

NATIONAL USO ACKNOWLEDGES LOCAL UNIT

Speaking before the block managers assembly, Friday morning, at Town Hall, Mrs. Margaret D'Ille, community welfare counselor, revealed that Manzanar's USO has been recognized by the National USO office and is therefore the first center to be acknowledged by this organization.

HOSTESSES

The USO will be located at 19-15 and its secretary-hostesses will be Mesdames Mickey Funn and Mary Shim, she declared. The counselor also disclosed that USO stationery as well as magazines will be provided the soldiers.

Tonight from seven to ten, the USO will hold its first party in honor of servicemen, according to Mrs. D'Ille. Invited to this affair will be veterans and residents who have had their pre-induction physicals, she said.

PROGRAM

The program will consist of greetings by Mrs. Lucy Adams, introduction of the USO committee, songs by Lillian Wakatsuki, Mary Kageyama and Henry Kano, tap dancing by Kay Ono, selections from "Loud and Clear" by Louis Frizzel and the Jive Bombers. Master of ceremony will be Henry Tsurutani.

NEW HOSTEL DISPUTED BY BROOKLYN RESIDENTS
NEW YORK, N.Y., May 31—Police maintained a 24-hour guard over the new Brooklyn hostel and its three Japanese American evacuees as neighbors protested to officials against establishment of the hostel, the first of its kind in the Metropolitan area, according to the Utah Jippo.

Dr. E. Chandler Mahan, an opponent of the project, said 300 postcards objecting to the hostel had been signed by Brooklyn residents and sent to Mayor F. E. La Guardia.

Another 200, he said, had been sent to Dillon S. Myer, director of the war relocation authority in Washington.

TULE LAKE NISEI DIES FROM BULLET WOUND

TULE LAKE—Shoichi James Okamoto, 30, American-born Japanese, died this week from bullet wounds inflicted by a military police sentry.

Okamoto, a native of Garden Grove, Calif., was shot at the main gate of the center when he stepped off his truck.

Harold Ickes, secretary of the interior told a press conference that as far as he had been able to learn, Okamoto was not armed and made no threatening gesture. He said he was confident that "the Army will get the facts and take whatever action

1. FIRST METHODIST CHURCH DEFENDS NISEI RIGHTS

First Methodist Church of Santa Maria, Calif., devoted three full pages of its April 30 paper to the Japanese American problem in the United States.

Commenting favorably on the nisei problem, the paper quoted excerpts from Secretary of Interior Harold Ickes and an article which appeared recently in the Fortune Magazine.

The paper emphasized: "Keep the issue clear! People born in America, educated in America, entitled to every right under our constitution, irrespective of ancestry!"

It also asked, "When is a Jap not a Jap?" and replied, "When he is an American!"

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* GOLD STARS COMING *

Yesterday marked the day especially poignant to those who have lost father, son, or brother in this war. When we stop to realize that the war dead honored by memorial services on that day included many nisei, the closeness of the war is brought sharply to us.

With the 442nd infantry group gone to the fronts, the casualty list will include many of our nisei sons and brothers. Furthermore, with a steady induction of Japanese Americans into the armed forces, we may expect an increasing number of nisei casualties.

The war has finally reached us. We had sat back passively within the centers for the past two years complaining and bickering of minor things in life, but now the full meaning of a nation at war will be brought to many of us suddenly and tragically with news of the death of a neighbor, friend, or of a member of the immediate family.

TO DISTRIBUTE "OUR WORLD" SOON

Anticipating the arrival of the Manzanar High School annual, "Our World," the staff announced that distribution of non-school purchasers will take place all day Saturday.

Residents who have made their down payment are asked to have the balance of fifty cents ready at this time. Students of the High School will start to canvass the blocks at nine Saturday morning. The first group of blocks to be visited will be 1 to 12.

APPROXIMATE TIME

At approximately 10 o'clock the staff will call on purchasers living in blocks 13 to 24. Immediately after lunch, blocks 25 to 36 will be covered. It is hoped that the residents will be at home during these hours so that they may pay for and receive their books at this time.

FURLOUGH WORKERS

Those persons who have members of their family on furlough and who have made their down payment should arrange to complete the

purchase.

Salesmen will not call back after Saturday. Residents who will not be at home will be asked to call at the Annual office, 7-11-2, during school hours the following week.

After June 9 the books still not called for will be sold to the general public. Down payment on uncalled for books will be forfeited.

FARM OPPORTUNITIES FOR OLDER EVAGUEES

"H. K. Ozawa, former block 26 manager, who has now relocated, writes that he is impressed with farm opportunities as opposed to city employment particularly for older people", stated Walter Heath of the Relocation Office.

From Chicago, Mr. Ozawa writes that he is looking forward to seeing a friend from Houston, Tex., from whom he hopes to gain a great deal of information about Southern farms. Ozawa also plans to go through the South himself, if present plans materialize, according to Heath.

125 JAPANESE ARRIVE AT TULE LAKE CENTER

TULE LAKE, May 31--An additional 125 Japanese internees, from the Heart Mountain relocation center, Wyoming, arrived at the Tule Lake segregation center last week.

ORCHESTRA PLANS VISIT TO CAMP SHELBY

CAMP SHELBY, Miss.--Negotiations are now underway for a visit of Ray Kinney and his orchestra to Camp Shelby, following Kinney's dedication of an all-Hawaiian musical program to the 442nd infantry combat team, many of whose members are from Hawaii, the Pacific Citizen revealed.

Kinney's orchestra is now playing in the Blue Room of the Hotel Roosevelt in New Orleans.

It was noted that the five lovely native "Hawaiian Hula Maidens" who are featured with Kinney's orchestra were classmates of some of the men in the first battalion of the 442nd combat team.

MANUFACTURING CONCERN SEEKS NISEI WORKERS.

Noriyuki Masuda, who recently returned from Chicago to await army induction, announced that the manufacturing company for whom he worked in Chicago is seeking additional issei and nisei employees. Seventy-five per cent of the company's employees are already of Japanese ancestry, Relocation Program Officer Walter A. Heath disclosed.

Masuda states that seven or eight issei are already employed and are getting along nicely although some do not speak English.

Weekly earnings range up to \$80 or more per week with beginners about to make \$60 to \$65 per week, if they find work on a shift allowing overtime. Many persons work even on Sundays, Masuda stated.

The facts will speak for themselves. Groups such as yours can play an important part in promoting general knowledge and goodwill."

This was the statement made by Masao Satow, field member of the national YMCA program staff, in his talk before the Milwaukee Relocation Advisory Committee recently at the City Club.

Satow spoke also before two other groups while in the city. At one, he told the resettlers of their responsibilities in community integration at a meeting held in the Immanuel Presbyterian Church. At the other, he talked briefly on relocation before the Ministerial Association at the YMCA.

should supply new brooms and mops once every six months.

3. Whereas, the WRA policy is to pay clothing allowance to only those families whose members are employed, or to those unemployed, who make monthly application for same, we feel that WRA should pay clothing allowance to everyone, regardless of employment or whether a person makes an application or not.

4. Whereas, the Manzanar Cooperative Enterprise is forced to pay clothing allowance of its employees, the WRA should pay the clothing allowance of all evacuees in the center.

5. Whereas, many Japanese nationals have lost properties and belongings through inadequate WRA personnel and facilities, a request for honest effort to increase the personnel so that forceful and immediate actions can be taken to adequately protect the property interest of the Japanese nationals.

6. Whereas, the evacuee doctors, registered nurses and dentists at the hospital are being paid the prevailing WRA wage scale, and whereas they are fully licensed doctors, it be requested that Civil Service rating be made appli-

RESETTLED BY WRA
TO UNRESTRICTED AREAS

WASHINGTON--The war relocation authority reported that a bout 22,000 Japanese Americans have been established in various parts of the country, away from the Pacific Coast, since the war started, the Sacramento Union revealed recently.

Illinois has absorbed the greatest number of them. About 3000 have found homes in that state, chiefly in the Chicago area. Approximately half that number are living in Colorado. Utah and Ohio each has about 1700, followed closely by Michigan. Idaho has about 1000
