

# Answers On Selective Service Issued By Washington, D. C.

(The following questions have been sent from relocation centers to the Washington office of WRA, and the answers have been provided by the national office of selective service, the War Department, or by WRA depending upon the branch of government having jurisdiction.—Editor)

1. Q. Must a nisei man, who previously registered with a West Coast selective service board, register again if he relocates outside a center?  
A. No. All men, however, must keep their draft boards informed of each change of address.
2. Q. Will a nisei who applies for expatriation be exempted from military service?  
A. No. An application for expatriation does not cancel the rights or responsibilities of an American citizen.
3. Q. Are nisei who were discharged from the army at the convenience of the government subject to re-induction?  
A. Yes, if otherwise qualified for service.
4. Q. Will the fact that nisei are in relocation centers have any effect on their eligibility for classification of 3-D, or will they be considered on the same basis as those outside?  
A. No registrant is classified in class 3-D unless there is ample proof that his induction would result in extreme hardship and privation for his dependents. Selective service officials have declared that the subsistence provided for all families in relocation centers would minimize, if not entirely obviate, any real hardship on the part of any dependent of a registrant.
5. Q. Are wives, children and other dependents of nisei servicemen eligible for allotments under the Servicemen's Dependents Allowance Act of 1942?  
A. Yes. Full information may be obtained at the project Welfare Section.
6. Q. Will Japanese aliens be inducted into the army?  
A. Under present regulations no Japanese nationals may volunteer or be drafted into the armed forces.

## Domestic Worker Urged To Register

Effective this month, evacuee residents shall not perform domestic services for members of the appointed personnel staff or for other evacuees, except when they are assigned to perform these duties through the cooperative enterprises, according to a new WRA regulation from Washington.

Domestic employees will be divided into \$15 and \$19 rate classifications. The \$19 rate will be given to persons caring for children, preparing dinners and performing other duties. A \$16 rate will apply to other classifications concerned chiefly in cleaning the apartments.

The ruling declares that the cost to the appointed personnel for an evacuee rated at the \$19 scale will be \$38 per month for full time help, while a \$16 worker shall cause an appointed personnel to pay \$36 a month for full time work.

Persons may be employed for part-time work or in fits of one half a day. The rate, to the appointed personnel, for half a day unit of employment will be 75 cents for a \$16 rated employee and 80 cents for a \$19 rated employee.

The cooperative will carry the workmen's compensation insurance on domestic workers. All persons who desire to work as domestics should register at the business enterprises office, 1-6-4, to make their desire known.

## Dr. Carter Reveals School Statistics

"Manzanar has lost nearly one-fourth of its school population and must, therefore, decrease its teaching staff accordingly," stated Dr. Genevieve Carter, superintendent of education, in reply to rumors circulating in Manzanar that teachers are leaving this center.

Although seven teachers have married servicemen during the past year and salaries for teachers in other California schools are higher than that in Manzanar, Dr. Carter said that Manzanar "has been fortunate to keep a full teaching staff."

Suffering a heavier teacher shortage than the local school areas in Bishop, Lone Pine and Independence, she revealed.

Dr. Carter further added that while "the high school is quite certain of having a full staff, the same cannot be applied to the elementary school. Because of the elementary teacher shortage, Manzanar like other communities may have difficulty in recruiting sufficient elementary teachers."

## Nine Held In Tule On Coercion Charge

TULE LAKE—War relocation authority announced this week that nine Japanese men were being held in the isolation area of Tule Lake Segregation Center on charges of intimidating several Japanese families who refused to send their children to Japanese language schools in the camp, the Sacramento Union declared.

The paper disclosed that at least two families had been told to move from a block in which they were living because their children were attending the center's schools instead of the Japanese language schools.

Project Director Ray R. Best declared that he will not tolerate any interference with the rights of resident parents to send their children to any school they desire.

## Reveal Statistics On Relocation Program

Twenty-five per cent of Manzanar's original population, who are eligible for relocation, have now left the center either on permanent relocation or on seasonal leave, according to Walter A. Heath, assistant relocation program officer.

Heath revealed that this figure was first achieved during the week of May 22 and that a total of 207 residents were out of the center. Out of this number, 1529 were on permanent relocation and 558 were on seasonal leave.

Statistics also provide figures showing the percentage of relocates from each division in the center. Based on their employment as of February 28, 1944, the relocation division headed the list with 153 per cent of its employees out on indefinite leave, which percentage was probably achieved through its employees observing the total number of persons re-establishing themselves. Other divisions in the center which had a high percentage of their employees relocating were Education with 94 per cent, Personnel Management with 95 per cent, and Motor Transport and Maintenance with 79 per cent.

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## Tell Price Changes

Beginning this month, all the photo prices will be increased slightly and orders limited due to an increase in the prices of materials, according to Sokichi Sugimoto, general manager of the cooperative enterprises.

The following price list is now in effect: 3 x 4 1/2, \$2 per dozen (limited); 4 x 6, \$3.50 per dozen (limited); 5 x 7, \$5 per dozen (limited); 8 x 10 wedding pictures, \$10 per dozen (a limit of one dozen per negative); 8 x 10 funeral pictures \$9 (a limit of one dozen to each negative); 8 x 10 club or group pictures, 65 cents per print (unlimited); 5 x 7 club or group pictures, 30 cents per print (unlimited); 8 x 10 enlargements, 75 cents per print (limited to one dozen); 5 x 7 enlargements, 35 cents per print (limited to a dozen); and 11 x 14 enlargements, \$1.50 per print (limited to one dozen).

## Operetta Scheduled At New Auditorium

Opening program in Manzanar's new community auditorium will be the high school operetta "Loud and Clear" under the direction of Louis Frizzell, high school music instructor, announced Dr. Genevieve W. Carter, superintendent of education. This will be given Friday evening, June 16 at 8 p.m. For the benefit of smaller children a matinee performance will take place on the previous day.

Rehearsals for the operetta, which was written by Frizzell, have been underway for some time, she revealed. She said that the program will be different from any other Manzanar has had and that it is hoped it will be fitting as the initial activity in the new auditorium. Details concerning the operetta will appear in a later issue of the Free Press.

## To Exhibit Sketches Of Former Resident

A portfolio of 50 pencil sketches, depicting typical scenes at relocation centers will be exhibited at 8-15 during the next two weeks, announced the Cooperative Enterprises.

Produced by Henry Fukuhara, former Manzanar resident, this series of drawings captures the spirit of isolation and loneliness of relocation centers and the conditions under which evacuees have been living for two years, the Co-op said.

Before evacuation, Fukuhara was a landscape gardener by profession; art was merely his hobby. While at Manzanar, however he devoted much of his spare time to sketching interesting scenes, and later made sketches of other centers either from observation or from photographs.

"The new folio contains the 'best examples' of Mr. Fukuhara's work," according to the Co-op. The artist is now in New York where he is working on a book of his experiences, to be published by John Day Company. Collaborating with him is Miss Rackham Holt, author of "An American Doctor's Odyssey," and "The Life Of George Washington Carver." Pearl Buck, distinguished American novelist and authority on the Far East, will write the introduction to the book.

"Residents desiring this portfolio may place their orders with K. Tsuchiya at 8-15," the Co-op declared.

# New Regulations Permit Vacation Leaves With Pay

Through new regulations received recently from Washington, all regular assigned full and part-time workers are entitled to vacation leave at the rate of one day for each calendar month, or 12 working days per calendar year.

Although these regulations are being released at the present time, they are retroactive as of January 1, 1944, the regulations revealed.

## YWCA Conference Starts This Week

Manzanar's YWCA conference got underway this week with the arrival of Mrs. William H. Chambers, secretary of the Japanese evacuee project YWCA national board, according to Mrs. Margaret M. D'ille.

She revealed that the conference began Thursday morning when Mrs. Chambers met with Project Director Ralph P. Merritt, Assistant Project Director in Charge of Community Management Mrs. Lucy Adams, Community Welfare Counselor Mrs. Margaret D'ille and Assistant Relocation Program Officer Walter A. Heath. In the afternoon, Mrs. Chambers visited the local high school and spoke to a youth group at mess hall 7. At 6:30 p.m., she met with the board and staff members of the YWCA.

## TOURS CAMP

Yesterday morning, the secretary made a tour of the camp with Mesdames Merritt and Matsumoto as her hostesses. A luncheon was had at the Children's Village. Toward noon, Mrs. Chambers visited the hospital, the hotel and the visual education. At 7:30 p.m., she met with Professional and Business Club girls and discussed "Girls In Business And What They Face In Wartime America."

This morning, Mrs. Chambers had private interviews with advisors and board members. In the afternoon, she met with a mixed group for a tea at the village which was sponsored by the Junior Matrons. She will meet with the Girls' Reserves this evening for a picnic-supper at Baird's Creek.

The secretary will attend the Protestant Church tomorrow morning, 10 a.m. and will summarize the work of the Manzanar YWCA at a board meeting in the evening.

## Local Graduation Slated Here Soon

Commencement exercises for Manzanar-High School are scheduled for the general Sunday evening, June 18 at 8 p.m. in the new auditorium, according to announcement from Dr. Genevieve W. Carter, superintendent of education. Professor Cecil Dunne of Occidental College will be the commencement speaker. Music is under the direction of the high school music department.

Members of this year's class, numbering 181, will qualify for one of three types of diplomas. They are the college entrance diploma, commercial diploma and the general diploma depending on the course of study they pursued. The class will wear caps and gowns, the girls white and the boys blue, the announcement revealed.

It also disclosed that residents of Manzanar will be invited to the program. Approximately 1500 seats will be available.

## LEAVES SHOULD BE LIQUIDATED

Leaves may be accumulated but may not exceed more than 12 days per annum. All unused vacation leaves in excess of 12 days will be forfeited, according to the ruling.

## LEAVES SHOULD BE LIQUIDATED

It further states that earned vacation leave should be liquidated whenever possible before leaving the center on indefinite leave, seasonal leave or leave to enter the armed forces of the United States. However, workers shall be paid for any vacation leave to their credit at the time of departure. In such cases, the date of the separation shall be extended to cover the number of days vacation leave to their credit. Workers absent from the center on short term leave, who have not been separated from their project job and who convert to indefinite leave without returning to the center, shall be paid for all vacation leave to their credit by extending the date of separation to cover the vacation leave.

## OVERTIME

Where overtime is unavoidable, it must be ordered and approved in advance by the division head in a memorandum addressed to the project director. Accumulated compensatory time must be used within 90 days. If compensatory (Continued on Page Three)

## Tule Lake Sentry Cleared Of Charges

TULE LAKE, June 3—A coroner's jury investigating the slaying of a Tule Lake Segregation Center interne by a military policeman, returning a verdict clearing the sentry of all charges in the slaying, according to the Los Angeles Examiner.

Shoichi James Okamoto, a nisei, died from a bullet fired by the sentry during an argument at the center's gate.

Modoc County District Attorney Charles Lederer announced the jury found that Okamoto was killed "by a soldier in the United States Army in the performance of his duty."

## Pictures By Adams Prove Popular Here

In answer to inquiries asking re-showing of the exhibit by Ansel Adams and opportunity to place orders, Lee Poole states that all persons who are interested in seeing the exhibit and placing orders should advise their respective block managers to that effect.

"The block managers should report at one of their meetings and give an estimate on the number of persons interested in the exhibit. If there are enough requests, the Co-op will contact Mr. Adams to see whether he will be willing to make another showing here," Poole said.

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## Japanese American Destination

(The following editorial appeared in the May 23 issue of the Los Angeles Collegian, newspaper of the Los Angeles City College—Editor)

What is to become of the 110,000 Japanese Americans who were evacuated from the Pacific Coast area after the war? Should they be sent back to Japan en masse, should we allow them to return to California and their old way of life, or should we just ignore the problem and let things work out the best way they can? These are among the problems facing the United States in regard to the Japanese American situation.

If we are to listen to Hearst, the Denver Post, the Sons and Daughters of the Golden West, and the American Legion, we will never allow them to set foot in California again and have them immediately sent to Japan. Even if this were possible it isn't practical or democratic.

### THE UPWARD CLIMB

At the end of the last war, the Japanese were encouraged to enter this country to work in fields and raise our food. They worked well and for a small wage. They were saving and brought good vegetables to our tables at a lower price than Caucasians could.

In cities a sizable commercial business came into Japanese American hands, retail and wholesale enterprises of all kinds developed.

It did not take a war for the farmers, the American Legion, the Sons and Daughters of the Golden West, and the politicians to resent and hate the Japanese Americans. Records of the press and legislature indicate that for many years the antagonism was there and growing. War turned that antagonism into fear and made possible what California clearly wanted for decades.

### GROWING HATE

The longer the army permits California and the rest of the Pacific Coast to be closed to everyone of Japanese descent the more time the pressure groups in California will have to make threats and to infest the minds of Californians with fear and hate.

Already 17,000 loyal Japanese Americans have been moved from the relocation camps to eastern states to take jobs and 1200 have volunteered for service with the armed forces. All of these people who left the centers have made a splendid record for themselves on battlefronts in the South Pacific and in Italy and doing their work in the eastern states.

In the April Fortune magazine, it is predicted that "if the war lasts two more years, and if the WRA has succeeded in finding places for 25,000 more Japanese Americans in the next 24 months, it will be a job well done. Whatever the final residue, 25,000 or 45,000 it is certain that the "protective custody" of 1942 and 1943 cannot end otherwise than in a kind of Indian reservation, to plague the conscience of Americans for many years to come."

## The Twenty Thousand

All indications in the present presidential situation point toward Dewey for the Republicans and Roosevelt for the Democrats. It is the general belief that the anti-fourth term movement in the south will not change the picture at the coming Democratic convention. Roosevelt is their man for the simple reason that the Democrats have no other suitable candidate.

As long as Roosevelt is the foremost candidate for the Democratic choice, the position of the Japanese American vote is clearly defined. As the chief executive, Dewey may not be any less fitted, but we must realize that if Roosevelt does not choose to run or if he does and is defeated, the status of the Secretary of Interior Harold L. Ickes will become a big question mark. In fact, we may almost be assured that if the Republicans carry this election, Ickes will not remain.

The nisei can not afford to lose the allpowerful proponent of tolerance. Ickes may at times be out-spoken; even to the point of embarrassing the evacuees, but he is still the man who understands our position and who realizes that justice comes above all. It was Roosevelt that signed the presidential order authorizing the establishment of defense zones and leading up to the evacuation but we must not cut off our nose to spite our face by keeping that fact from influencing our votes.

### DOWNNEY

Sheridan Downey, senator up for re-election in California was the author of a resolution which called upon the president and the WRA to segregate loyal and disloyal Japanese in the centers. He has been concerned more than once with the Japanese problem but has proven to be a clear thinker in the matter. Unlike some other officials from California, Downey sees the situation objectively.

He is aware of the fact that aliens can not be handled in the same way as citizens; that the disloyal and the loyal are a separate group. He does not make blanket statements against Japanese as many other self-appointed California big shots are wont to do.

## Merritt Speaks In Final Panel Series

Climaxing the "America In the Making" panel series, Project Director Ralph P. Merritt addressed the capacity audience at the eighth and the last of the series Tuesday.

His speech which was received enthusiastically covered five of the major questions: Was evacuation justified; was segregation justified, what is the future of the issei; what is the future of the nisei and what about the return to California? He also told his opinions on postwar international politics, economics and travel.

- in the Enlisted Reserve Corps?
- A. For administrative reasons to channel shipments and schedule training. It is not contemplated that they will remain in the Enlisted Reserve Corps for any extended period of time.
- B. Q. What is the general policy of selective service regarding deferments?
  - A. The present policy is one of granting practically no occupational deferments to men under 26; in case of men over 26, more consideration will be given to occupation, but still only a small percentage of such men will be granted deferments.
- Q. Why are nisei inductees being used in special units such as the 442nd Combat Team and the language school at Camp Savage?
  - A. Lt. Col. Harrison A. Gerhardt, general staff corps, executive to the assistant secretary of war, declared: (1) the assignment of personnel in the armed forces is based upon military considerations and not upon racial derivations; (2) the War Department does not consider it advisable to use Japanese Americans in the Pacific theater of operations at this time. If nisei soldiers were generally assigned to all units, it would be necessary to screen units which are to be sent to the Pacific before such units could be shipped. This would delay getting troops ready for combat and would disrupt efficient operation of a combat unit.
- 10Q. Will WRA be responsible for the care of personal property of bachelor nisei who are inducted into the army?
  - A. The WRA can assume no responsibility for the care of personal property but can provide storage space if another evacuee is designated as the responsible person.


