

Local Hospital Faces Severe Labor Shortage

Severe manpower shortage faced the evacuee residents today at the local hospital as the segregation action neared its mark. Chief Nurse Josephine Hawes disclosed that the acute labor situation, the worst she has witnessed since her arrival here, meant the termination of 35 hospital workers that are affected by this coming movement. Declaring that "the hospital is now at one of its highest peaks and it is essential to have more help," the head nurse sent forth a center-wide appeal with the plea, "Dr. Morse Little is requesting assistance from the residents of the center for help in the hospital. It is an emergency request as in the next two weeks there will be some 35 terminations."

Reported cases of colds and minor physical letdowns were revealed among the limited hospital workers, emphasizing the necessity of the project director's workers. Hopes for a favorable residents' outcome was being awaited as the chief nurse concluded:

"If there are former attendants, (nurses and orderlies) who are able to work for a month or so, it would be appreciated. Any other person desiring hospital employment were asked to contact Chief Nurse Hawes at the hospital."

Request Aliens For Change Of Address

Notification of change of address concerning all alien residents in this center was announced through the project director's office. The office revealed that Washington Office has received a notice from the Alien Registration of the Immigration and Naturalization Service requesting all alien residents in relocation centers to immediately prepare and individually mail in writing their address changes to the Department of Justice, Immigration and Naturalization Service, Alien Registration Division, Philadelphia, Pa.

NEW POLICY
The office stated that this is the first time which aliens outside of relocation centers are required to have. The memorandum said, "Earlier discussions with Department of Justice officials had led us to believe that during the time that Japanese aliens were resident in relocation centers it would not be necessary for them to individually report the fact of such residence. However, recent discussions and communications have made it clear that the department does require this information." According to the Philadelphia office is mailing a supply of address change cards and these cards should be received here shortly.

Following is that portion of the Alien Registration Act of 1940 which requires that change of address notices be submitted by alien registrants:

"Sec. 35. Any alien required to be registered under this title who is a resident of the United States shall notify the Commissioner in writing of each change of residence and new address within five days from the date of such change. Any other alien required to be registered under this title shall notify the Commissioner in writing of his address at the expiration of each three month's period of residence in the United States. In the case of an alien for whom a parent or legal guardian is required to apply for registration, the notice required by this section shall be given by such parent or legal guardian."

"Sec. 36 (b). Any alien, or any parent or legal guardian of any alien, who fails to give written notice to the Commissioner of change of address as required by

Expect Shipment Of Hogs From Nevada

Questions and Answers About Draft

Clarifying many points regarding induction of niseis for military service, Mrs. Lucy Adams released this week, detailed information as received from Washington. The information in question-and-answer form is here reprinted in full:

- Q. To what age group will induction for military service apply?
A. To males 18 to 37 years of age inclusive.
- Q. Will kiberi be inducted?
A. Yes, if otherwise qualified.
- Q. Will issei be inducted?
A. No.
- Q. Will a man who has left the relocation be inducted?
A. Yes, if qualified. Induction does not depend on residence in a center.

Myer Releases Policies For Governing Operation Of Tule Lake Disloyal Camp

Policies for government operation of the Tule Lake segregation center, which have been developed by a committee in the Washington office, including Project Director Raymond Best of Tule Lake, was approved by Dillon S. Myer, national director, announced Mrs. Lucy Adams, assistant project director in charge of Community Management. These policies are as follows:

"Aliens will be treated as internees under the terms of the Geneva Convention and will have the privilege of presenting grievances to the Spanish Embassy; citizen segregants will have the redress ordinarily available to citizens of the United States. There will be no Community Council at the center. Problems of the center administration and the maintenance of law and order will be consulted with the project director through a representative committee.

Arrest Japanese In Forbidden Area

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 2—Final disposition of the case of Masanobu Hata, 27-year old Japanese who was arrested in the forbidden Southern California war area last week, will come from Attorney General Francis Biddle at Washington, reported the Los Angeles Examiner.

Hata, who lived in West Los Angeles before Pearl Harbor, was evacuated shortly after to a relocation center at Jerome, Arkansas, and from there was permitted by the War Relocation Authority to go to St. Louis to work.

From St. Louis he made the 2100-mile trip to Los Angeles to get the Dodge sedan which he got at Lomita, and on his arrival Monday he was given gas coupons for 140 gallons by a Torrance ration board with which to drive the car back to St. Louis.

He was picked up on an all-points broadcast sent out when FBI agents learned that he had been roaming unguarded and unchallenged through the heart of the local war plant area.

After his arrest Hata told FBI agents that he had sent a telegraphic request to the WRA San Francisco office last January 14 for permission to come to Southern California and get his car, and that when he received no reply, he "came anyway."

Section 36 of this Act shall upon conviction thereunder be fined not to exceed \$100, or be imprisoned not more than thirty days, or both."

INTERNAL SECURITY

"The internal security of the center will be the responsibility of WRA, with the Army patrol along the external boundaries of the center. In addition, a special compound within the center will be established for housing any evacuees whose activities are detrimental to the welfare and peace of the project. This area will be under the guard of the military police."

EDUCATION

"American-type education facilities up to high school will be provided at government expense, other types of schools desired by

Student Clearance Methods Facilitated

Methods of obtaining the necessary clearance for enrollment of Japanese American students in colleges and universities have been greatly facilitated under the terms of a directive issued by the War Department in Washington, stated the Information Digest, a WRA publication.

The new directive places responsibility for security measures at plants and educational facilities important to the war effort with the Provost Marshal General's Office and further provides that Japanese American students may be permitted to attend such schools upon their approval.

ARRANGEMENTS

Arrangements have been worked out whereby the National Japanese American Student Relocation Council will undertake the securing of school acceptance and completion of papers necessary for the PMGO investigation. Records of only those students who have already been accepted by a college or university will be forwarded to the PMGO for investigation, the digest reported.

The plan, providing that all schools not conducting classified military activities shall automatically be placed in the approved category, has eliminated the need for clearing individual schools with military authorities.

Students in centers accepted by approved schools will be subject only to WRA leave procedures; those accepted by schools important to the war effort will also undergo the PMGO investigation. Students already attending schools having classified activities will be permitted to remain in school pending investigation.

evacuees will be permitted at their own expense. Japanese social and cultural activities will be allowed without expense to WRA, but political denominations will not be permitted.

EMPLOYMENT

"Employment will be on a voluntary basis at prevailing WRA wage scale. Clothing allowances and grants will be provided for as in other centers. Agricultural and industrial programs will be limited to foodstuffs and industrial products needed for use at the center.

"No short term leave will be granted except in case of an emergency. Visitors to the project will be discouraged as much as is possible.

APPEALS BOARD

"Residents of Tule Lake who wish to be considered for transfer to other WRA centers will be allowed to present their cases before an appeals board soon to be established. The new board will be composed of prominent civilians, otherwise not associated with WRA, and will not include West Coast attorneys, business-

Render Cautions To Male Citizens Here

"In the view of the announcement by the United States War Department that all military-aged citizens of Japanese ancestry are now subject to Selective Service, it is of the utmost importance that they keep their Selective Service Boards posted of all changes in address since such responsibility rests with the individual," cautioned Attorney H. Tsurutani of the Legal Aid Department. His announcement followed upon a receipt of a telegram from Washington on a similar topic.

The attorney declared that a man who cannot be located and notified to appear for pre-induction physical examination when his order number appears will be reported as delinquent and is liable to severe penalties provided under the Selective Service Training Act.

Explain Barring Of Kuroki From Radio

Explanation for the removal of Technical Sergeant Ben Kuroki, 21, Japanese American turret gunner, was made last week by the National Broadcasting Co. in the Los Angeles Times.

"We questioned the judgment of permitting an American Japanese to appear on a program originating on the West Coast," an N. B. C. spokesman said, "because the whole American Japanese question is highly controversial."

After the network questioned advisability, Colonel Ed Kirby, head of the radio branch, rescinded the War Department approval which had previously been granted by Major General Alexander Series, head of the War Department public relations division, the article stated.

Sergeant Kuroki, who won the Distinguished Flying Cross and the Air Medal with Oak Leaf Clusters, is now recuperating in Santa Monica.

S.O.S.—AGAIN

Another arrival of an S.O.S. (Snow On Sunday) occurred this week when Manzanar experienced its third and heaviest snowfall of the year.

Greeting surprised residents with a fresh white blanket of snow in the morning, the camp presented a muddy, slushy appearance by noon.

The snowfall produced the usual number of snowmen.

New Physical Exam Procedure Gives 60 Days Before Induction

SACRAMENTO, Calif., Feb. 2—Col. K. H. Leitch, state director of Selective Service, said that a new physical examination procedure effective February 1 will give men liable for draft nearly 60 days before notice of examination and actual induction into the armed forces, it was stated in an article in the Los Angeles Times.

Leitch also disclosed that the California draft quota for March is about the same as for other recent months and about half of the peak reached during earlier months of 1943.

NEW PROCEDURE

Explaining the new pre-induction examination procedure, Leitch said that registrants may be ordered to report for examination, either before or after being placed in Class 1-A, and following the examination will be given a minimum time before actual induction, reported the news article.

Leitch said that the absolute minimum about the notice of examination is given, several days will be required for results to be determined of blood

tests, and more time will be required for exchange of records between the draft board and induction station.

When the system is in operation, Leitch said, local draft boards will order men up for examination in one month for induction under the following month's quota.

Boyenkerk To Tell Experiences Abroad

Experiences of the Rev. H. G. Boyenkerk in a Japanese prison after the outbreak of the war will be the topic of discussion this evening from 7 to 8:30 p.m. in 7-10-4, stated Dr. Melvin Strong, director of Adult Education.

Final in the series of panels being sponsored by Adult Education, this discussion will be on the treatment the Reverend Boyenkerk met with in Japan until his return to the United States on the exchange ship, the Grips-holm.

While in Japan, the Reverend had been doing missionary work.

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Never Say Quit

I like the story of Sgt. Ben Kuroki, the nisei war hero of the hour. I like his story for its breath taking battle incidents. For instance, the occasion during a flight when the plex-glass dome over his own top turret gunner's post was shattered by a German anti-aircraft shell. Crew members around him were shot down like clay pigeons. He was uninjured. The sergeant must have been wearing a handful of rabbits' feet, coming through 25 bombing raids without a scratch. Just like his luck, the ex-Nebraska farmer boy turned turret gunner asked for and was assigned to five additional bombing missions, including what are known as shuttle sweeps. These trips take a bombing plane out of England, over Belgium, Germany and Italy to North Africa and back again after gassing up in Bizerte.

SUBSTANTIAL REASON

But I mark his story for what seems to me to be more substantial reason than luck in his air exploits. The only nisei in the United States Army Air Forces, Kuroki had a hell of a tough stretch of troubles starting with his attempt to enlist in the Air Corps just after Pearl Harbor. They wouldn't take him. He begged and stormed the recruiting officers. They relented. At Fort Myers in Florida no one would talk to him. The boys were suspicious. He ate his meals alone. Often he longed to quit and go home. Then Ben learned that his group was being ordered to England, but without him. He set to work to wangle the trip. Again his officers gave in and permitted him to accompany the outfit.

He arrived in England all right, but the Air Force promptly set him to pushing pencils in its office. But he wanted to become a crew member of a bombing plane; a turret gunner. The sergeant finally was permitted to go to a gunnery school. He became a qualified gunner. But none of the bomber crews would take him. Again he pleaded; he added a tear act. Finally, General Ted Timberlake's squadron accepted him.

Quit? The sergeant, who last week was resting at the Air Force replacement center in Santa Monica with his uniform glittering with rows of campaign ribbons, often admitted the desire but never quit. He just had plain initiative, loads of guts with some to spare.

File Income Tax Return By March 15

All persons who must make a final and complete income tax return for 1943 must file it by March 15, announced the Legal Aid Department. According to the income tax law, "every citizen and resident of the United States having, during the taxable year, gross income (income derived from any source whatever, unless exempt from tax by law) in an amount specified below, regardless of the amount of the net income, shall make a return if:

- (2) married but not living with husband or wife for any part of the year and gross income equals or exceeds \$500;
 - (3) married and living with husband or wife for any part of the year or for the entire year, and gross income exceeds \$624 or combined gross income of the husband and wife equals or exceeds \$1200;
 - (4) single or married (regardless of amount of gross income for 1943) if liable for tax for 1942.
- Any resident wishing further information or assistance is advised to go to Legal Aid Department, 1-2-1.

Letters from the Public

(In the midst of current anti-Japanese feeling on the Pacific Coast, a former resident of Sacramento now in the armed forces wrote a letter to the editor of the SACRAMENTO BEE recollecting a soldier's view on the Japanese problem.—Ed. Note) Editor of the Bee—Sir:

It was with quite a bit of concern that I read the December 20th issue of Time and noted therein an article describing white hunts against loyal Americans of Japanese ancestry led by Assemblyman Chester F. Gannon....

It is in connection with that statement that I write my first letter to the Bee in my 10 years of residence in Sacramento. I believe I can express the attitude of the soldiers who have met the Japanese boys who belong to the men who froze under fire for 21 days on the bleak snow covered slopes of Attu....

On the other hand battle gives one a balanced outlook, which from the Time account is entirely lacking in certain Japanese baiting circles. We have gone into battle with loyal Americans of Japanese ancestry and they have acquitted themselves with honor and glory. Imagine the risk such a man takes when he volunteers and joins the army. Not only must he be careful of enemy fire, but he must take caution that he is not mistaken by his own troops as an enemy. We soldiers glory in the fact that these Japanese boys are with us giving their full measure of devotion, while their brothers and sisters, in some instances, are in relocation camps.... Have no fear that returning soldiers would desire to slit the throats of the loyal Japanese at home... It is not the returning

soldiers who will wish to torment and hound the loyal Japanese-Americans. We'll do our fighting on the battlefields against our country's enemies, and not on the streets at home against our country's friends.

If there is a problem with disloyal Japanese at home and from all accounts in the Bee, there is, quietly take the necessary steps and quell them and oust any incompetent administrators. Go after thoughtless Americans who strike in coal, for instance, when we were freezing in the Aleutians, but do it the American way.

I do not write this with any personal or political animosity toward Assemblyman Gannon. As it happens we belong to the same party, have practiced law before the same courts and have been friends for some years. I just believe he doesn't know.

"Individual cases will be heard by a three-man panel which will meet at Tule Lake at the directors request. Only those evacuees whose applications for leave clearance have previously been denied may appeal to the board.

"Repatriates, expatriates, and persons who answered the loyalty question negatively and whose leave clearance has not yet been denied will first be required to request further investigation and leave clearance. If leave clearance is denied, such persons can then appeal to the board. The small group of persons who remained at Tule Lake after the completion of the segregation move solely because of their inability to travel will not be required to appeal their cases, but will be eligible for transfer to other centers as soon as their health permits."

Admitting that it took time and patients to make her first good friends in Chicago, she says now that she has many friends of all nationalities.

To demonstrate the feeling of Chicagoans in general for persons of Japanese ancestry, she wrote that an advertisement in the Chicago Tribune brought more than 25 replies. The ad was "Jap-American employee. Girl will exchange room and board for light evening house duty." She is now living in a "nice" home and "save about all of my salary."

Yoshiye left Manzanar in May, 1943 after being employed by Manzanar's YWCA. She was in charge of the younger girls' group.

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QUESTIONS, ANSWERS ABOUT DRAFT

5. Q. Will an individual of Japanese ancestry who has applied for expatriation be inducted?
 - A. Generally speaking, no.
6. Q. Can a man avoid induction by changing his answer on the loyalty question or by asking for expatriation at this time?
 - A. No. A change in his answer or a request for expatriation will not affect his liability for training and service. The Selective Service Law carries penalties for false statements made for the purpose of avoiding induction.
7. Q. At what rate will men be called for induction?
 - A. The rate of call will depend on the local Selective Service Board quota.
8. Q. On what basis does the Army determine "acceptability for service"?
 - A. "Acceptability for service" is determined by checking individual records.
9. Q. Is there any way for a man not considered "acceptable for service" to change his status?
 - A. Not at present.
10. Q. How soon will inductees be called?
 - A. It is impossible to indicate the exact time when a registrant will be called. An individual considered "acceptable for service" will be reclassified by the local Selective Service Board. He will undergo a pre-induction physical examination when his order is received, or sooner if he waives this requirement and volunteers. If he is physically qualified, he will generally be called not less than 10 or more than 90 days thereafter.
11. Q. Where will physical examinations be given?
 - A. At the Armed Forces Induction Station designated by the Selective Service, usually the nearest station.
12. Q. If a man is registered with a Selective Service Board on the Pacific Coast will he go back to that point to be inducted?
 - A. No. He will be inducted at the nearest Armed Forces Induction Station or Reception Center.
13. Q. How will an "acceptable" nisei be notified to report for induction?
 - A. He will receive an order to report for induction from the appropriate local board. The order will be on DSS Form 15B.
14. Q. Where in the Army will the Japanese Americans serve?
 - A: They will serve wherever the United States sends them; however, it is anticipated that after basic training the majority of inductees will be assigned for service with the 100th Battalion or the 442nd Combat Team.
15. Q. Is there an opportunity to get into the Navy? The Marines? The Army Air Forces? The Armored Force?
 - A. Inductions are authorized only for the Army. Inductees will not be assigned to duty with the Air Forces or the Armored Force.
16. Q. Are there penalties for failure to notify a local Board of a change of address?
 - A. Yes. A man who fails to keep his local Board notified of his address will be reported as a delinquent to a U. S. District Attorney, and will be subject to penalties provided in the Selective Service and Training Act.
17. Q. Are nisei soldiers in uniform permitted to go into the evacuated zone?
 - A. Yes, when on active duty and on leave, or furlough.
18. Q. What assistance from the Government does the family of a soldier receive?
 - A. The system of benefits and allotments available from the Government to families of soldiers is too complicated to explain briefly. In a relocation center the Welfare Section has full information; outside a relocation center the local headquarters of the American Red Cross has such information; soldiers may receive complete information at Army Posts.
19. Q. What arrangements will WRA make for dependents of a nisei in a relocation center who is inducted into the Army?
 - A. Policies of WRA which apply to any persons in relocation centers also apply to dependents of soldiers.
20. Q. Will dependents of a nisei who is inducted after leaving a relocation center be eligible to return to a center?
 - A. Policies of WRA governing the return of any relocated person or family will apply to the family of a soldier. Briefly, the relocation supervisor in the area must give his approval before the project director is authorized to grant readmittance to a person who has been relocated.
