Monzonar with the rest of the nation today registered its young men between the ages of 18-20, in the fifth national draft sign-up. From 8:00 a.m. until 9:00 p.m. Clark E. Demorest, selective service official, and Paul Aiso, his assistant, sat in the temporary office at 1-14 giving out registration meceipts to about 400 youths that appeared.

This is the second R-day to hit this center in its brief existence, the first being the registration of men in 45-64 category. Registration is compulsory.


Twice-weekly musicals featuring standard symphonic works will be inaugurated this coming Wednesday evening at 6:00 p.m.at 33-15.
