

Director Asks Cooperation On Constructions

Project Director Ralph P. Mer-Project Director Raiph P. Mer-ritit today requested the cooper-ation of all residents on the mat-ter of private construction and maintenance. He stated that the ruling of the War Production Board and budgetary require-ments by our Washington office make it imperative that the only construction, maintenance or reconstruction, maintenance or re-pair work done in the center must be done by the Engineer-ing Division.

He stated that his project must furnish to Washington each quarter, in minute detail, figures representing monthly costs on all construction and maintenance projects. The requirements are so exacting that an expenditure of even one cent must be accurately accounted for and recorded. It is therefore necessary that all departments which in the past have been doing small maintenance jobs themselves, to discontinue this practice and request such work done through the Engineering Department. gineering Department.

The project director referred to many instances where many members of the appointed staff, as well as the evacuees, have made certain improvements to their own dwellings at their own their own dwellings at their own expense. He said that any improv-ement to government buildings is considered government, prop-erty and must of necessity be accounted for. PROCEDURE

9000 IN ARMY

The director pointed out that there are now in the army about 9000 soldiers of Japanese descent, nearly half of whom volunteered.

nearly half of whom volunteered. One unit has had nearly one-third casualties in recent fight-ing in Italy, and another unit is in training in Mississippi. Recently, he said, the War De-Partment announced that from now on the Selective Service system will apply to Americans of Japanese ancestry. Only volunteers have been taken since February, 1942. These facts, he said, should prove the Army's opinion on the subject. MASS DETENTION

"Those who urge mass detention overlook the repercussions it would have from a constitutional standpoint," he said. The United States Supreme Court has not yet ruled on the validity of the evacuation and detention. "Practically all lawyers are agreed that the Constitution does not provide for mass detention of American Citizens. This was strongly emphasized recently by the Attorney General and brought out in a Circuit Court decision."

Myer stated that recently many persons and organizations have been carrying on a persistant and vigorous campaign of race hatred. "These persons," he said, "are doing a serious disservice to the national war effort and provid-

The residents will depart in groups of 500 to each trainload of which there will be four. He said movements will be sometime will be four. The director revealed that the present list shows 1850 persons scheduled for Tule Lake. This number will be subject to change, depending on medical deferrals for ailing persons and segregation of those going to Crystal City [amily internment camps in Texass.]

Residents will be notified prior to their departure of information to their departure of information concerning assignment to cars. Mr. Merritt emphasized that every physical comfort possible will be provided segregrees during the period of movement. Special attention will be given to such matters as pullman berths for mothers with small children and special food for babies and others on diets. Complete information will be given to segregants on such matters as to the exact date of departure and other specific assignments on the return of the project director.

Clarify Procedures For Personal Goods

Clarification on the procedure Clarification on the procedure of preparing personal property and household goods was released today by the Evacuee Property Office. The residents are informed by that office that the Form 156 will be issued soon after the project director's return from San Francisco. No issuance of lumber will be given until all necessary details on the form regarding the requirements of each family are compiled. This form will list the property which is to be later picked up for shipment.

You will be notified of this date through your block managers. All boxes, trunks, and crates should be plainly marked in two places with the owners full name. Do not use initials.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 29

—Lieut. John DeWitt disclosed his motives for the evacuation action in a final report to the War Department, it was stated in the Los Angeles Times recently.

Physically criticalizing Attorney

Roundly criticizing Attorney General Biddle for his practice of allowing Japanese in the Pac-ific Coast, DeWitt stated that there were indications that these (120,000 potential enemies) were organized and ready for concer-ted action at a favorable opport-unity and referred to the evac-uation as a "military necessity".

He reported in detail that numerous attacks on the Pacific Coast were invariably conducted in issolated areas. Districts which were "ideally suited" for landing purposes by the enemy were inhabited by Japanese, he said, who had exclusive control over public utilities, power and telephone lines, and referred that

Call Niseis To Arms

At last the re-institution of Selective Service proced-ures for the niseis was announced by the War Department. Each of us must follow the dictates of his own heart

as he faces the long overdue draft call. Each of us must subordinate whatever feeling of vexation he may feel about the uncertainty of the past two years. It will be some relief to the boys if they would go with the minimum of illusions about the unfathomable future as it affects themselves and

their kinfolks.

The niseis must realize the importance of this announcement in regard to the future of Japanese Americans in this country. Their achievements will determine greatly the social and economic security of the niseis in post war America. This call to the colors is a happy development in the process of becoming, so to speak, a more integral structure, which was not wholly possible in the pre-Pearl Harbor days of our congested lives on the West Coast.

The soldier-to-be must guard against being swooped away in a fluffy-feeling cloud of exultation over the significance of his being called to arms, to the utter disregard of some cold facts. The end of this war very likely will not bring completely unfettered social and economic freedom for the niseis. This is a problem that will require time and patience and the coordinated efforts of all peoples of America.

Mileage Reduction Of Automobiles Seen

In order that all centers may comply with the Presidential or-der making necessary a 40 per cent reduction in mileage of government vehicles used for project administration, the War Relocat-ion Authority in Washington has made revisions of the trip tickets and a shipment has been received

This new trip and justification sheet for motor equipment usage requires specific information re-garding the business for which the request is made. Unlike the garding the business for which the request is made. Unlike the present form being used, the revised sheet calls for an anticipated mileage for the request and the time required for it. This information must be filled in before it can be presented to the Dispatcher's for automotive equipment. Motor pool heads may or may not approve the requests; or it can make changes to that the mileages may be reduced as much as possible.

Request for use of government cars must be signed by the divisional or section heads. They will be held fully responsible for the legal use of the car or truck assigned to them. It has been the practice of secretaries, in the absence of division heads, they sign for or make requests for

in the absence of division heads, to sith for or make requests for vehicles. With the new forms, such signatures will not be accepted.

Each department will receive these sheets with instructions for filling out the forms. The new forms will be put into effect beginning February 1. Full cooperation of all departments will be needed in order that this plan may run smoothly and a definite reduction seen in the mileage for this center. mileage for this center.

FIND MATTRESS MAKING TEDIOUS

One of the most interesting of Manzanar industries is the new mattress factory located in Warehouse 25. This department produces 50 to 70 mattresses a day for use in the center.

The process in making mattresses is rather simple but tedious. Cotton from a 500 pound bale is blown through a small opening ha canvas cevering. These coverings are made by the garment factory. The cotton is fluffed and blown into the canvas by means of a centrifugal blower powered by a five horse-power electric motor.

Next the poening is sewed and

with baseball bats so that the
cotton is distributed evenly in
the corners as well as the center.
The mattress is then taken to two
