

## Tule Center Quota Filled To Capacity

Tule Lake center will be unable to accommodate any more group movements to that center, according to the Newell Star which disclosed that the center was filled to capacity with the arrival of segregants from Gila and Topaz centers.

The Newell Star quoted Harry L. Black, the center's assistant project director, as declaring that "there still remains a large number of segregants in other centers" but that "there is no intention of transferring them until housing facilities are available."

"The housing unit has been busy making adjustments but due to the shortage, a policy has been established, whereby the only additional people allowed to come here will be those who have families who have room for them or those who have been detained in other centers because of illness or for other reasons.

"The assistant project director said that there were no foundations to the rumor that they are going to build additional blocks in this center," he declared.

It quoted Black that present facilities are inadequate to permit further building of blocks.

## HEATH TO LEAVE

Walter A. Heath of the Relocation Office announced this week that date of his departure for Kansas City has been set for June 12.

Heath will be in Kansas City for about one month. Persons who are interested in having him check on business or other relocation opportunities are asked to see him immediately.

## To Charge Deposit

Co-op management this week announce that effective June 15, a five-cent deposit will be charged for each bottle of soda water.

A refund ticket for the deposit will be given each purchaser and upon presentation of the ticket with an empty pop bottle, the cashier will pay the customer five cents from the refund box.

Each ticket will bear an invalidation date after which no refund will be made. Sale of soda water by the case will be handled as before.

## Soldier Condemns Racial Prejudice

WASHINGTON, June 10—Interior Secretary Ickes, who is recalling Japanese-Americans out of evacuee centers into communities all over the country, said he has received a suggestion from an American corporal in Italy regarding those who oppose this policy, according to the San Francisco Chronicle.

In a press release, Ickes said the soldier, J. H. Kety, wrote from the front lines:

"May I suggest that you send all those narrow-minded, bigoted, un-American over here to relieve the 100th Infantry battalion of the 34th division?"

That battalion is composed of American soldiers of Japanese descent. Ickes said the battalion has 1000 men and that 900 of them have received Purple Hearts for wounds suffered in battle; 36 have been given the Silver Star; 21 have Bronze Stars and three wear the Distinguished Service Cross.

## Volunteers From Manzanar Now Fighting In Europe

Members of the first group of volunteers for the Japanese American Combat Unit from Manzanar are overseas according to word received here by Ukiichi Ogura of 11-7-4.

Ogura revealed to a Free Press reporter that he had received a cablegram from his son, Pfc. Shuichi Ogura last week. The cablegram contained just a message of greeting to Mr. and Mrs. Ogura, and the origin was not stated, but the fact that it was from overseas was evident.

Pfc. Ogura was among the first group of 12 to leave for induction April 25 of last year. He is attached to a cannon company of 442nd infantry regiment.

He is the brother of Mrs. Bud Maruyama nee Sakiko Ogura, a registered nurse at the Manzanar Hospital. He also has two brothers Toshitsugu, 18, and Saburo, 15, who are both attending school in this center.

Registration For Carnival Still Open

Furlough Opens To 18 Year-Old Youths

Amendments to the seasonal work leave procedures which were revealed recently by the relocation office allow more freedom to minors who desire to leave on seasonal leaves.

The amendment reads: "Seasonal leave may be issued to any person under 17 years of age and to any person under 18 who became 17 on or after May 17, 1944—(1) if he is to be accompanied by a parent during the period of the seasonal leave, or (2) if he has the consent of a parent or guardian, and the project director, relocation officer, and high school principal or community activities supervisor agree that the applicant is a reasonably mature and responsible person and the project director specifically authorizes issuance of seasonal leave.

"All persons under 18, whether or not accompanied by a parent must be certified by a physician as physically fit for the proposed employment before recruiting.

## Merritt Returns

Project Director Ralph P. Merritt returned Tuesday night from San Francisco where he met with Assistant Field Director Robert B. Cozzens.

Mr. Merritt disclosed that the meeting with Cozzens was routine business conference. He was in San Francisco three days.

## Two Residents To Attend Convention

Misses Diane Tani and Harumi Hino, the delegates from this center, will leave Monday. All expenses for the trip are being paid by the national YWCA.

The conference is slated to be held June 15 to 25. The girls are expected to be back by July 1.

Miss Tani who is a senior at the local high school will not be able to attend graduation exercises but the education department has assured her her diploma.

## Adams' Book To Be Published Soon

Photographs taken in Manzanar by Ansel Adams will be published in book form by U. S. Camera, leading publisher of photographic literature, according to word received by Assistant Project Director Robert L. Brown.

The exhibit of the photographs at the Museum of Modern Art at New York was postponed until September but Adams and the museum have prepared a traveling exhibit that is expected to open next month in Washington. The exhibit, which includes 60 photographs mounted and glazed and 14 panels on which a column-text is written, will be taken on tour of the West and Middle West.

The exhibit being prepared for showing in September will also be toured after its showing in New York.

Adams disclosed that his book will sell at \$1 a copy and that the first printing will be 25,000 copies.

## Kaltenborn Praises Publication On Nisei

SANTA MARIA, Calif.—Work of the Rev. Aaron Allen Helst of his church, the First Methodist Church of Santa Maria, was declared "a magnificent example of applied Christianity" by H. V. Kaltenborn, noted radio commentator in a recent letter to the Rev. Mr. Helst.

Congratulating the Rev. Mr. Helst for the April 30 bulletin of his church, which was devoted to the cause of Japanese-Americans, Kaltenborn declared, "Yours is the first California publication I have seen, which dares tell the truth about Americans of Japanese ancestry.

"It is the people of California who unfairly are primarily responsible for the unfair treatment that has been accorded to American citizens, whose only crime is that they were born of Japanese parents. I am very happy to know that some of the good Christians of California are speaking out for truth and justice."

## Camp Savage Marks Second Anniversary

CAMP SAVAGE, Minn.—Second anniversary of Camp Savage, Minn., was observed with ceremonies recently, according to the Pacific Citizen.

The Citizen disclosed that beginning with a formal retreat for entertainment on the entire complement, public officials and the guests took part in the entertainment to commemorate the day. The program included dancing in the gym, motion pictures in the auditorium and outdoor entertainment on a specially-built stage in which prominent radio stars participated.

Following the formal ceremony, an alfresco picnic supper was served on the lawns. The grounds were decorated for the occasion with lanterns and streamers.

The Shakopee high school band provided music during the supper.

The camp was taken over by the federal government in 1942 from the state. Previous to its occupation by the army, the camp was a homeless men's camp

## Michigan Refuses To Pay Hospital Fee For Evacuee

LANSING, Mich., June 10—Michigan has balked at payment of hospitalization costs for interned Japanese moved into the State by the war relocation administration, according to the Pasadena Post.

The issue was raised when four Japanese, who moved from the West Coast to Ann Harbor, Mich., contracted tuberculosis and were admitted to the state sanitarium for treatment. Washtenaw county officials, who would normally pay cost of hospitalization, refused the approval payment and passed the question to the state health department.

The state administrative board has held up payment, contending the Japanese are wards of the war relocation administration.

Commenting upon the situation, Assistant Relocation Officer Walter A. Heath disclosed that any person who becomes ill on indefinite leaves can return to his respective center by applying for it at his district relocation office or by requesting his return through his project director.

## Trio Robs Property From Evacuee Home

LOS ANGELES—A self-styled San Francisco lawyer and two Mexican helpers, arrived at 722 S. Adams St. in a flat-bed truck during the absence of the apartment's tenant manager, Bessie Mae Cunningham, forced their way into a storeroom where the crated furnishings of the interned Japanese owner of the property was stacked. They made away with \$60 worth of furniture, washing machines and other household goods.

Willie Burrel, a neighbor whose aid was enlisted in loading the truck, said that the "attorney" thanked him and said he would be back for the rest the next day. He failed to show up.

## Cannery Possibility Slight Says Heath

"There has been considerable interest in Manzanar of the possibilities of cannery work," revealed Assistant Relocation Project Officer Walter A. Heath. He said that the relocation office received a teletype as of June 3, which stated that the only contracts as yet submitted for cannery workers have been referred to the nearby centers.

"It is uncertain whether there will be any subsequent request for cannery workers," Heath said. As such, at the present time it does not appear likely that Manzanar will receive any large request for this type of employment," he declared.

As a substitute, Heath revealed that efforts are being continued to obtain contracts for fruit pickers.

"As soon as information is available, the news will be promptly given to the center's residents," he said.

Rumors On Chicago Denied By Kennedy

Rumors that Chicago has now reached the "saturation" point as far as resettlement is concerned, is "absolutely" untrue, according to a telegram received this week from Chicago Re-education Supervisor Vernon R. Kennedy.

Kennedy said that Japanese Americans in Metropolitan Chicago represent "less than one-tenth of one per cent of the population."

"Every indication is that several times this number of resettlers can find employment and ready community," he said. Kennedy added that "it is our observation that community and employer acceptance improves with every additional resettler arriving in the city."

He disclosed that housing is easier to find now than it was when the first resettlers arrived a year and a half ago.

"More and more war plants are opening their doors to issei and nisei daily in Chicago and hundreds of jobs are available through the WRA office and through the cooperation of the United States Employment Service," Kennedy declared.

"Chicago asks no preferential consideration as compared with other districts through the country, but wishes to emphasize that no one need go elsewhere because of any condition existing in this city which is more than that of the home of 4000 resettlers and extends a welcoming hand to all others who wish to come here," Kennedy concluded.

Hit Discrimination Against Loyal Nisei

NEW YORK—To discriminate against loyal Japanese Americans with regard to place of residence or occupation is "an untenable as it would be to do so against loyal German Americans, or Italian Americans or Jews or Negroes, or against any racial or national minority," the National Federation for Constitutional Liberties declared here last week.

George Marshall, chairman of the Federation, set forth these views of the organization regarding the current objections being made against the resettlement of Japanese Americans who have been living in federal war relocation centers.

Gardeners Sought

Gardeners and gardeners' helpers are wanted by the Chicago Country Club. The club is willing to pay \$100 monthly plus room and board as well as the return fare to Manzanar in October, if desired.

Industrial Cutbacks Slight In Ohio

CLEVELAND, Ohio, May 27—A survey of the seven principal cities of the Cleveland area of the war relocation authority indicates that, industrial cutbacks affecting workers of Japanese ancestry have been negligible, Robert M. Cullum, area supervisor, announced today.

The cities checked were those where WRA offices are located, namely, Cleveland, Toledo, Cincinnati, Columbus, Buffalo, Detroit, and Grand Rapids.

Fred W. Ross, relocation officer of the Cleveland district, reported: "No evacuees have come into this office in search of jobs because they had been victims of industrial layoffs."

In Detroit, Herbert Passin, district officer, reported that in the last month about 10 evacuees sought new jobs, more as a result of "industrial change-over" than production cutbacks. In several cases, for example, changes in the plants involved would have permitted evacuees to go to other departments in work not exactly to their tastes.

June 18 Set For Date Of Graduation

Manzanar High School's annual commencement will take place in the new community auditorium on Sunday evening, June 18 at 8 o'clock, stated Secondary School Principal Rollin C. Fox. He disclosed that Project Director Ralph P. Merritt will preside.

The 181 candidates for graduation will be dressed in caps and gowns—the girls in white and the boys in dark blue. Diplomas will be awarded by Dr. Genevieve W. Carter, superintendent of education at Manzanar.

Highlighting the commencement program will be the invocation by the Rev. Henry G. Boyenkerk, welcome address by Arnold T. Maeda and greeting by the Rev. Shinjo Nagatomi. Cecil Dunne from Occidental College will deliver the commencement address.

Lily Fukuhara will give her rendition of "Ave Maria" on the violin while Haruko Uyeda will give her response for the graduating class.

A reception will be given by the Manzanar High School Parent Teacher Association in honor of the graduating class in mess 7 following the commencement program. Everyone is invited.

Advisors to the class are Miss Janet Goldberg, Miss Mary Jean Kramer and Mr. Clive Greenlee.

NO INDUSTRIAL LAY-OFFS

Mr. Raymond G. Booth, who heads the Cincinnati district office, said he knew of no persons who had come into his office looking for a new job because they had lost their old ones by industrial layoffs.

"Employers here have been somewhat choosy in seeking employees," he reported, "but once a placement is made, it seems to have a high degree of permanency in Cincinnati."

NISEI NOT AFFECTED

William J. Fluke of the Toledo Office said he knew of one nisei who had been affected by the curtailing of operations in one department of a large war plant in that city, but the effect was transitory.

Reporting no displacements, Carl L. Spicer of the Columbus Office added: "There is no evidence that evacuees are being handled differently from Caucasians or Negro workers in the plants where they are employed."

"We do not expect industrial change or shutdowns to affect relocation possibilities in any marked degree in this district."

Assailant Assaults World War Veteran

TULE LAKE, Calif.—An American veteran of the first world war of Japanese ancestry, now residing at Tule Lake segregation center, was in the project hospital with "several fractured bones," and his alleged assailant was convicted by camp authorities and sent to jail less than 12 hours after an altercation between the two, the WRA announced.

Kaoru Nagatami, 50, a former resident of Hawaii who gained service in the last war, was the victim, but the authorities said his condition was not critical.

His assailant, Tatsuo Yokoyama, 33, was convicted after a hearing before Project Director Ray R. Best and sentenced to 90 days in the Klamath Falls Jail.

Best denied that the altercation had anything to do with the fatal shooting of James S. Okamoto earlier last week.

NEW YORK—Ruth Kono, 35, an American of Japanese ancestry, hung herself on May 22 in the home of C. Cardwell Cross in Malba, Queens, where she had been employed as a domestic prior to Pearl Harbor.

The police, after questioning Cross, a New York broker, said they believe Miss Kono had been brooding over the war. Although not favoring the Japanese, it was reported she had a brother who had been placed in a "concentration camp." Recently, boys throwing stones at random hit a window in the house and since then Ruth Kono had been obsessed with the mistaken impression that they had been aiming at her, the reports indicated.

Tule Lake Japanese Seek Repatriation

SAN FRANCISCO, June 10—The war relocation authority disclosed more than half the 19,000 Japanese internees at Tule Lake segregation center have requested repatriation to Japan, but Japan does not want most of them.

Dillon S. Myer, WRA director, said the Japanese government has supplied lists of people they want—including Japanese with money, and young persons with college educations. In some cases he said, the Japanese government has tried to get young Japanese college graduates who have declined repatriation.

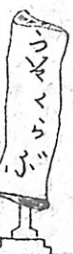
