WALTER A. HEATH RETURNS FROM MEET

Returning Friday after touring the eastern states for seven weeks, Assistant Relocation Program Officer Walter A. Heath related the accounts of his trip Saturday in an address to the block managers at Town Hall.

Heath said that his first stop was in Washington where he remained for a month to review dockets of leave clearances of the various centers. He said that practically all leave clearances were "cleaned up" with the exception for those who professed loyalty to Japan.

Nisei in Washington have adjusted themselves and are happy there, according to Heath. He disclosed that some Japanese there are supervisors, some private secretaries and in Chicago some even in musical comedies.

Chicago MEETING

From Washington, the assistant relocation program officer went to Chicago where representatives from every center, with the exception of Tule Lake, and representatives from leading cities in the east, mid-west and south gathered for a five-day relocation meet.

TO AID RESETTLERS

"Our job was only to find out how we could better help the people to relocate and to further help those who have already relocated," Heath said.

Heath revealed that Washington is a "swell" place for young office workers to go and said that practice.

REMOVE 'TROUBLE MAKERS' FROM TULE LAKE PROJECT

WASHINGTON, May 3--Secretary of Interior Harold L. Ickes said last week that about 100 Japanese-American "trouble makers" will soon be removed from the Tule Lake segregation center after having been confined in a stockade since disturbances there last November.

The men, the majority of whom are American citizens, will be sent about May 15 to the newly-reopened Leupp center near Winslow, Ariz., Ickes said. The center will be administered by Ray R. Best, director of the Tule Lake project and is being reopened specifically for "agitators" or "trouble makers" at Tule Lake.

LA GUARDIA PROTESTS

NEW YORK, May 3--Mayor F. H. La Guardia has filed a protest with army and navy officials and federal authorities against transfer of Japanese Americans from the west to eastern cities.

WASHINGTON, May 3--Interior Secretary Ickes last week accused Mayor F. H. La Guardia of "racial discrimination" on the question of resettlement of Japanese Americans.

In a statement the interior secretary said they have expressed a belief that law-abiding Japanese in this country are not entitled to the same privileges as non-Japanese, and said these opinions "seem ominously out of tune in a nation that is fighting for the principles of democracy and freedom."

SOLICITORS ARRESTED

SAN FRANCISCO, May 3-- Three persons were free on bail last week following their arraignment in Municipal Court on charges of conducting a house-to-house campaign, soliciting funds to "have all Japs in the United States confined in prison camp."

Police, checking on complaints of housewives, took the trio into custody when they failed to show a solicitor's license and could give no accounting of the funds they assertedly collected.

ILLINOIS GETS WFA AID

CHICAGO, Ill.--(Special) May 3--With the arrival recently at the farm of A. Schraeder near Des Plaines, Ill., of five resettlers, the first group of seasonal workers under a WFA contract arrived in the North Central area. Mr. Schraeder owns and operates a 190-acre truck farm and raises principally, cabbage and carrots. Because he was so favorably impressed in the 1943 season with the work of the four Japanese Americans whom he employed, Schraeder has increased his acreage for the 1944 season, has purchased additional equipment including a new tractor, and will employ a total of 15 resettlers under seasonal contract this year.

Heath also revealed that there may be a chance in the near future to open the south, which includes Texas, Oklahoma and everywhere south of the Missouri and along the Gulf Coast, to the Japanese. He said that numerous farm jobs are available there the year-round and irrigation farming.

Fistere, newly appointed relocation supervisor for the area.
