

Expect Hundreds To Attend Local Sunrise Service

Hundreds of local residents are expected to attend the second Easter Sunrise Service to be held at 6 a. m., at the park north of Block 32 Sunday, announced Rev. H. G. Bovenkerk. This will mark the third observance of Easter in Manzanar with Sunrise Service held at Baird's Creek last year. Young men slated for the armed service in the near future will be remembered especially at the service this year. The main purpose of the service is to remind all that the living God will be companion of those who have established homes outside and to those about to face danger in military life, stated Rev. Bovenkerk.

The outdoor morning service will feature the church choir under the leadership of Yoshiteru Murakami. They will be attired in their new choir robes made especially for the occasion by the local garment project. Rounding out the entertainment portion of the program will be a violin solo by Lily Fukuhara and a vocal rendition by baritone Henry Kano.

"There will always be an Easter," will be the topic of the sermon to be given by Rev. Bovenkerk. Slated to make his annual second Easter address is Project Director Ralph P. Merritt.

Plan Recreation Hall For Residents' Use

According to a memorandum issued by Lucy W. Adams, assistant project director in charge of community management, a part of a building in every block, will be reserved for a recreation room, and where possible, this will be in the same barrack as the block manager's office or building 15. The memorandum stated that no persons will be moved for this purpose out of apartments which they now occupy, but if they wish to move, no other family will be moved in so that a space may be reserved for a block recreational center.

The assignment of quarters is delegated to the housing section of the Community Welfare Division which makes all assignments in accordance with general policies regarding amount of space laid down by WRA, and the project director. The present yardstick guiding the assignment of new quarters is to allow one more beam per apartment than there are persons assigned.

Local YMCA Head To Attend Conference

Representing the local YWCA, Mrs. May Ichida, executive secretary, will attend the Central Regional Conference of the YWCA at Chicago.

The conference is scheduled for April 18 to 21 and will be held at the Sherman Hotel. Mrs. Ichida, who will leave Manzanar on April 12, revealed that the theme of the conference will be community problems.

She stated she is expecting to meet Alice Asaka, former general secretary in Manzanar at the conference. She will also attend Helen Ely's wedding on her return trip.

Camp Savage Calls

A telegram received here reported today the immediate need of Japanese Americans, physically and linguistically qualified, for enrollment in the Camp Savage language classes.

"All Manzanar prospects," stated the report, should "write Captain Paul Rusch, director of personnel, Camp Savage, Minnesota at once."

Late Reserve Corps Report Confirmed

Following concerning placement of men in the Enlisted Reserve Corp upon induction into the army was received via teletype this week by Project Director Ralph P. Merritt from National WRA Director Dillon S. Myer.

The teletype read: American citizens of Japanese extradiation are placed in the Enlisted Reserve Corps upon induction for administrative reasons to channel shipments and schedule training. It is not contemplated that they will remain the Enlisted Reserve Corps for any extended period of time.

Issue Allowances

The clothing allowances for the months of January and February have been distributed to Blocks 2 and 3, stated Nob Nanjo, senior clerk of the Clothing Allowance Department. Blocks 4 to 14 will receive their allowances by the end of this week and the remainder of the blocks will be taken care of by the end of this month.

The February grants have arrived and now are being disbursed according to K. Arai of the Community Welfare Division.

Masao Satow Speaks At Panel Discussion

Seal an envelope and help seal the lips of the rabble-rousers, race-baiters, and hate-mongers forever.

That was what Masao Satow, visiting national representative of the YMCA counsel recently told an attentive audience at kitchen 14, during the second in the series of an "America In The Making" panel discussion.

Pointing out that citizens behind barbed wires can seal the doom of narrow-minded propagandists, he greatly emphasized the urgent necessity of backing "those who are sticking out their necks" in behalf of the Japanese Americans.

SEEDS OF HATRED

Assuring the evacuees here that there are still Americans striving to arrest the seeds of hatred implanted by thoughtless propagandist and prejudiced publications, he declared:

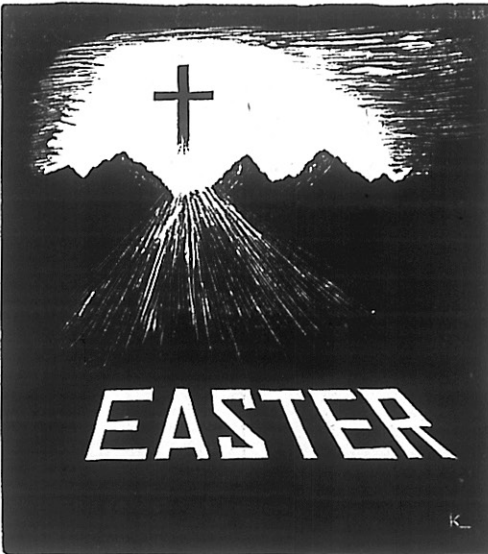
"There are many Caucasian friends on the 'outside' fighting for us, refuting stories of evacuee coddling, trying to present the truth about camp conditions and about the relocation program."

He then revealed the important necessity for immediate letter writing by evacuees to the groups fighting to preserve the rights and privileges of the Japanese Americans.

URGES TO WRITE

"Unless you provide them with information in your letters, they have nothing to fight with. If you don't write, you have no right to 'kick,'" he said. "The trouble with most nisei," he added, "is that they want to pass the buck. They read an article about someone who has gone out of his way to give some nisei a break. But they don't do anything about it. Why not sit down and write that fellow who sticks out his neck a letter?"

His stirring address was concluded by the statement that "your future," meaning the Japanese Americans, is worthy of the efforts put into writing letters.



FOR THE THIRD time since evacuation, evacuees will be granted the sacred honor of greeting the arrival of Easter—the resurrection of Christ.

To the evacuees of Manzanar, it will hold more meaning than the Easters they have spent "outside". It will mean hope: a hope that peace will rise from chaos as Christ arose from his grave: a hope that the barriers of barbed wire and prejudice will be destroyed once and for all.

Wives Of Nisei Soldiers In Camp Eligible For Dependency Benefit

Wives and children of nisei soldiers, as well as parents, brothers, and sisters living in relocation centers, are eligible for servicemen's dependency benefits, it was announced today by Project Director Ralph P. Merritt.

According to advice received from the Office of Dependency Benefits of the War Department, the families of Japanese American soldiers may apply for all dependency benefits provided for under the Servicemen's Dependency Allowance Act of 1942. If the receipts of such benefits reside in relocation centers, no deductions from allowances will be made for subsistence provided by WRA.

Class A dependents, which include wives and children, are eligible for allotments on the basis of dependency and not on actual need. Only proof of marital or parental relationship will be required. Class B dependents, which include parents, grandparents, brothers, and sisters, may receive allotments only in cases where they have been dependent upon the soldier for chief or substantial support. All decisions regarding allotments and allowances including the degree of dependency and the amount to be allotted will be made by the Office of Dependency Benefits in the War Department and not by WRA.

Persons interested in further details should consult the Welfare Section or the local office of the American Red Cross.

Two-Day Festival To Commemorate Birth Of Buddha

"Hana Matsuri" (flower festival), commemorating the 2510th birthday of Lord Buddha, will be sponsored by the local Buddhist church today and tomorrow. The two-day program was officially launched this morning at 9 a. m. with a Ceremonial Mochi Taiki with the help of Sewanis, Fujin Kai and the YBA members. Distribution of mochi will take place at the Sunday morning service.

This afternoon at 2 p. m., 10 YBA representatives led by Rev. S. Nagatomi visited the Manzanar Base Hospital and the Community Hostel at 34-15. Gifts were given to each of the patients in the hospital.

This evening at 7 p. m., an oratorical contest will be held at Auditorium Two under the sponsorship of the YBA. The contest will feature speakers in both English and Japanese with souvenir medals to be presented to each speaker and trophies to be awarded to best speakers in English of each division.

Rounding out the two-day program will be the entertainment program to be held at the outdoor theatre in Block 16. On Sunday at 6:30 p. m. Under the chairmanship of Eizo Masuyama, a 28-performance program featuring musical numbers, Japanese odoris and Kenbu is planned. The public is invited. If the weather is unfavorable, the outdoor theatre program will be held indoor at Auditorium Two, it was announced.

Residents Asked To Aid Red Cross Drive

Community Welfare Counselor Margaret M. D'Ille has announced the appointment of Mae C. Hooper and Toshiko Nakamura, as Senior and Junior Red Cross drive chairmen, respectively; for the term of April 15 to 25 inclusive. The delayed local drive will begin April 15.

The purpose of the Red Cross drive is to give needy assistance to individuals or groups of people, regardless of race, color or creed, or nationality. It gives help in time of war, pestilence, famine, fire, floods and other major and minor calamities.

A Red Cross member of the Manzanar Unit, upon relocation, automatically becomes a member of the American Red Cross Unit of their new community, according to the Red Cross bulletin issued recently.

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Intended For Common Benefits

We have noted that the current "evacuation" of block 16 is bringing about some confusion; both among the residents of that block and among the blocks scheduled to receive them.

We must realize that the block is being vacated for a definite and worthwhile purpose. The Education Department has explained the advantages of grouping the elementary schools. Therefore, in that respect, the block 16 residents are doing a service to the center.

On the other hand, many families in the other blocks had been crowded and had asked for larger apartments. In many instances, applications for moving to a specific apartment had been made months in advance. When a family from block 16 moved into this room, complaints arose.

Both factions may have well founded arguments, but the purpose of the administration's decision in the matter is clear and well defined. The project's course of action was deemed the fairest under the circumstances. Moreover, the Housing Department has given assurance of adequate housing facilities for all. We should strive to overlook minor inconveniences and cooperate with the program intended for our common benefit.

That's Fine

Southern California proudly proclaims that Caucasian, Mexican, Chinese vegetable growers are fully capable of producing fine vegetables. The farmers assert that they do not need the Japanese to grow vegetables in that area and that they won't need us after the war. That's fine. Congratulations. Never mind the fact that we have had words to the contrary from individual Caucasian land owners who have had Japanese till their land and are now having to use farmers of other national extractions.

Now if these self-sufficient Southern Californians would only concede to us the unhampered privilege of resettling in the mid-west and east; if only they would concede the fairness of this proposition to us, we shall be in the Seventh Heaven. What we want of California is that we shall have the legal rights to reside anywhere in our own country, a natural privilege accorded to all citizens and law-abiding aliens. The niseis are fighting in Italy for the preservation of this right.

Anything But Experiment

The War Relocation Authority is not an experiment. The resettlement program is not an experiment. The drafting of the niseis into the armed forces of the United States is not an experiment. The present method of community management, the operations of the social welfare department, the block managers—Town Hall system, is not an experiment.

Critics of the WRA sometimes have referred desparagingly to the centers as a social experiment in the hands of long-haired social workers. But no matter. It is wrong to conceive the operations of the centers involving the lives of 100,000 evacuees as an experiment. The work of the Authority during the past two years is an accomplished fact. Not an experiment.

High Wages Offered In Cleveland Area

Other job offers include those of typists at \$110 to \$125 monthly; stenographers at \$115 to \$140 per month; bookkeepers at \$130 to \$150 monthly; telephone operators at \$120 a month; legal stenographer at \$130 monthly and male stenographers at \$163.08.

Letters from the Public

(The following letter was sent to Miss W. B. Ernest, of York Beach, Me. by her brother who is in the Army camp in Utah and was published recently in the New York PM—Ed. Note.)

Don't worry about us fellows because we are going to do our best in everything we do. There's quite a number of Caucasian

outfits stationed here; but my infantry (Japanese-Americans) has them all beat. We made the best scores in the recent tests. Right now the whole outfit is training awfully hard. They're never in camp because they have to go out in the bivouac area for various military problems. Last week they went through live machine-gun fire with dynamite blowing up all around them. This week they had to eat and sleep in a foxhole for about four days. When the company goes out they close the mess hall so we recruits have to eat at some other mess hall.

I'm going into my sixth week of basic and it's getting tougher every week. I belong to the 11th platoon, which is the latest platoon to be organized. There's always some soldier coming in. Most of them are drafted from back East.

Some of us might never see our folks again, but we are willing to take a chance. It's a darn good gamble if we come out the way we want to.

You can just about understand how proud I am to serve in the Japanese - American Combat Team. A month ago I saw a newsreel which showed the Japanese-Americans of the 1st Infantry fighting over in Italy. All of us fellows whistled and cheered because we were so proud of the fine record they are making.

Supreme Court To Review Nisei Case

(The following article was contained in this month's issue of the American Civil Liberties Union publication in regard to the now-famous Korematsu curfew case.—Ed. Note.)

FLASH—The Supreme Court of the United States on March 27 granted a petition for a writ of certiorari to the Circuit Court of Appeals in the Korematsu case thus, in effect, agreeing to review the entire question of the Military's exclusion of Japanese from the Pacific Coast. The Circuit Court, in turning down Korematsu's appeal, had argued that the matter was disposed of by the Supreme Court's decision in the Hirabayashi case upholding the curfew, and the government had echoed that argument in opposing the petition in the Supreme Court.

FORMA PAUPERIS

In addition to granting review, the Supreme Court also permitted the case to be prosecuted in forma pauperis, that is, without the payment of court costs. In all likelihood, arguments on the case will be heard around the 1st day of May, after briefs have been filed. Unless the case is argued at that time it will not be heard until next October. ACLU Attorney Wayne M. Collins of San Francisco will argue the case for Korematsu.

The United States Supreme Court is now considering a petition filed by the Northern California branch of the ACLU in behalf of Fred T. Korematsu, urging that Court to consider the latter's appeal from a judgment of conviction for remaining on the Pacific Coast in violation of the order of General DeWitt excluding all Japanese from the area.

MEMORANDUM

During the past month the Department of Justice filed with the Supreme Court a memorandum opposing Korematsu's petition, contending that the issue of exclusion has already been decided by the Court in passing on the curfew question in the Hirabayashi case. The Government also denied that the detention question is properly an issue in the Korematsu case. "If the Court should regard the Hirabayashi decision as not dispositive of the present case," said the brief "or should, contrary to our position, deem the validity of the detention of other persons of Japanese ancestry in war relocation centers to be properly in issue here, the case would present Federal questions of importance and the Government would recognize the propriety of further review."

ENDO CASE

In the meantime, the Government has filed in the Circuit Court of Appeals in San Francisco its opposing brief in the Endo case, which challenges the Government's detention of citizens of Japanese ancestry in concentration camps. The brief contends that Miss Endo's petition cannot be heard until she exhausts her administrative remedy, despite the fact that regulations providing for release did not be-

Currently, both teams have entered the Denver Tournament, which will be held in a few weeks. Other teams entered in the Denver classic are; San Kwo Low Bears, San Jose Zebra from Mt. Mountain, and the Chicago Y's.

It is regrettable to note that as yet, no team has been recognized as the team to receive any award for sportsmanship displayed on the diamond for the past baseball season. Surely there must be one team who has showed the stuff they're made of to merit such an award. Can some organization here do something?

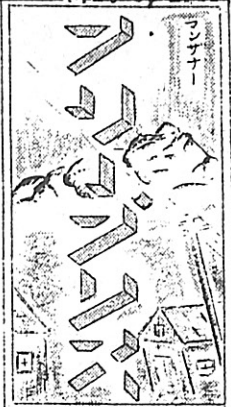


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Local Zone Postal Rates to Manzanar

同じ雑田丸に一老米婦人が胃癌を患つてゐるのを自分の手許へ引き取り、自費で病院に入水、臨終の枕辺で夜明しした一日本人の事を聞いて、日本人が如何に温い人情を持つてゐるかを知り、非常に感激した。猶此の日本人の事は老米婦人の死後二週間して逝去したさうである。

◎大阪市護政不テル
二月三日自介は大阪へ連行されることになり、二人の私服刑事に護衛され、汽車の中でアメリカ人に注目する者は人もなく乗客が自分を覚えて知らぬ顔をしてゐるのに、敵国人と

して人々の注意を惹くと期待してゐた自分は、少からず意外に感じた。大阪駅に着くと、大きなガードが一台待つてゐた。此のガードに乗り、梅田新道を通過し、護政不テルへ着き、茶菓子の饗應にあづかり、一室を手へられた。又配人が来て、二三時間後に取調べがあるから、それまで休憩しなさいと言ふので、二三時間眠つた。それから色々取調べが始つたが、此の調は三月二八日迄、毎日五、六時間続いた。調査人は三名ゐて交代に調べた。同不テルには他に米人が五名ゐるが皆に監視人が付いてゐるらしく、客が多

数出入し依然として營業を續けてゐた。
◎神戸市イースター
三月二八日自分は又神戸へ運れてゆかれた。神戸には牧客所が二つあり、その一つに入り、此では暇があつたので同室の者と相談して、各自知つておち語舌の交換赦免をする事にして、毎朝早朝より勉強を始めた。自分達の勉強振りを聞いた赤十字社長島津侯爵は、態々訪問して種々便宜を計つてくれた。神戸にゐる時五、六面白い事件を聞いた。日本が

捕へた俘虜は皆普通寺へ收容した。その俘虜の中に姓婦が一人ゐたので、その女と他に五名の看護婦達は普通寺から神戸のホテルに移された。子供が生れて、新聞記者が訪れ親子二人の写真を撮つた。その写真は、珍しい俘虜と云ふ記事と一緒に日本全国の新聞紙上に掲載された。数日過ぎたから、此の小さい俘虜のホテルへは、新しい贈物が殺到した。此等贈物は主に赤十字の着物であつた。山積した贈物を前にした母親はその処分方に困り、遂に蓄れると云ふ始末であつたが、監視の巡査に依頼した処、巡査は本署との相談の結果、出征兵士の遺族のほれた子供に分配する事になつた。

神戸にゐる時交換船が出る時と云ふ事がある。しかし微共通鈴者には交換されないといふので、デマが飛んで自分は帰れないと思つたが、交換名簿が発表された。その中に自分の名前を見出した時の喜びは、今に忘れ得ない。発表当日の晩は交換される者も、それない者も眠れない程であつた。愈々交換の日取りも決り、吾々は清州国朝鮮から来た人々と一緒に汽車に乗り、横浜へ行き、交換船へ乗り込んできた。交換船浅間丸は横浜を被錨したが、東京湾の奥の方に向つて行き、暫くして投錨して二日はかり動かす。漸く動き出したが、思ふより又横浜へ入港してしまつた。乗客達は様々な感測をして、デマを飛ばし、交換が取消されたのかと心配した。遂に浅間丸は太平洋へ乗出し、台湾洋を通過し、香港、昭南へ到着し、帰つて来た。

用戦以来日本国内居住中の敵国外人中或る者は拘留され、他は依然として自由な生活をしてゐた。二世に就いては多くを知らぬ。然大部分はそのまゝ日本人として待遇を受け、要職に雇傭されてゐる。採であるが特殊の者は拘束されたといはれる。
