Japeneso should return to the coast on the condition that a job is awaiting them, and they have a place to live. Such a procodure will greatly assist then in their future plannínes.
Cozzens disclosed the addition of Pat Frayne to the regional office in Sam Fiancisco to handlo public relations vork for the vestern area. Frayic, who was introduced to the assombly oarlier in tho meeting, stated that his rork consisted of roleasing information on the Japanose to tho Went Goast public.

"Eighty per cent of futuso relocatees can obtain an immediate position. In fact I know a case of one young woman, typist and stenographer, who had three positions offered to her. An issei, 50 years old, was offered four-different positions as gardeners on various estates. Through the WRA, enumerated technician jobs are being found," Dr. Carpenter rem ports.
PERitAidint JOBS
"I would like to stress the fact that at least 50 per cent of the positions vill be permanent as far as the Japanese Americans are concerned. Those who go into var vork will be subject to the same limitations as any war worker no netter what nationalit: or group. It is quite certain that for some time after the war there will be jobs for everyone and the adjustment of work to regular ones. vill take place as quickly as possible," he emphatically stated.
