Heath Clarifies Relocation Grant

Doubt and misunderstanding are affecting persons who have received notices to appear for their preinduction physical examination as to the possibility of receiving a relocation grant, revealed Assistant Relocation Program Officer Walter A.

"The relocation policy is to approve grants for person applying for indefinite leave even if they have had their pre-induction physical examination," Heath declared.

"However, persons who have taken the Army induction oath and who are in the Enlisted Reserve Corp are not eligible for a refocation grant. Only persons volunteering for immediate induction attain this status," he said.

VISITOR IMPRESSED BY "B LAUTIFUL STTING"

Ralph Stauber of the Washington Statistical Departnent left Saturday after a briaf visit here, according to Project Director Ralph P. Merritt.

During his two day visit here, Stauber declared that he was much impressed by Manzamar's "beautiful setting."

Stauber is connected with the State Department, the Spanish Embassy and the Department of Justice in that his role is to aid in getting aliens into the relocation centers as soon as they are cleared at hearings which are held in the various detention camps.

TO OPEN LEUPP

Plans of the War Relocation Authority to reopen the Loupp Center near Winslow, Arizona about May 15 were announced today by Secretary of the Interior Harold L. Ickes. The Leupp Center is being reopened to take care of those evacuees of Japanese ancestry who have been agitators or troublemakers at the Tule Lake Segregation Center in northern California. It will be operated under administration of Tule Lake Project Director Ray R. Best.

The Leupp center was opened as an isolation unit under the War Relocation Authority on April 27, 1943, and was closed on December 2, when its inmates were transferred to the Tule Lake Center, which had meanwhile become the segregation center.
