTED

Serving as a combination fire alarm and workers' "Five o'clock whistle," the duo-purpose whistle recently erected at the main entrance of the administration building will sound workers on and off their respective jobs in the future.

The previous method of each department releasing its employee according to its own time piece brought about irregularity due to the different times recorded on each clock. The whistle will be recognized as the official Manzanar time piece with whistles scheduled to blow promptly during week-days at 8 a.m., 12 noon and 5 p.m.

PACKAGES UNDER ARMY INSPECTION

"All parcel post and general delivery packages are being subjected to army inspection in the presence of its claimant," stated M. S. Deputy, supervisor of the Manzanar Post Office.

All parcel posts are to be claimed at 1-15-2 but C.O.D. articles are being handled as usual in the post office.

Nisei-Owned Hostel Opens In Chicago

A hostel, organized and financed by a group of old time Chicago residents of Japanese ancestry and approved by the Relocation officer Elmer L. Shirrell, announced its opening last week.

Known as the Mutual Service Center and located at 537 North Wells Street, it will be directed by Shoji Osata. The office is now ready to receive requests for invitations. The building will house about fifty persons at one time, it was reported.

Rise in Patients Reported By Clinic

There has been a gradual decrease in the number of outpatients cared for at the hospital, the monthly reports revealed. However, the number of dental patients has almost doubled.

With an addition of two physicians on the staff, the care of outpatients has become much simpler. The dentists are having difficulty for they have lost two of the six members of that department almost doubling the work.

It was reported from the hospital that there are two contagious disease wards filled with chicken pox cases last month. There were only two deaths recorded last month and the number of births have somewhat decreased.

Dr. Alvia Brockway, orthopedic specialist, cared for five surgical cases. Another outstanding innovation is the special school for the hospitalized children under the sponsorship of the Education Department.

Teletype Machine Now In Operation

Although it has been in operation for only a few days, the center's newly-installed teletype machine is rapidly proving a vital cog in speeding the present WRA relocation program. This intricate machine is temporarily being operated by Mrs. Rosemary Thuesen, under the supervision of Edwin H. Hooper in the Administration Building.

"It will be possible in the future to receive and send out telegrams directly to Washington as well as to the nine other Relocation Centers. The usual long waiting involved in securing relocation permits will be reduced to a minimum with the purchase of this machine, it was reported.

Labor Needed In Self Sustaining Farm Program, Says McConnell

Asked by the Manzanar Free Press to comment on a statement at the project directors' meeting in Washington last week that WRA probably would be unable to maintain present dietary standards for relocation center residents unless the agricultural program is pushed through, Mr. McConnell, agricultural department head, agreed in substance.

He declared, "I do not think there is any question but that evacuees will really have to get out in the fields and work if mess hall meals are to be kept up to their present levels. Pitches to meet year-round food needs, the 1943 agricultural program should provide most of the vegetables, and a large share of the meat and eggs needed on the mess hall tables. We have the land, seed, stock and equipment to produce most of these foods as the ordinary civilian expects to get this year. The only unknown factor is labor."

SELF SUSTAINING PROGRAM

Present estimates contemplate that on the average center production will provide every evacuee with 638 pounds of vegetables. Some centers will produce two-thirds or more of the meat and eggs needed, while others which got started late will not produce so much. Since some centers are in a better position to produce certain types of food than others, not all this produce will be raised at Manzanar but will be shipped in from other projects.

WARREN APPROVES FISHING BILL

An anti-Japanese Fishing bill which prohibits the issuance of commercial fishing licenses to alien Japanese or to any corporation whose officers or directors are alien Japanese and which have the majority of Alien Japanese as stockholders, was signed Wednesday by California Governor Earl Warren.

This bill was introduced after reports circulated that Japanese espionage agents operated off the California shore in guise of fisherman and frequently observed fleet movements and maneuvers and engaged in taking soundings and drawing maps.

ONLY 160 DAYS UNTIL CHRISTMAS

Christmas holiday, lads and lassies, is 160 working days from today. Between now and Noel comes the fourth of July, Thanksgiving Day and so on; only we're not having holidays for those occasions unless they come on Sundays. But rest assured, we will have a Christmas holiday, 160 days from now.

An administrative notice to the project from WRA's headquarters yesterday said "It is the policy of the Administration not to observe holidays during war emergency."

But be of good cheer good people; we will have a holiday on Christmas Day—160 days and nights from today.

HOSPITAL STAFF TO BE HONORED

Under the sponsorship of the Block Leaders' organization, an "Appreciation Nite" will be held tomorrow in honor of the center hospital employees at Messhall 34, commencing at 7:30 p.m.

Hayato Aramaki will serve as toastmaster for the evening. Kiyoatsu Anzai, Town Hall chairman will give an appreciation address to the hospital employees. Project Director Ralph P. Merritt is also scheduled to speak. Dr. Noriyasu Kikuchi and Dr. Morse Little will be called upon to respond for the hospital personnel.

Two More Added On List Of Group Bound For Shelby

Two more names were added to the list of the second contingent of army volunteers who left last week for induction at Fort Douglas, Utah, according to Leave Officer Bertis B. Chamberlain. Burns Teruo Arikawa left directly from this center while the second member, Harlan Hatsu Fijikawa, now at Denver because of the recent death of his son, is scheduled to meet the group at Salt Lake City.

Seven other members of this contingent included William Jun Yamamoto, Arthur Monroe Fukukoka, Susumu Ohashi, Yoshio Takahashi, Joe Hisho Tamaki, Henry Tsuchiya and George Kazuo Ichiru.

Order To Eliminate Race Discrimination Signed By President

WASHINGTON, June 16—Reaffirming the federal government's official "no racial discrimination" policy, President Roosevelt on May 28 signed Executive Order No. 9846. This Order takes the Fair Employment Practice Committee out from under the War Manpower Commission and reconstitutes it as an independent federal agency. Msgr. Francis J. Haas, dean of the school of social sciences of Catholic University, will serve as chairman of the new committee.

The new Executive Order strengthens and implements the government's efforts to eliminate racial discrimination by declaring it "the duty" of all employers and labor organizations "to eliminate discrimination in regard to hire, tenure, terms or conditions of employment or union membership because of race, creed, color, or national origin." The Order also provides that all government contracts with war industries incorporate provisions "obligating the contractor not to discriminate" and orders all federal departments and agencies engaged in training programs for war production to take all appropriate measures to prevent discrimination.

Reporters at Msgr. Haas' first press conference quoted him as being determined to clear up "this filthy situation" of discrimination.

Sweater Day Rally Held By Senior

Featuring a "special guest star" whose identity is a secret, the Senior Ayes of Manzanar High School held a sweaterless Sweater Day Assembly last Friday morning on the school grounds.

The sweaters, which were to be worn by the Senior Ayes, did not arrive on time for the event. The assembly, which was the first since the recent elections, was opened by the President of the Student Body, Tommy Ajisaka. Talents consisted of group singing, vocalists, wind instrument solos, and a hilarious can-can dance by the Junior class. Master of Ceremonies for the show was George Ban.

Uncle Sam Claims Charles Ferguson

IT CAN BE MEANT FOR NONE OTHER

Neither imagination nor knowledge of semantics is needed to discern that the resolution passed by the Twin Falls Kiwanis Club condemning the public usage of enemy alien languages is leveled directly at the Minidoka center residents, at their promiscuous and volatile use of the Japanese language on the streets and in the stores of Twin Falls.

Needless to mention, the sensibilities of the townspeople must have been roused considerably that they should have found their way to expression in such a resolution.—Minidoka Irrigator.

FAIR PRACTICE IN LABOR

Discriminatory practices indulged in by certain establishments making war products for the government, in the face of increasingly insistent cries of manpower shortage, is an incongruous situation, long recognized by the federal authorities. It is felt certain that the establishment of the new Committee on Fair Employment Practice by an executive order from the White House shows the good faith of the administration in seeking to eliminate racial discrimination from war plants.

Actually, this executive order issued by President Roosevelt amends his previous executive order which had established the original CFEF. Its ineffectiveness in correcting this form of labor abuse, observers believe, lay in the fact that it was a part of the War Manpower Commission. The work of the original committee was on a voluntary basis. The new order provides for a full-time paid chairman and compensation for other committee members. The old commission, for instance, sometimes could not hold public hearings in several important and controversial cases involving racial discrimination. The new order specifically provides that it may conduct hearings. Furthermore, the new order states that any other pertinent Executive Order inconsistent with this order are superseded.

FAR REACHING EFFECT

We expect that WRA's relocation headquarters, will contact more and more defense plant jobs for resettlers. The President's new order is especially significant to the relocating evacuees in this respect. The way out to these jobs possibly will not come for us with a sudden rush just because of this directive from the President, who signed the order as President and as commander-in-chief of the army and navy. Possibly not. But the far-reaching effect of this well-implemented instruction cannot but help materially to further expedite our resettlement and return to the normal life of full usefulness.

Iowa Relocates NYA Pupils

DES MOINES, Ia., June 9—(The Des Moines Register)—Under the direction of the newly-opened Des Moines War Relocation office a group of seven nisei youths arrived here over the weekend from the N.Y.A. training center in Milford, Iowa. The first arrivals, hailing from the Manzanar Relocation Center, had previously gone to Milford, but due to the sudden cancellation of the N.Y.A. plan, the youths were sent to Des Moines.

"Our trip from Milford was very pleasant," said Henry M. Sato, Los Angeles, a member of the group. "Everybody was very pleasant to us."

Vernon Kennedy, regional war relocation authority supervisor, said the newly-established WRA office will serve the same purpose as the one set up recently at Omaha, Neb. All those employers wishing to hire any of these niseis may do so by calling the office. Workers from both rural and urban communities in California are expected to follow.

INQUIRIES RECEIVED

A large number of inquiries about hiring Japanese-Americans already has been received, Kennedy added.

All of the first contingent are natives of California, except one, whose home is in Honolulu, Hawaii. The lone outsider is Kaz Arai, 21, a youth who attended U.C.L.A. prior to evacuation. Arai, like all the others in the first group hails from Manzanar.

Arai expects to complete schooling at Drake University next fall. He is looking for any kind of a job. He has volunteered for military service but was classified 4-F because of high blood pressure. However, he is expected to have another examination soon.

THREE ARMY VOLUNTEERS

Another youth who volunteered for selective service is Michael Yamane, 24. Although classified 1-B due to bad eyes, he may be called later for limited service. Yamane expects to attend the war industries training school at West High school.

A third youth who has volunteered for military service but was refused because he was too young is Bobby Izumi, 17. He wants to learn a trade at West High school. Bobby has a brother in the group, Roy Izumi, 19, who is seeking part-time job while attending this trade school.

Sato has just finished high school before evacuation and hopes to learn welding at West High school and will look for a part-time job.

ONE MARRIED MAN

Looking for a job as a garage mechanic is Tommy Zoriki, 22. He has had previous experience in the body and fender division. Claiming the distinction of being the only married man in the group is Tom Komatsu, 24. He works a job as a machinist or welder and hopes to start in some shop as an apprentice rather than

A small funeral, attended by the immediate family members, was held Friday, at the Japanese Methodist Church in Denver.

New Addresses of Resettlers Cover Wide and Far Areas

On May 15 those evacuees out on indefinite leave, as reported by the projects to the WRA headquarters, numbered 5494; on short term leave, 653; and on seasonal leave, 4879, making a total of 11,026, it was disclosed yesterday in the relocation office.

Evacuees returning address cards give some indication of the distribution by the areas served by the relocation offices. As of May 15 a total of 4912 had reported—1312 in the Salt Lake City district, 1264 in the Denver, 339 in the Kansas City, 1374 in the Chicago, 366 in the Cleveland, 122 in the Little Rock, and 135 in the New York. The large increase during the past two weeks have been 442 in the Salt Lake district and 386 in Denver.

Project populations as of May 14 are: Central Utah, 7647; Colorado River, 16,393; Gila River, 12,860; Granada, 6586; Heart Mountain, 10,033; Jerome, 8121; Manzanar, 8907; Minidoka, 8150; Rohwer, 7984; Tule Lake, 13,942; and Leupp, 54. The total number of evacuees in centers is now 100,503.
