CONTINUE INVESTIGATION OF WAREHOUSE FIRE.

Fire which destroyed three warehouses Friday evening was still under investigation Monday by the Survey Board, disclosed Assistant Project Director Edwin

H. Hooper.

The blaze which started on the south end of Warehouse 34 was first discovered at 5:15 p.m. by Jitsudo Nakata of 3-9-2 who is employed as janitor of Warehouse 32. Another co-janitor ran immediately to the alarm box to notify the fire department. Chief Frank Hon stated, that the fire truck was out when the alarm came in.

Four lines and two truck pumps were used and the fire, was under control within 20 minutes, extinguished by 6:30 p.m., and equipment was withdrawn at 7 p.m., stated Chief Hon.

Two men, Assistant Fire Chief K. Hyama and Fireman Takeshi Sasaki, were injurei, both receiving first degree burns.

Hon said that residents of Blocks 3 and 4 should especially commended for their efficiency, and would like to thank all volunteers.

Nothing is yet definite on both origin and extent of dynage of fire, reported Hooper, chairman of the Survey Board.

AMERICAN WAY ?

(The following editorial quoted in full appeared in the Milwaukee, Wisc., Journal of June 23, 1944 -- Editor.)

"On the West Coast, many otherwise respectable orgamizations -- including the American Legion, which should stand for the finest kind of Americanism-have been engaging in a bitter hate campaign against the Japanese They have sought to direct the enmity for Americans. Japan against these citizens. The West Coast press has also played a disgraceful role in this attack.

"What kind of Americanism is it for the Gardena to omit from its honor roll of citizens the names of 17 Japanese Americans in the service of our com-What kind of Americanism is it for the mon country? American Legion to revoke the charters of two posts made up of Japanese American veterans of the first World Warf What kind of Americanism is it for the legion in Portland, Oregon, to protest the efforts of local citizens to provide some volunteer care for a Japanese cemetery?

"The attitude expressed in these actions is a disheartening sign that we have a long way to go to achieve the kind of tolerance and democracy we fight for."

. EDITORIAL

Members of the Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way Employees on the Illinois Central have served their union and country ill by their stand against the employment of 59 American citizens of Japanese ancestry as track laborers. But it is a disservice that can atill be righted.

To avoid a strike, railroad, at the request of the War Department, has laid off the Japanese Americans pending further discussion. This retreat before racial prejudice is humiliating at best. It must be temporary. And if ·democratic principles prevail, the union members themselves will gladly end their discrimination. clashes head on with the racial democracy upheld by every enlightened labor leader.

Far better counsel should win rank and file support,

surely, than the demagoguery of the brotherhood leader who has held that Japanese Americans can't be trusted to work on roadbods lest troops and the public be jeopardized. This is a matter for the government, not agitators, to decide. And the government had decided; Harold S. Jacoby. acting area supervisor of the war relocation authority, emphasizes that all the Japanese Americans in question were carefully investigated by the WRA.

Their employment endangers no worker's seniority rights. Their labor needed in the interest of the war. They are American citizens. And this country is not engaged in a struggle for fascist race theories. Only Thursday Gen. Mark Clark cited the 100th Infantry Battalion, posed of Americans of Japanese descent, for outstanding battle valor in Italy. BLOCK MANAGERS MEET IN HUNDREDTH ASSELBLY SINCE REORGANIZATION


