# MYER BACKS JAPANESE RETURN TO COAST

WASHINGTON, June 7—Japanese evacuees should be permitted to return to the Pacific Coast "as soon as the military necessity is over", WRA Director Dil - lon S. Myer told the House Appropriations Committee recently.

Myer estimated that 500 evacuees already have returned to the Pacific Coast with Army consent. He said he would recommend that the ten government camps for persons of Japanese ancestry be closed whenever the situation permits. Explaining that it will take about a year to redistribute all the persons now in WRA centers, he said it was his opinion that California, Washington and Oregon will take back the evacuees whenever they are turned loose.

Population of the ten existing centers was 88,490 on April 15. In addition to 2400 persons on "seasonal leave", 21,740 of the former Pacific Coast residents have been granted freedom to establish new homes in other sections of the country, Myer disclosed.

## AGED-ISSEI REPORTED IN SEATTLE FOR HEALTH

SEATTLE—Authorities here disclosed that a 66-year-old Japanese alien, Rahei Akahoshi, has been living in Seattle since August 27, 1942, with the permission of military authorities.

Akahoshi was evacuated with other persons of Japanese ancestry from Seattle to the Puyallup assembly center, but was allowed to return to Seattle because of ill health. He is married to a Caucasian woman, and has been a resident of Seattle for 46 years.

## TOKYO COMMENTS ON TULE LAKE INCIDENT

LONDON, June 7—The German radio quoted Tokyo as declaring that Shoichi James Okamoto, 30-year-old nisei internee who died recently, wounded by a guard at Tule Lake center; had been shot without provocation.

## SAKS TO ACCEPT NEW POSITION

Project Director's office disclosed the resignation of Project Attorney J. Benson Saks who has accepted a position in the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Authority.

Saks has revealed to friends that he has been assigned to immediate duty in the Balkan area. Local attorney Henry Tsurutani has been assigned acting project attorney pending replacement for Saks.

## CHANGE LIBRARY HOURS

"Libraries at 22-15 and 12-20 will be run for a limited schedule during the next two weeks", announced Ruth Budd, librarian.

She said that 22-15 library will be closed Saturday evenings, all day Sunday and on Friday evenings if it is necessary.

At the same time, she decided that 12-20 library will be closed in the mornings except Saturday morning, and that it will be closed on Saturday afternoons.

Shortage of library attendants at these hours is the reason given for closing the libraries she revealed.

"If it is possible to get more help after a couple of weeks, the libraries will return to their regular schedules," she stated.

## NEW YORK HOSTEL NOW OPEN TO SERVICEMEN

NEW YORK—Servicemen on leave in New York will be invited to stay at the newly-opened hostel for Japanese Americans at 168 Clinton Street, Brooklyn, the Rev. Ralph E. Smeltzer disclosed this week, according to the Pacific Citizen.

## QUELL RUMORS

Although there is a possibility that it may not be economical to continue this center as the population decreases, Manzanar probably will not be among the first centers to close, the Town Hall disclosed in reply to rumors that this center will close soon.

## DEATH OF FIRST NISEI REPORTED IN PACIFIC

NEW YORK, N.Y., June 7—Sgt. Ken Omura, a member of Seattle's UCAPAWA, Local 7, was the first nisei in United States uniform to die fighting the enemy in the South Pacific, according to the New World.

The paper disclosed that relatives who are now residing in Des Moines, Iowa, were recently informed from the War Department that Sgt. Omura had drowned last month in the waters surrounding New Guinea while serving with an Intelligence unit.

## VOLUNTEERED

Omura joined an artillery unit before Pearl Harbor. After December 7, 1941, he volunteered for intelligence training and duty. After graduating from the Military Intelligence School at Camp Savage, Minn., he was sent into the South Pacific in the fall of 1942.

## NEW JERSEY GROUP TO AID RESETTLERS

NEWARK, N.J.—Plans for organizing a citizens' committee to aid resettlement of Japanese Americans in New Jersey were launched on May 15 at a meeting at the Military Park Hotel, the Pacific Citizen disclosed.

"Officials of the WRA and War Manpower Commission and unofficial representatives of civic, religious and inter-racial groups attended," the paper declared.

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## WELL DONE

## JAPANESE PROBLEM

"There are rumors that high ranking Washington officials are toying with the idea that Japanese should be returned to California. They base their proposal on the firm grounds of civil rights guaranteed by the Constitution of the United States, writes Manchester Boddy in the L. A. Daily News.

### TRAGIC DIS-SERVICE

Furthermore, "It would be a tragic dis-service to return a man to his house because he had a constitutional right to live there, if the house were located in the midst of a burning forest. Just so, it would be tragic ineptitude, to say the least, to return Japanese to California at a time when the hot flames of war hatreds are enveloping the state."

He continues: "War is a grim business. Your boys and mine are giving up their very lives in defense of the United States. Is it asking too much of a Japanese who may technically and legally be entitled to 'freedom of movement' to give up a relatively small degree of that 'freedom' in the interest of harmony? The test of his patriotism and good faith, it seems to me, is his willingness to stay out of California while Japanese soldiers are killing California boys."

### SAINT OR KILLER

Boddy asserts: "We can be saint or killer—but we can't be both at the same time. Right now we are killers. And the government can't mitigate that fact by tossing Japanese into war tense California on the plea that this is the time for 'normal' reactions."

"When you kill a she bear's cubs—beware! The bear will cuff anything that looks like the killer.

### BAIT FOR THE BEAR

"The California Bear has sent her cubs to face Japanese guns. Because, unfortunately, California Japanese look precisely like Japanese, to return them here is needlessly to bait the California Bear. And this is no time for bear baiting!"

This is beginning to look like a war between Japan and California.

"As the end of the war draws nearer and postwar problems take on more and more importance, two resolutions now pending in Congress which would abolish by Constitutional amendment the provision that treaties must be ratified by a two-thirds vote in the Senate become of international interest," the F. L. I. S. Press Release stated recently.

One, introduced by Senator Gillette, would make a majority vote by the Senate the only requirement for treaty ratification. The other, introduced by Senator Pepper, would also make a majority vote the deciding factor but would require such ratification in the House of Representatives as well as the Senate.

## SEEK TO PREVENT COLONIZATION IN EAST

WASHINGTON, June 7.—Prodded by interests in their home districts, congressmen from various sections of the United States are organizing to demand the immediate return of the bulk of the country's Japanese population to the West Coast, the Herald Express revealed.

It said that they are seeking to prevent Japanese colonization in interior and east coast states.

"Sharp regional conflict is taking form as West Coast representatives declare that the whole United States must henceforth share responsibility for the Japanese, and that California, Oregon and Washington refuse to carry the burden alone," the article declared.

## NISEI LEAD ATTACK

NEW YORK—The Japanese American battalion fighting in Italy was the first Allied unit to make a bayonet charge against German positions on the Italian front, disclosed Ed Sullivan, columnist.

## EX-MANZANITE MARRIES

MADISON, June 7.—Mr. and Mrs. Colburn Nakamura, formerly of Madison, whose wedding was an event of April 25 in Chicago, are now making their home at the Dearborn Plaza there, the Chicago WRA office said.

Mrs. Nakamura, a registered nurse, was Miss Toshiko Eto before her marriage, and served on the staff of the Madison General Hospital. She relocated to Wisconsin from the Manzanar Relocation Center.

## ISSEI ARRESTED ON MASQUERADING CHARGE

VANCOUVER, B. C., June 7.—Royal Canadian Mounted police recently held Shiga Mori, 31-year-old Japanese who had been masquerading here as a Chinese since members of his race were excluded from the coastal area two years ago, the Daily News declared.

It said that he was charged with violation of the national registration act but officers declined to discuss his past activities. Mori held a card bearing a Chinese name and was living in a Chinese rooming house.

## RESTORATION OF RIGHTS TO LOYAL NISEI ASKED

KANSAS CITY, Mo., June 7.—Restoration to loyal Japanese Americans of "their full rights as citizens" was strongly advocated by delegates to the Methodist Conference while in session here for the forty-first Conference of that Church. At the same time they endorsed the relocation policy of the war relocation authority, the Kansas City WRA reported.

The eleven-day international conference was attended by more than 1500 delegates, reserve delegates, ministerial and lay visitors from every state in the Union and many foreign lands.

The resolution read, "We earnestly urge that at the earliest moment consistent with the public interest, loyal American citizens of Japanese ancestry have restored to them their full rights as citizens, especially the right to return to their former residences and occupations.

## COLORADO SEEKS RETURN

### OF NISEI TO WEST COAST

COLORADO—In a movement started by the Colorado State Chamber of Commerce, congressmen from the western interior states are preparing a demand that the West Coast military ban on Japanese be lifted at once so that the interior states can rid themselves of their new Japanese population, the Herald Express disclosed recently.

It was revealed that 30 congressmen from interior western states met quietly and were told by Donald Kiem, executive head of the Colorado chamber, that Maj. Gen. Delos Emmons, head of the western defense command, has announced that the West Coast is no longer in danger of Japanese invasion and that there is now no reason why all the evacuated Japanese cannot be moved back there.

## PHILADELPHIA HOSTEL OPENS TO RESETTLERS

Philadelphia Hostel now has room for 20 hostellers, according to the Relocation Office. The office disclosed that unemployed adults are charged \$1 a day while those under 12 are charged 50 cents. Rates for employed adults are \$1.75 and those for children under 12 are 75 cents.

The hostel is a four-story residence located about a ten-minute street car ride from the WRA office in the heart of the central city.

Its director is Victor Goertzel while its sponsor is the Philadelphia Federation of Churches Women's International League for Peace and Freedom.

## TULE LAKE RESIDENT COMMITTS SUICIDE

TULE LAKE, Calif.—Sadaharu Seino, a 57-year-old bachelor resident of Tule Lake segregation center committed suicide in the project recently by hanging himself from a sling made of strips of his torn overalls, the WRA announced this week.

Seino was taken to the hospital after he had swallowed a bottle of poison in his quarters.



# YOGORES BOW TO SOLONS

Report from Tule Lake center shows that former Manzanite horsehiders are doing more than expected in the Northern center. The Manzanar nine who are entered in the Taiheiyō Circuit dented the hickory 16 times in 71 trips to rubber for .225 per cent average in two encounters.
