## Relocation Grant

Doubt and-misunderstanding are airecting persons who have received notices to appear for their proinduction physical examination as to the possibipity of receiving a relcation grant, revealed Assistant Relocation Program Officer Walter A. Heath.
"The relocation policy is to approve grants for person applying for indefinite leave even if they have had their pre-induction physical examination," Heath declared.
"However, persons who have taken the Arming induction oath and who are in the Enlisted Reserve Corp are not eligible for a re'Yocation grant. Only persons volunteering for inmediate induction attain this status," he said.

The Leupp Genter is being reopened to take care of those evacuees of Japanese ancestry who have been agitators or troublemakers at the Tule Lake Segregation Center in northern California. It will be operated under administration of Tule Lake Project Divector Ray R. Best.

The Leupp center was opened as an isolation unit under the Var Relocation Authority on Aprill 27, 1943, and was closed on December 2 , when its inmates were transferred to the Tule Lake Center, which had meanwhile become the segre. gation center.

"We, and other Japanese parents who have sons in the anmed forces, will do our share for the United States."
