To avoid a strike, the railroal, at the request of the War Department, has Laid of? the Japanese Anerteans pending further discussion. Fhis retreat before racial prejudice is humplating at best. It must be temporary. And if denocratic principles'prevail, the union members themselves will gladly end their discrimination. It cleshes head on with the racial denocracy upheld by eveny enlightened labor leader.

Far better counsel should vin rank and file support,
surelv, than the demagoguery of the brotherhood leader who has held that Japanese Anericans can't be trusted to work on roadveds lest troops and the public be jeopardized. This is a natter for the government, not agitators, to decide. and the govermment had decided; Harold S. Jacoby, acting area supervisor of the war relocation authority, emphasizos thet all the Japanese Americans in question verecarefully investigated by the $W$ RA.

Their employment endanGers no worker's seniority rights. Their labor is needed in the interest of the var. They are Anerican citizens. And this country is not engaged in a struggle for fascist race theories. Only Thursday Gen, Eark Clark cited the 100 th Infantry Battalion, composed of Americans of Japanese descent, for outstanding battle valor in Italy.
