Effective this month, evacuee residents shall not perform domestic served personnel staff or for other evacuees, except when they are assigned to perform these enterprises, according to a new WRA regulation from Washingbor Domestic employees will be

## Japanese American Destination

(The following editorial appeared in the May 23 issue of the Los Angeles Collegian, newspaper of the Los Angeles City College-Editor)

What is to become of the 110,000 Japanese Americans who were evacuated from the Pacific Coast area after the war? Should they be sent back to Japan en masse, should we allow them to return to California and their old way of life, or should we just ignore the problem and let things work out the best way they can? These are among the problems facing the United States in regard to the Japanese American situation.

If we are to listen to Hearst, the Denver Post, the Sons and Daughters of the Golden West, and the American Legion, we will never allow them to set foot in California again and have them immediately sent to Japan. Even if this were possible it isn't practical or democratic.

## THE UPWARD CLIMB

At the end of the last war, the Japanese were encouraged to enter this country to work in fields and raise our food. They worked well and for a small wage. They were saving and brought good vegetables to our tables at a lower price than Caucasians could.

In cities a sizable commercial business came into Japanese American hands, retail and wholesale enterprises of all kinds developed.

It did not take a war for the farmers, the American Legion, the Sons and Daughters of the Golden West, and the politicians to resent and hate the Japanese Americans. Records of the press and legislature indicate that for many years the antagonism was there and growing. War turned that antagonism into fear and made possible what California clearly wanted for decades.

## GROWING HATE

The longer the army permits California and the rest of the Pacific Coast to be closed to everyone of Japanese decent the more time the pressure groups in California will have to make threats and to infest the minds of Californians with fear and hate.

Already 17,000 loyal Japanese Americans have been moved from the relocation camps to eastern states to take jobs and 1200 have volunteered for service with the armed forces. All of these people who left the centers have made a splendid record for themselves on battlefronts in the South Pacific and in Italy and doing their work in the eastern states.

In the April Fortune magazine, it is predicted that "if the war lasts two more years, and if the WRA has succeeded in finding places for 25,000 more Japanese Americans in the next 24 months, it will be a job well done. Whatever the final residue, 25,000 or 45,000 it is certain that the "protective custody" of 1942 and 1943 cannot end otherwise than in a kind of Indian reservation, to plague the censcience of Americans for many years to come.
