MANZANAR CENTER CITIZENS JOIN NET PROJECT EN MASSE

With the success of the vital camouflage project at stake, Manzanar rolled up its sleeves and prepared to pitch in. At an emergency meeting of the block leaders yesterday, E.L. Stancliff, Manager of the Industrial Division of the WRA, stressed that the other contemplated industrial projects hinge on the success of the net garnishing venture.

RELIEVE NISEI

In order to free manpower to work on this project which is limited to American citizens, seventy odd departments will be requested to spare their staffs down to the bone and substitute issei for nisei wherever possible. SIX MONTH'S WORK

The camouflage production as planned calls for the garnishing of 225,000 nets, with the work being divided between Santa Anita and Manzanar. Although Santa Anita experienced a slight delay in the beginning, production is now reaching full capacity. This center's share will utilize 1000 workers eventually and will take six months to complete. JOB PRIORITY

Those nisei who leave their present jobs to work in the defense projects will receive job priority or reinstatements when the camouflage work is completed. Many special considerations will be given, including transportation to and from work.

SKILLED RATING

Capt. Wallendorf of the West Defense Command, accompanying Stancliff, stated that these workers will be given a skilled rating, in all likelihood. A merit system based on efficiency was being contemplated.

BANK OF AMERICA OPENS HERE

Banking services for Manzanar will be offered through the Bank of America, which will open a branch in Blk. 21 near the canteen. Beginning next Tuesday, June 23, the local bank will be open every Tuesday between the hours of 9 a.m. and 4 p.m.

Only limited banking facilities will be available on the opening day as C.S. McArthur, manager of the Lone Pine Bank of America, will be present to discuss banking problems primarily.

WCCA WAGES COMING SOON

Wages for the past three months will be issued possibly the beginning of next week, according to statements from F.H. Kinchloe of the Accounting Office. Checks will arrive approximately every week for the next three weeks with the March wages to be issued first and will be distributed according to the \$8, \$12, and \$16 wage scale announced earlier by the WCCA.

Kinchloe estimated the total payroll for March will be about \$1000 for the 644 workers who arrived on the 23rd of March. Monthly wages are determined from the first of each month and it was estimated that in April pay checks totaled \$15,000 with approximately 1500 workers. Pay check totals were not known for May but approximately 3000 were employed.

WHEREAS: Our well-being is promoted by the work that we do, and


WHEREAS: The government of the United States has given us the opportunity to actively participate in the war effort by the establishment of the camouflage net project, and

Center population increased as 11 internees from Montana arrived here yesterday morning to re-join families.

WHERE DO WE STAND?

We, American citizens of Japanese ancestry, are truly destiny's children. We have been placed in centers because our loyalty was tacitly questioned, because we, as a united group, did not take a firm stand regarding the war. The time has come to show what stuff we are made of.

Recently Manzanar was selected as one of the centers to garnish camouflage nets. Seven hundred men and women were required, but only a few have volunteered so far.

There were reasons. People had not yet received wages for past work and morale was low. Working conditions were not favorable. And available citizens were already employed and aliens were not allowed in war industries.

These problems have been faced realistically. We have the army's word that conditions will be improved even more. Many departments that are over staffed will be whittled down to the minimum. Wherever possible, issei will replace nisei.

The camouflage net production is our test. If this project fails, it means that the army and the WRA will be reluctant to start other industries. It is through the profits of these other industries that we can raise our wage scale!!

The national emergency demands great sacrifices from every American. By our active participation in defense projects, we must prove our unquestioned loyalty. Our failure now would be capitalized by demagogues who are trying to deprive us of our birthright. We must pull ourselves up by the bootstraps.

Many of our rights as free men have been encroached upon, but we must make this sacrifice to preserve and strengthen the national morale. Manzanar has been designated as our own particular front. Let us fight as willingly and as courageously as the soldiers in McArthur's valiant band.

And in the years to come, let no one deny us the rights and privileges of free Americans. Our future lies in our hands. Let us pitch in now and work!

PLATTER PARADE DUE SUNDAY

Swing fans should turn out en masse for this Sunday's "Evening Under the Stars" recorded program as popular music by the leading swing bands will be featured. The popular concert, which will feature music by the bands of Glenn Miller, Harry James and Tommy Dorsey, will be held from 8:30 p.m. in the firebreak between Blks. 10 and 11.

CALL RELATIVES BY APPLICATION

Residents may still file applications to call their relatives to Manzanar from other centers, announced the Community Service division today.

Because of limited transportation and housing facilities, however, only immediate families will be able to come here. Applications may be filed at any time through the information office.

ELECTIONS FOR FIVE BLOCK LEADERS MONDAY

Manzanar's first democratic election will take place this Friday when residents of five new blocks meet to nominate candidates for block leaders. Final election will take place on Monday.

Breaking away from the old method of final selection by the administration, the people of Blks. 19, 25, 26, 27 and 30 will cast their ballots on Monday at their polling stations. The candidates receiving the highest votes will automatically be named the block leader.

Wholehearted endorsement of this democratic procedure was given by administration officials. A special election board of five block leaders composed of Fred Ogura, Ted Akahoshi, Harry Nakamura, Tom Yamasaki and Genji Yamaguchi will organize and supervise the election in the new blocks.

All interested are asked to turn in applications at personnel office, 1-2-1.

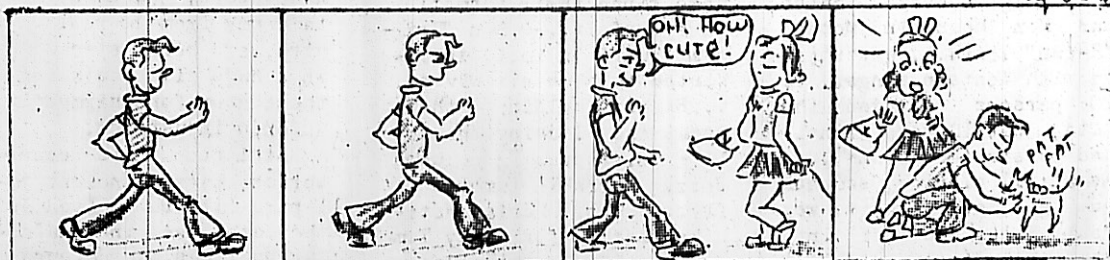
VACATE 1-1 HOMES
