Foderal Judge To Blake Kennedy donied two important motions of the defeneo to dismiss charges against the 63 Japanese Americans, reported the Sentinel. All of the dofendents pleaded innocont to tho charges before the trial, it stated.
Although the trial was one of the largest to bo held in Choyenare, little interest was sho:m by the public, stated the papor, and noted that principal amone the onlookers vere soldiers from the nearby army posts.
The Los Angeles Examiner of June 27-in a Associated Press dispatch from Ohoyenne, Myo, reported that $\mathrm{J}_{\mathrm{a}} \mathrm{S}_{0}$ District Judge $\mathrm{T}_{0}$ Blake Komnedy sentenced the 63 nise $j$ each to three years of confinement after finding them guilty.
