

SENTENCE 63 NISEI TO THREE YEAR TERMS IN WYOMING'S MASS TRIAL

In what the Heart Mountain Sentinel termed the "Biggest Mass Trial in Wyoming's History", the latest issue carried on its front page a five column cut showing 63 nisei youths from the Heart Mountain, Wyo., center charged with violation of the Selective Service Act through failure to report for pre-induction physical examinations.

DENY MOTIONS

Federal Judge T. Blake Kennedy denied two important motions of the defense to dismiss charges against the 63 Japanese Americans, reported the Sentinel. All of the defendants pleaded innocent to the charges before the trial, it stated.

Although the trial was one of the largest to be held in Cheyenne, little interest was shown by the public, stated the paper, and noted that principal among the onlookers were soldiers from the nearby army posts.

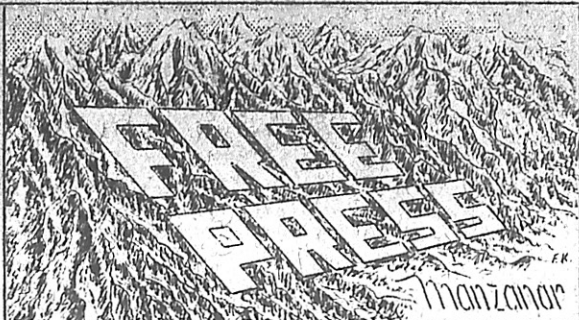
The Los Angeles Examiner of June 27 in a Associated Press dispatch from Cheyenne, Wyo., reported that U. S. District Judge T. Blake Kennedy sentenced the 63 nisei each to three years of confinement after finding them guilty.

TO COMPLETE JEROME MOVEMENT BY JULY 1

Transfer of 5500 residents of the Jerome relocation center in Arkansas to four other centers, will be completed by July 1, it was announced at war relocation authority headquarters.

MOVEMENT STARTED

The announcement stated that the movement of the Jerome residents to other centers started on June 6. Twenty-five hundred from Jerome will become residents of the Rohwer center, 35 miles from Jerome. Two thousand will move to the Gila River Project in Arizona, Heart Mountain in Wyoming and Granada in Colorado will each gain 500 new residents from the Jerome closing. These four centers were chosen to receive the Jerome evacuees (Continued on Page 2)

PLAN CARNIVAL PROGRAM FOR OUTDOOR STAGE

The hour and half program includes buglers, composed of teen age boys; Manzanar Concert Orchestra playing a variety of selections; the Rhythm Band from the third grade, 32-15, under direction of Mrs. Gladys Sandridge; Boys' Tonette Group, coached by Miss Shoaf; songs by girls from the grade school Glee Club, Miss Kiyomi Tanaka, Kow Maruki, Harry Tashima and Henry Kano; saxophone solo by Tak Shindo; trombone solo, Roy Nakagawa; piano solo by Tomiko Yamada and tap dance by girls from Shig' Ishii's class. The following hour will be given to Japanese classical dances presented by Mr. Y. Tanaka and dancers. Mr. Kishio Matoba is master of ceremonies.

JULY 2 PROGRAM

Beginning with a half an hour of recorded concert program, the Sunday presentation will commence at 7:30 p.m. with Shig' Ishii in charge.

Various numbers are the buglers, Mandolin-Guitar Orchestra, featuring vocal soloists and instrumental selections with R. Nakama directing; Sr. Girl's Glee club directed by Louis Frizzell, songs by Mary Kageyama and Mr. Frizzell and two piano selections by Mrs. Melva Nielsen and Mr. Frizzell. Japanese classical dancers will be presented by Mr. Y. Tanaka from 9 to 10 p.m.

DISCUSS USE OF CENTER FOR VETERAN'S HOME

Considerable discussion followed reading of letters urging that Manzanar relocation center be converted into a veteran's rehabilitation center at a recent meeting of the Inyo Associates reported the Inyo Register.

APPROVAL

It was also revealed that the Legionaire members of the group reported the proposal had been approved by Inyo-Mono Legion Post and would be incorporated into a resolution at the district and State Legion conventions. Members of the Associates stressed the importance of the tourist trade as the leading post-war revenue producer for Inyo County. Urging that folders and other tourist information be made available in travel information centers in the West, need for an organization to handle this type of service was discussed.

The valley paper also reported that the Bishop Rotarians unanimously voted a resolution urging the veterans Administration in Washington to consider establishment of a veterans rehabilitation center in Manzanar.

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JUDGE BY MERIT

Many acts of discrimination against certain ethnic groups are based on color lines, ancestral backgrounds or creeds. In the case of the issei and nisei, such are the reasons for being set aside from the rest of the world.

Yet, in spite of the fact that our ancestors were born in Japan, we have produced men like Noguchi who discovered the yellow fever germ; there are some who are anti-semitic, but Einstein is a Jew, and he has enriched the world by his many discoveries. There are those who dislike negroes because they are dark, but the colored people have given the world great musicians and men like Carver.

One could almost endlessly name people who are of different creeds, ancestries and colors who have contributed much to our lives, but these men are forgotten in the wishes of people to see only the worse in their fellowmen.

The moral of the story is this: Judge by merit and worth not by physical characteristics or ancestry.

Dillon S. Myer, director of the WRA, was reported by the announcement as stating that the WRA has no immediate plans to close any more centers. He revealed that all centers (except Tule Lake) will be closed within a reasonable time after the War Department determines that military necessity no longer requires maintenance of the exclusion order.

Many of the members of the appointed staff at Jerome are being transferred to other centers.

Mrs. Brill was overjoyed to see her old friends again and spent her two days here walking around to various homes visiting her former pupils and friends. She left Tuesday night to attend the Whittier Institute.

33 SEASONAL WORKERS LEAVE IN LAST GROUP

Thirty-three seasonal leave workers left this afternoon at 1 o'clock for Clearfield, Utah, to complete seasonal leave recruitment from this center, disclosed Robert Krueger, acting assistant relocation officer.

DR. FOREST AUGMENTS WELFARE STAFF

Charlotte B. DeForest has been added to the community welfare staff as junior counselor, revealed the welfare section. Her job will consist of interviewing and counseling evacuees and their families to help formulate future plans.

Daughter of a missionary, Miss DeForest was born and reared in Osaka, Japan. After teaching for ten years on the faculty of the Kobe College for Girls, she served as president of that institution for 25 years.

REASON OF RETURN

Due to serious illness, she returned to the United States in 1940. Until her appointment here, she has spent much of her time doing translating and interpreting work for the Immigration Service in Boston, Mass., and teaching the Japanese language at a army service training unit.

She has met many of her old friends of Japan in Manzanar, and looks forward to her stay here with great pleasure.

RELEASE QUOTA OF FIFTH WAR LOAN FOR CENTER

J. R. Winchester, chief steward and chairman of the Fifth War Loan Drive for Manzanar, stated that the quota set for this center was \$16,180.

Although the drive officially began on June 12, Winchester disclosed that bonds bought since the first of the month will be credited to the local drive.

FOR JULY

The local drive will be credited for bonds bought during the month of July, the chairman stated, but the drive will officially end on July 8. To date, \$11,000 in bonds were sold, he said, "with a little better than \$5000 to go."

EVACUEE PARTICIPATION

"Evacuees are not required to buy bonds," Winchester said, "but if anyone should want one, we'll be glad to have them come in and we'll help get it for them."

COUNCIL OUTLINE PLANS

At its preliminary meeting, the newly formed Youth Council, comprised of the young people of Manzanar, outlined an ambitious program. With the cooperation of the block managers and the YWCA, the activities of this organization can function successfully, states Barbara Dougherty.

"The purpose of the Youth Council is to serve as an advisory capacity to the Town Hall and the Administration in making known the wants of young people of Manzanar," stated Miss Dougherty. "It also proposes to make the youths aware of things going on outside and to better fit them for 'outside' community living and to develop leadership.

"A lot of things are taking place in America—the most important is the coming national election. There are vital issues at stake and the young people of Manzanar should become aware of them as well as try to get the actual feel of events.

"The Youth Council wishes to sponsor and promote symphony under the stars, singspirations at Baird's Creek, and to undertake several polls in order to ascertain public opinion on certain issues," she concluded.

The next meeting will be held sometime this week, at which time an election will be held.

TOPAZ FAMILY RETURNS

SMELTZER CORRECTS STATEMENTS ON HOSTEL

Misconception some had about the New York relocation hostel failing to open was declared by Director Ralph E. Smeltzer as "entirely false" in his letter to the hostel correspondent of the relocation office here. The hostel has been running smoothly since its opening on May 10, the director stated.

Regarding statements that only members of the Church of the Brethren and Baptist church would be accommodated at the hostel, Smeltzer said: "That also is entirely false." He added that the hostel will accommodate any center resident regardless of his religion, belief, creed, or citizenship status.

The letter disclosed that at a recent meeting of hostel directors in Chicago, it was decided to ask correspondents in each center to prepare a brief monthly report of the relocation and hostel situation at the center.

Director Smeltzer stated in his letter:

"The directors feel that they would like to have a periodic report of such information in order to understand relocation progress and therefore be better administrators of the hostels."
