Former Bishop Of Tokyo Will Aid Relocation

Opportunities for family resettlement loomed high today, following an announcement by Walter A. Heath, assistant relocation program officer that Bishop C. F. Reifsnider, formerly Bishop of Tokyo and at present acting as representative of the Federal Council of Churches will arrive tomorrow at Manzanar to aid in the settlement of interested families.

Working in cooperation with the WRA relocation program and the Protestant Episcopal Church, Bishop Reifsnider will offer assistance in employment, housing, and community selection. Security is offered families confronted by unexpected illness or financial difficulties following relocation. With 100 resettled families as a goal by July 1, the Federal Council of Churches is contemplating on lending aid to any family regardless of denomination.

Prompt response by interested applicants is urged because selections for qualified families will proceed immediately after Bishop Reifsnider's arrival, stated the Relocation Officer. Applications will be accepted by either the Relocation Office or the Community Welfare Department.

Nine Leave Center For War Industry

Nine residents left Wednesday for Chicago where they will be given an opportunity to work at an essential wartime industry on a six-month seasonal leave basis, according to Walter Heath of the Relocation Office.

Heath disclosed that these resettlers will be trained as shear operators, punch press operators, turret lathe operators, drill press operators, tapping machine operators, welders, shaping machine hands and in many other trades and will be paid a minimum of \$32.80 per week.

The group consists of Susumu Yokomizo, Carl Yanagi, Shiro Yoshikawa, Henry Takashi Yamada, Shigeru Yoshioka, Kazuo Hori, Dan Shigeru Sugimoto, Roy Tsukasa Omura and Haruo Hori. At the end of six months, the group will be permitted to return to this center with railroad fare paid by the company.

McLeod Taken By Plane To Glendale

Arriving at the local airport Monday from Burbank, Dr. Besser of the Lockheed medical staff took E. C. McLeod, who is suffering two leg fractures in his right leg, back to Southern California with him for specialized care, announced the local hospital.

McLeod, chief test pilot for Lockheed and brother-in-law of Arthur L. Williams, assistant chief of internal security, was taken by airplane to the Physician and Surgeons Hospital in Glendale. McLeod was injured in a freak tobogganing accident near Independence last Saturday.

Bob Izumi Accepted As CAP Cadet

DES MOINES, Ia., Jan. 22—Bob Izumi, formerly of Manzanar, became what is believed to be the first nisei to be accepted as a civil air patrol cadet here recently, according to the Pacific Citizen.

Izumi left this center during the middle of last year on a NYA training offer, and had been doing odd jobs around Des Moines when that arrangement fell through.

The CAP, which has been active in this area on patrol work and in arousing youth interest in flying, will enable Izumi to study ground operation of planes and will help him to learn to fly. Bob applied and was accepted last week on reaching 17, the CAP acceptance age.

Rep. Clair J. Engle Reports On Tule Japanese Problem Hearing

Hearings are now ended on the Japanese problem at Tule Lake, and a report and recommendations will be forthcoming from the Dies sub-committee which held the hearings on the problem, wrote Rep. Clair J. Engle, recently in the Inyo Independent, a publication of Inyo County, California.

Representative Engle, who represents the 2nd Congressional District which includes Manzanar, also stated that the Pacific Coast delegations in the House have a committee which held hearings and are bringing out resolutions requesting the Department of Justice to take over Tule Lake and the President to remove Dillon S. Myer as the director of the War Relocation Authority.

The committee also requested an appointment of a new director with directions to make necessary changes in personnel and policy to insure efficient and economical use of government property and sufficient security in the centers.

ARMY CONTROL

Engle stated that the predominant opinion in California favors the army taking over all the camps. However, this action was opposed by some congressmen who feared that all Americans held by the Japanese would be put under Japanese army control. They said "Japs are great imitators. They've rounded up our nationals until we moved all of the

Complete Wiring Of Camp's Fire Phones

Although the telephone wires for the fire phones have already been set up for the whole camp, the telephones have not yet arrived, announced Frank E. Hon, fire protection officer. The wires have been erected by the Interstate Telegraph Co. during the past two weeks.

Telephones have been requisitioned and are expected to arrive soon from the Signal Corps in San Francisco. For easy access these phones will be placed in the middle of every fire district and with an additional phone located in the Administration area. Each phone will be marked by a ruby light above it at night.

Army To Draft Japanese Americans

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 21 (By Wire)—Plans have been completed for the reinstatement of General Selective Service procedures for American citizens of Japanese descent, the War Department announced today.

Under the War Department plans, Japanese Americans considered acceptable for military service will be reclassified by their Selective Service Board on the same basis as other citizens,

and called for induction if physically qualified and not deferred.

Last February the 442nd Combat Team composed of Japanese American volunteers was formed. In a letter to the Secretary of War commenting on the formation of this unit, the President said: "No loyal citizen of the United States should be denied the right to exercise the responsibilities of his citizenship regardless of his ancestry. The principle on which this country was founded and by which it has always been governed is that Americanism is a matter of the mind and heart; Americanism is race, and never was, a matter of race or ancestry."

The excellent showing which the Combat Team has made in training and the outstanding record achieved by the 100th Battalion, a former Hawaiian National Guard Unit, now fighting in Italy were major factors in the present plan.

Claim Garden Plots With Name Stakes

Victory gardeners of last year who wish to use the same sections of the Victory Garden as in 1943 must post stakes around their plots with their names written on the stakes, announced Henry Nakamura, president of the Victory Garden Association. This must be done before Sunday.

The sections remaining unclaimed after Sunday will be divided among members who want new plots.

A request from the Victory Garden Association states that garbage is not to be disposed of in the plots, and animals or fowls are not to be allowed in the gardens.

Trucks Cause Break In Main Water Line

A stream of water, much like that caused by melting snow, poured through blocks 33, 32, 31, and 30 Tuesday morning as a result of a break in the water line in block 33.

Senior Engineer A. M. Sandridge disclosed that the recent wet weather had softened the dirt around the concrete casings which are placed over water shut off valves in basins, mess halls, and other buildings in the block. These casings will sink into the ground, breaking the water pipe when trucks are driven over them, which was evidently the case in block 33.

The senior engineer warned that there have been a considerable number of these cases, and requested all drivers whose duty takes their trucks within the blocks to be careful to avoid hitting these casings.

Ask Fair Treatment Of Loyal Americans

MARYKNOLL, N. Y., Jan.—According to The Tidings, a Los Angeles Catholic publication, Bishop James Edward Walsh, superior general of the Maryknoll Fathers, commenting favorably upon a statement made by ex-Ambassador Joseph Grew who called for national consideration for loyal Japanese Americans, asked that these Americans be given a reasonable treatment not urged by sentimentality.

He said, "Ambassador Grew's plea for reasonable treatment and consideration of loyal Americans of Japanese origin is a sound statement of Christian and American principles issued amid a chorus of views which have frequently been open anti-Christian and unparliamentary."

Now attached as special consultant to the State Department, ex-Ambassador Grew stated in his recent speech that the overwhelming majority of Americans of Japanese origin are wholly loyal to the United States and should not be penalized and alienated through blind prejudice.

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Once In A Lifetime

Many of us are living beyond our means and dipping into our pre-evacuation savings. A senseless custom; if indeed this has become a custom. To stop this practice, a community approved set of rules will be fashioned by the block managers, describing the expenditure ceilings on all social affairs. A committee of managers is preparing a study of this perplexing problem. First, the committee must determine, by exhaustive studies, the meaning of the phrase "living beyond our means." How many of us are consistently having to spend more than our subsistence allowances. Manzanar's 1943 payroll plus clothing allowances, Fiscal Chief Ransom Boczkiewicz discloses, amounted to exactly \$1,236,832.55.

Too often the once-in-a-year and once-in-a-life-time attitude persuades evacuees to go all out on parties. Christmas and New Year's festivities come but once a year, so why not have parties with abundant food and drinks and gifts? Weddings come but once in a life-time, so why be niggardly with expenses? Anyway, guests don't come to these parties empty handed. They pay for the cost of the banquets, so the reasoning goes.

How do the ministers, who perform wedding ceremonies, feel about this subject? Do the parents of the brides—and especially the grooms—agree that the reception should not be too elaborate? Or do they feel that by holding a simple reception, they would be criticized by their friends and neighbors? What are the reactions of the brides and grooms themselves to this subject? Do they feel that this community wide restraint is well-advised? What are the observations of the social welfare workers regarding this matter? A summary of opinions from these people would help toward familiarizing the managerial committee with some of the phases of this problem.

BOARD REVEALS BASEBALL DEBT

Subject regarding how money should be raised to pay off a debt of \$1452.15 to the eight baseball teams was one of the main points of discussion at the eleventh meeting of the Board of Directors of the Manzanar Cooperative Enterprises at the Town Hall Monday, announced Chokichi Nakano.

Henry Murakami, vice president of the Baseball Association, stated that the original plan to raise funds for use in sport activities was to have the teams sponsor movies with charged admissions. This, he said, had the approval of the Community Activities Division.

Statements turned in by each of the teams are as follows: San Fernando Aces, \$115.29; Skippers, \$169.70; Yagores, \$197.65; Los Santos, \$183.25; Solons, \$205.57; Manzanights, \$194.32; Sears, \$169.72; Red Sox, \$214.65.

It was suggested at the meeting that the Co-op management charge an admission fee of five cents to every resident over five years of age until the sum of \$1452.15 is raised. This money

will be turned over to the C. A. Co-op.

A question was asked regarding the disposal of the uniforms and equipment after the league was finished. Mr. Murakami stated that he thought it best if the equipment and uniforms were turned over to the Community Activities so that later other players need not get new outfits.

This matter will be brought before the Congress meeting which will be held on January 25 at Kitchin 16 at which time baseball managers will be asked to answer questions.

Erect Switchboard

Installation of a new switch board at the Manzanar Center Hospital was announced by Morse Little, project medical officer.

This newly erected switch board is equipped with 2 trunk lines and ten branch phones.

Local College Staff Needs Replacement

Manzanar Business College is badly in need of replacements in its teaching staff as three typing and shorthand teachers have relocated recently, announced Dr. Melvin Strong, director of the Adult Education.

Anyone with business college background, a school commercial major, or teaching experience in the business field who is interested in a teaching position in the business college is asked to get in touch with the Adult Education Department at 7-1-1.

If you are presently employed and would like to teach one evening class or more a week, your help would be appreciated until regular teachers can be recruited, stated Dr. Strong.

Plan Class Schedule For New Semester

New schedule of classes is being prepared in preparation for the beginning of the spring semester on February 10 by the Manzanar High School, stated Rollin C. Fox, principal.

A revised art program and course in library science will be repeated and a drafting course will be offered, he stated. Commercial students who can qualify will be given an opportunity to work under supervision in offices part time to get practical experience.

The auto mechanics program now being planned under the direction of Dr. Melvin Strong, director of Adult Education, will provide for a half day of auto mechanics for high students who can qualify.

During the Christmas recess the Public Works Department calcimined most of the high school classrooms remaining unpainted up to that time. Teachers and students are hanging window curtains, stated Rollin C. Fox, principal of the Manzanar Secondary School.

Public Works has also winterized the doors and repaired roof leaks of several buildings.

A small shipment of blackboards recently arrived and are being installed in mathematics and English classes.

Geography globes and maps are now available for social studies classes, he stated.

Paintings Featured

Paintings of Manzanar are featured in the Fine Arts Exhibit on display at 8-15. Articles of wood, metal and leather worked by hand have been loaned to the display by amateur artists in this community, stated Kiyotsugu Tsuchiya, director of the Visual Education Museum.

A background panorama depicting valley scenery from Mount Williamson to the Alabama Hills is now being painted on the north end of the hall by C. T. Hibino, Tsuchiya reported.

Man Loses Money

Twenty-six dollars in cash contained in a wallet was lost in the vicinity of Mess Hall 1 Monday afternoon, announced the Police Department. Owner of the wallet is G. Okazaki. Any person finding the above wallet or other articles of value are requested to turn them into the Police Department, stated Chief John L. Gilkey.

Checks Distributed

Paychecks distributed to Manzanar residents for the period of July 1, 1942 to June 30, 1943 amounted to \$833,180.76, according to Budget and Finance Supervisors R. C. Boczkiewicz.

He also revealed that travel grants issued for this period totaled \$22,729.65 while public assistance grants and clothing allowances amounted to \$403,813.36.

Letters from the Public

(Following employer's testimonial appeared in the December Resettlement Bulletin issued by the Federal Council of Churches of New York.—Ed. Note)

Dear Sir: We have had six American born Japanese working for us at one time, but the first of the month two left to re-enter college. All of these men operate hydraulic molding presses.

We have been well satisfied with the work of these men and the way the other workers have accepted them.

They pick up the work very quickly and seem very anxious to not only give a good day's work but to turn out the highest quality of work they can. They do less visiting or roaming around the shop than most of the other workers and we have not had one complaint from a single employee regarding their conduct. We can see no reason why these men should not be of the same help to us after the war as they are now and we would not object to having more of them at this time.

Plan To Standardize Camp Social Affairs

Meeting Monday and again on Thursday, a block managers assembly committee formulated plans for standardization of the social affairs in this center. The committee composed of Messrs. J. Shikami, C. Nakano, T. Higashi, Harry Nakamura, K. Takahashi, E. Masuyama, K. Kitahara, H. I. Aramaki, H. Murakami and T. Sakata, was chosen by the assembly to study and make recommendations on the matter of the growing extravagance of weddings, receptions and other social functions.

Contacts were being made with the churches, Welfare Division, Free Press, Mess Operations and other agencies for cooperation and support of this program. Definite word on this subject was to have been announced by this committee to the regular meeting of the block managers yesterday.

(Following are excerpts from a letter written by Paul Lockwood to the editor of the FRESNO BEE, Fresno, Calif., toward the solution of the Japanese problem.—Ed. Note)

Editor of the Bee—Sir: Let me offer three concrete proofs. First, is that of the noted E. Stanley Jones, a missionary whose article in the last issue of The Christian Century condemns any hatred of the Japanese citizens of this nation.

Second, the priests and nuns who have given their lives to help the Japanese. I have talked with them in and around Los Angeles and they say most of the Japanese in this country and Hawaii proved helpful to the United States.

Third, I happened to be in a company sent to Tule Lake so I know segregation did a lot of harm and they acted as any other American would have acted.

The important question is are we going to show the true spirit of our constitution now and after this horrible war, or are we going to bring about riots and civil war because of our hatred and misunderstanding?

Predict Further Zoot Suit Outbreak

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 22.—Expectations of a possible further "Zoot Suit" outbreak was voiced recently by a sub-committee of the House Naval Affairs unless immediate actions are taken to improve housing, health, and recreational conditions in "Little Tokyo" and other localities now inhabited by Negroes.

This prediction, printed in the New York PM Daily and written by Elizabeth Donahue, frankly protested prevailing conditions. "Instead of recommending construction of decent homes for the Negroes," she wrote, "the committee suggested strict control of in-migration of Negro workers."

Importance of stabilizing the "human relations in this area through adequate recreational facilities for the Negroes" was expressed by the committee.

CHICAGO OFFERS JOBS TO WOMEN

Opportunity for trail relocation in Chicago was offered this week to Issei and Nisei women as a result of an employment offer received from the Stevens Hotel in Chicago, announced Walter Heath of the Relocation Office.

Heath said that the present offer is for maids with pay being \$80 monthly, on 26 working days. There will be a withholding tax of \$5.60 and \$30 will be deducted for room and board. After all expenses are paid, the worker will have a net earning of \$44.40 monthly.

After a completion of three months' work, the hotel will re-

imburse those workers for their railroad ticket and \$9 meal fare enroute. After six months' service, train fare and meals will be given to the individual whether she contemplates on returning to the center or not.

He also disclosed that seasonal leave will be granted to permit persons to return to the center if they find that Chicago is not to their liking.

Since this offer is an exceptional one and Manzanar's quota is 12, Walter Heath advises those who are interested to apply immediately.

Offer Sewing Jobs

Jeann Lang Dress Company of Minneapolis, Minnesota is seeking girls and young women who are experienced in sewing, operating power machines, pressing and such other work that may come up in a dress factory. It disclosed that inexperienced workers will also be accepted and trained.

The following wages are offered: Experienced machine operators, 60 cents to \$1.15 per hour; inexperienced machine operators, 40 to 55 cents per hour; hand cutters and bundlers, 45 cents to \$1 per hour and pressers, 45 to 85 cents per hour. Work is permanent the year around, stated the office.

Need Typists

United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration Official Station of Washington, D. C. is in need of ten typists and stenographers. Those in grades CAF-2 will receive \$1440 yearly plus overtime while those in the CAF-3 will receive \$1620 plus overtime annually with promotion according to their ability, announced Walter A. Heath of the Relocation Office.

This position does not necessitate Civil Service Clearance but Civil Service Examination Eligibility is asked except in outstanding instances. The relief station is also requesting three telephone operators, he stated.
