Canadian Niseis Refuse Gift of Japanese Foods

TORONTO, Canada, Feb. 5-Under the leadership of the recently formed nisei committee, the substantial Japanese Canadian population of the city has unanpopulation of the city has unanimously declined to take any part in the distribution of Japanese foodstuffs which arrived recently as a gift from the Japanese Red Cross, reported The New Canadian, a British Columbia publication recently.

"Their stand has been adopted as a vigorous gesture," stated the paper, "asking on one hand that the government recognize them as full-fledged citizens entirely divorced from Japan, and at the thought of the property arging. at the other as a protest against Japan's fascist war aims."

The committee spokesman de-plored the government's approv-al on distribution of foodstuffs and stated it was an indication of the government's failure to distinguish between Japanese nationals and Canadian-born cit-items. Citing the example of the United States toward it's citizens of Japanese ancestry he said, "What we need most of all is an expression and action from the

expression and action from the leadership of our country show-ing that our government recog-nizes us as Canadians. That's what Roosevelt has done for the Japanese Americans, and that accounts for the service they are giving their country. giving their country:

War intensifies hatred, one of the primary motive powers for war effort. Hate your enemies! Kill them! These are the battle cries at the war fronts and the urging spirit on our home front. But this spirit in itself is not an orderly motive power. It seeks an immediate outlet and an objective; the evacuees, for instance. Certain individuals and groups have become self-appointed rabble rousers to spearhead this persecution. Its example can be a premonition of the gravest consequence to the future of our country.

Letters received by the Free Press editors regarding our New Year's Day editorial ranged from Mrs. Roosevelt's courteous note on a White House stationery to a pencil-scribbled affair from a malice-ridden Jap-hater in Glendale. The latter variety is but a foretaste of the kind of intemperate and intolerant thinking among certain Americans who would take the Alice-in-Wonderland attitude of "off with their heads" toward the evacuees. Who knows? Next may be the Fillipinos, the Jews, the Negroes, or even the Chinese who might come in disfavor with these intolerant people.

REALISTIC ATTITUDE

We readily concede that the written and spoken outbursts of Nazi Propaganda Chieftain Goebbels often are laughably illogical. Witness, then, this statement issued last week by the Americanism Educational League of Los Angeles: "The League, for more than 18 years a service organization to assist civic groups in patriotic endeavors, with special attention to combatting un-American activities, has called together this group of attorneys to assist in clarification of many legal problems implicit in the Japan-ese question in America." The League stressed the organization's so-called realistic attitude toward the Japanese as contrasted with "emotional attitude." Who, indeed, is betraying emotional attitude?

Then, there is the tremble-chin radio station in Los Angeles which last week decided not to permit the nisei air force gunner-hero from the European battle front to speak over the coast-to-coast network "because of the constant of the work of the coast of the coast of the work of the wo

But there are, thank God, thoughtful-people in America is fighting for." They and our brother soldiers of many racial backgrounds which form an overwhelming majority of the 130,000,000 of us, know that bigotted thinking must be battled and overcome just as surely as victory must be secured in the battlefields.

Having weathered two Japanese war atrocity incidents, according to reports, the relocation evacuees are rapidly becoming inured to fears of retaliations against them by their neighbors. There is no reason to presume that further incidents will not be forthcoming.

The fact that the West citizens are probably more incensed over these atroc-tites than the people in the East is understandable. The East is understandable. The execution of the Tokyo fliers and now the persecution of the Americans at Bataan underscores their impatience over the fact that their government is committeed. ernment is committed to the over-all allied strategy call-ing for prosecution of the over-all allied strategy cau-ing for prosecution of the war -against Germany be-fore tackling the warfare in the Pacific. Any reference to Bataan, morever, is the equivalent of rubbing salt over a wound.

Whether it is wise for the Treasury Department to mount the Fourth War Loan Drive on the coincidental wave of public anger against the atrocities is debatable. This is quite apart from any repercussions against the relocated evacuees. It is sufficient to note that not a few citizens have expressed indignance over the fact that their government felt the public support of the drive by commandeering this incident. This method has been compared to the use of stuffed rabbits on the dograce tracks.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 5 California legislators launched a drive for legislation penalizing 'bad actors" of Japanese ancestry recently, stated the Los Ang-eles Times. Doubt about the validity of these moves to strip hostile Japanese Americans of

their citizenship was registered by members of the House Im-migration Committee. Authors of three pending bills were confident that Congress can "denationalize" native-born cit-"denationalize" native-born cit-izens who refuse to swear alleg-iance to the United States, but Chairman Dickstein (D.) of New York; and other committee mem-

Chairman Dickstein (D.) of New York; and other committee members repeatedly questioned whether such measures can be reconciled with the Constitution, the news article stated.

A measure providing revocation of citizenship upon conviction for "knowingly and intentionally expressing loyalty to a foreign state" has been introduced by Representative Sheppard (D.) Of Callf. Representative Sheppard (D.) Of Callf. Representative Shonson of California has suggested reation of a special commission to review the cases of all Japanese Americans and expatriate those who do not demonstrate allegiance to the United States. The Norreli bill, authorized by Representative Norrell (D.) of Arkansas, would direct the President to arrest all Japanese Americans who are unfriendly to this country and calls for special efforts to exchange them for Americans interned or held as warprisoners by Japan, the Times article said.
