UNION PACIFIC BRAKEMAN EXTRADITED TO NEVADA ON ASSAULT CHARGE

Arrested in Twin Falls, Idaho, J. R. Monroe, 40, a Union Pacific brakeman, will be returned by Idaho authorities to Elko county, Nev., to face charges of assault with intent to kill in connection with the shooting of three Japanese employees of a Wells, Nev., restaurant.

The Los Angeles Daily News reported that Frank Fujini was shot in the leg and stomach, Harry Domi in the chest and Benni Kikumoto in the thumb. Fujini and Domi's wounds were considered serious.

EXPLAIN REQUIREMENTS FOR SOCIAL SECURITY BENEFITS

All persons 65 years or older, who have worked in commerce or industry covered by the Social Security Act since 1937 may be eligible for the Social Security benefits, according to word received this week from San Bernardino Social Security Board Manager J. H. Johnson.

The Social Security Board manager disclosed that the local offices of the Social Security Board will be able to state as to whether a person is entitled to payments.

He also added that survivors of persons who were working in covered employment may be eligible to "lump-sum" or monthly benefits, and that wives or widows of insured workers may be entitled to monthly benefits when they themselves reach the age of 65.

"All such persons should make inquiry about their rights and possible benefits so that they may not lose payments merely because the Social Security Board has never received inquiry about them," Johnson stated.

Residents who are interested in obtaining further information should contact Margaret M. Dille, counselor of the Community Welfare Section, who has pamphlets and other sources of information available.

The Welfare Section is located at Building 1-3.

NISEI ASSURED OF WARM WELCOME TO UNIVERSITY

In a statement of policy made by Dr. Robert Gordon Sproul, president of the University of California at Berkeley, students of Japanese ancestry who resume or begin studies at the University will be received in "a friendly and cooperative manner."

In an editorial in the January 22 issue of the California Bruin, UCLA campus publication, Miss Helene Licht wrote:

"Next semester several Japanese will resume studios on this campus. For those students there should be a cordial reception— one of goodwill and understanding. They will be pioneering a new path, one which was not explored by their predecessors who left here in 1942. And to them, the freedom of educational opportunity will be available as it is to all Americans."

INVITATION TO F.B.I.

Right riding tactics like the attacks on the Japanese American farmer who returned to his Placer county home come pretty close to an invitation to the F.B.I. to take an interest in the matter.

Such instances are not quite on a par with disturbances which although they deal with constitutional rights, are held clearly and exclusively the responsibility of local authorities.

American citizens of Japanese antecedents who were removed from their homes and held under military guard have been government wards. No amount of legal sophistry can alter that practical aspect. If local peace officers cannot protect these persons in rights which were disturbed in the first instance by the Federal Government, it seems to be up to the government to find a way to do it.

Prospective returnees to the west coast may be interested in a 40 acre ranch offered for sale in Clovis, Calif., Fresno county, reports Walter A. Heath, relocation program officer.

The ranch has 10 acres in vineyards, 10 acres in oats and the balance of the land level and ready for planting. It is located with grade and high schools only one mile away and is a ten minute ride by automobile to Fresno, he said.

The owner reports having operated a truck garden during the past two years and has it fully equipped with all farming tools and miscellaneous items that make a ranch ready to operate with nothing else to buy.

SCHOOL HOLDS VACATION

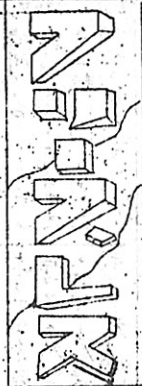
