## By-Pass Goebbels

War intensifies hatred, one of the primary motive powers for war effort. Hate your enemies! Kill them! These are the battle cries at the war fronts and the urging spirit on our home front. But this spirit in itself is not an orderly motive power. It seeks an immediate outlet and an objective; the evacuees, for instance. Certain individuals and groups have become self-appointed rabble rousers to spearhead this persecution. Its example can be a premonition of the gravest consequence to the future of our country.

Letters received by the Free Press editors regarding our New Year's Day editorial ranged from Mrs. Roosevelt's courteous note on a White House stationery to a pencil-scribbled affair from a malice-ridden Jap-hater in Glendale. The latter variety is but a foretaste of the kind of intemperate and intolerant thinking among certain Americans who would take the Alice-in-Wonderland attitude of "off with their heads" toward the evacuees. Who knows? Next may be the Filipinos, the Jews, the Negroes, or even the Chinese who might come in disfavor with these intolerant people.

## REALISTIC ATTITUDE

We readily concede that the written and spoken outbursts of Nazi Propaganda Chieftain Goebbels often are laughably illogical. Witness, then, this statement issued last week by the Americanism Educational League of Los Angeles: "The League, for more than 18 years a service organization to assist civic groups in patriotic endeavors, with special attention to combatting un-American activities, has called together this group of attorneys to assist in clarification of many legal problems implicit in the Japanese question in America." The League stressed the organization's so-called realistic attitude toward the Japanese as contrasted with "emotional attitude." Who, indeed, is betraying emotional attitude?

Then, there is the tremble-chin radio station in Los Angeles which last week decided not to permit the nisei air force gunner-hero from the European battle front to speak over the coast-to-coast network "because of the controversial state of the Japanese question on the West Coast."

But there are, thank God, thoughtful people in America who perceive clearly the meaning of the words "what America is fighting for." They and our brother soldiers of many racial backgrounds which form an overwhelming majority of the 130,000,000 of us, know that bigotted thinking must be battled and overcome just as surely as victory must be secured in the battlefields.

## AN EDITORIAL Take It In Stride

Having weathered two Japanese war atrocity incidents, according to reports, the relocation evacuees are rapidly becoming inured to fears of retaliations against them by their neighbors. There is no reason to presume that further incidents will not be forthcoming.

The fact that the West citizens are probably more incensed over these atrocities than the people in the East is understandable. The execution of the Tokyo fliers and now the persecution of the Americans at Bataan underscores their impatience over the fact that their government is committed to the over-all allied strategy calling for prosecution of the war against Germany before tackling the warfare in the Pacific. Any reference to Bataan, moreover, is the equivalent of rubbing salt over a wound.

Whether it is wise for the Treasury Department to mount the Fourth War Loan Drive on the coincidental wave of public anger against the atrocities is debatable. This is quite apart from any repercussions against the relocated evacuees. It is sufficient to note that not a few citizens have expressed indignance over the fact that their government felt the necessity for spurring the public support of the drive by commandeering this incident. This method has been compared to the use of stuffed rabbits on the dog race tracks.

## AN EDITORIAL Please No Insults

(This editorial, appearing in a recent issue of the San Francisco Chronicle, refers to the case of a 22-year-old nisei girl married to a Caucasian. Mrs. June Arii Terry recently returned to her home town. One aroused neighboring woman attempted to drag the girl out of her house.—Ed. Note.)

What is to be done in such cases as that reported from Martinez, where the Chief of Police says neighbors have offered insults to the Japanese American wife of an American citizen? The woman, born and educated in Martinez, has been returned to her home by the army as a loyal American citizen. Yet, in spite of this unimpeachable endorsement, signs reading "No Japanese wanted" have appeared in windows of houses looking on the apartment where the couple live.

Legal remedy for this sort of outrage does not easily

appear. Yet this thing may happen anywhere, for the species of muckers persons who will do it is to be found here and there. It must be frowned upon by all decent people. We have to remember that it has no limits. If such signs can be paraded to insult citizens of Japanese blood, they can also be set up before citizens of any other origin if some persons happen to be prejudiced against them. If there can be signs saying "No Japanese wanted" there can be others saying "No English" or "No French" or "No Okies." That is the logical extension of this piece of un-Americanism.

Following letter appeared in THE WISCONSIN JOURNAL, Jan. 18. Written by a former Manzanar resident now in Madison, Wisc., it represents the center's appreciation for the gracious help given us.—Ed. Note) Editor, The State Journal:

Many of Madison's residents sent Christmas gifts to the relocation centers for distribution among Japanese Americans at Christmas time. On behalf of these children, I extend my sincere appreciation and thanks.

I received a letter recently which told of Christmas in the Manzanar Relocation Center where I lived for a year and a half. My friend wrote, "If the people could have seen the faces of the children, they would have cried. The gifts enabled them to keep a strong faith in Old 'St. Nick.' Most of them expected to be forgotten. Now they see that Americans on the 'outside' are working and praying for them. And that is the greatest gift that can be offered to anyone."

I know that the spirit of goodwill that traveled across our broad land with the gifts to Manzanar, Calif., is overcoming the disillusionment and frustrations that does exist in the center.

My thanks again for the generosity and tolerance of Madison, not only on behalf of the youngsters but for those of us who are making our homes in Madison we will not forget our Christmas behind barb-wires but through the experiences, strive to become better Americans in a greater America.

To the nation's press, Henry L. Stimson, secretary of war, announced that plans have been completed for the completion for the admission of a substantial number of American citizens of Japanese ancestry into the United States Army.

Project director Ralph P. Merritt was operated on for appendicitis at a Fresno hospital while en route to Manzanar from a project directors meeting in San Francisco attended by four coast relocation center chiefs.

## Seek Experienced Poultry Worker

An experienced poultry man is sought for poultry work at Father Flanagan's Boys Town in Nebraska. Father Flanagan's school for boys is a nationally known Catholic School and is located about ten miles from Omaha. There is a farm near the school which produces food for the school.

## Launch Drive To Denationalize Niseis

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 5—California legislators launched a drive for legislation penalizing "bad actors" of Japanese ancestry recently, stated the Los Angeles Times. Doubt about the validity of these moves to strip hostile Japanese Americans of their citizenship was registered by members of the House Immigration Committee.

Authors of three pending bills were confident that Congress can "denationalize" native-born citizens who refuse to swear allegiance to the United States, but Chairman Dickstein (D.) of New York; and other committee members repeatedly questioned whether such measures can be reconciled with the Constitution, the news article stated.

A measure providing revocation of citizenship upon conviction for "knowingly and intentionally expressing loyalty to a foreign state" has been introduced by Representative Sheppard (D.) of Calif. Representative Johnson of California has suggested creation of a special commission to review the cases of all Japanese Americans and expatriate those who do not demonstrate allegiance to the United States.

The Norrell bill, authorized Representative Norrell (D.) of Arkansas, would direct the President to arrest all Japanese Americans who are unfriendly to this country and calls for special efforts to exchange them for Americans interned or held as war prisoners by Japan, the Times article said.
