"The resolution declared that when military authorities decide it is no longer necessary for Japanese-Americans to be excluded from the state, the California State Board of Agriculture in the light of that decision will use its influence to assure that race prejudice shall not geopardize the lawful praticipation of this or any other group in the agricultural life and industry of the state," the Examiner stated.

The adoption of the resolution brought many protests. One of them, Assemblyman Chester Gannon of Sacramento, chair-man of the Assembly interim committee on Japanese prob-lems declared: "I am quite surprised and quite

# To Enforse Inyo County Ordinance On Gambling

Stating that gambling at Manzanar "has increased and spread to undue proportions so as to endanger the peace and good order of this center," Project Director Ralph P. Merritt explained to a special meeting of the block managers last Wednesday that Chief of Internal Security John W. Gilkey has been instructed to take steps to curb the situation.

Chief Gilkey has been authorized to form a special squad of Causasian investigators whose "purpose and function it shall

Causasian investigators whose "purpose and function it shall be to carry out fully the mandates of Ordinance No. 134 of the County of Inyo."

The special squad has been vested with general powers of search and seizure of any premise within the center if there is a suspicion that gambling is being conducted there.

#### ORDINANCE NO. 134

Ordinance No. 134 was adopted in 1911, but Mr. Merritt ex-plained that it has been in full effect in this county since and its effectiveness has been tested

its effectiveness has been tested successfully. The ordinance provides that it shall be unlawful for any person to perfect the sound to perfect the shall be unlawful. The project director warned that this means money need not be found on the premises to make the act unlawful.

Any occupant of an apartment or room in which gambling is taking place and the resident of that apartment or room is also

that apartment or room is also liable to arrest under the ordi-

nance:
Section 5½ of the ordinance Section 5½ of the ordinance allowing for social games states, "The provisions of this ordinance do not prohibit a social game of cards for drinks or cigars at a public place or at one's home." Mr. Merritt stated that this clause would allow for friendly games, but that he would penalize severely participants of a game in which profit is the motive.

Army; hundreds serve in Military Intelligence in the South Pacific and 20,000 cleared by FBI, now live in the midwestern and eastern states. But hate-mongers were not troubled by such facts."





Sometimes we must have to make a line at the latrine too; but this rank is not very familiar to us. We can't wait so long and we have not the time to go to another block's latrine. Inside the latrine they never think of others who are waiting so eagerly. They are talking about the ball game and situation and smoking leisurely as if they are in a social club. Of all the miserable line-up.

These parades are so unlawful and virtueless. For instance, at the canteen or the post office, we see a lady or a gentleman going right over to their friend who is standing in front part of the long line and handing his money and asking to do his part. So the rear ones must have more embarrassments. Not only that, sometimes, they run out of stock and clesing hour.

As for mess hall rank, nobody can ask anybody to eat his share so they use their brain hard. One who wants to go to front, looks around front part of line to see if her friend is standing in front. If she finds her friend she goes right over to her and talks as if she met her after a long silence. In the mean time she uses her favorite techniques and gets into the line without anybody noticing her.

In fact, I learned many things in Manzanar.

Any parade from ancient times has been deemed as gorgeous, but not very gorgeous that of Manzanar, especially on the days of wind and rain. However, someday we think of this peculiar parade and talk with friends as if our eld day's memories. Let's line-up and have a fun.
