FOLK DANCING SOCIETY HOLDS MEMBERSHIP DRIVE

Manzanar Folk Dancing Society is launching a membership drive from Monday, February 5 to February 16, according to an announcement from Toshiko Nakamura, chairman.

The purposes of the drive are to invite more interested members to join and to have an accurate membership list so that worthwhile program may be planned.

Everyone may obtain a membership card from any active member or from Shig Ishii of the Community Activities Section.

Membership fee is 35 cents and is good for the next three months.

Refreshments are served and the Folk Dancing Orchestra is also present at every meeting.

Persons may register at the regular meeting which will be held tonight in Mess Hall two or at the next meeting which will be held next Wednesday February 14.

NEWS FOR BOYS

All boys between the ages of 8 to 15 are invited to come to the YMCA building in 16-2 during their free moments when the hall is open. Community Activities Supervisor A. G. Nielson disclosed.

Hours of the hall are from 3 to 5 and from 6 to 8:30 p.m. on Monday through Friday and from 8 a.m. to 12 noon on Saturdays.

Opportunities will be furnished for learning to make kites and airplanes, Nielson said. He added that several table games will also be available.

MAJORITY OF RESIDENTS CLEARED FOR RETURN TO EVACUATED AREAS

As a result of the Army's review of the cases of individuals, about 95 per cent of the residents are now on the cleared list, Project Director Ralph F. Harritt disclosed last week.

He said, however, that of the five per cent remainder on the excluded list, some may be on the detention list, which would mean that they will not be permitted to relocate and will eventually be sent to a segregation center.

A meeting of the excludeds was called by the project director recently in Mess Hall Seven.

The meeting was called for those excludeds who felt that the army had wrongly detained or excluded them.

Provisions will be made for appeal and sometime this month an appeal board will come to this center to consider all cases protested by the excludeds.

All excludeds who feel that the exclusion orders given them are not fair,

PLAN MEMORIAL SERVICES
Memorial services for the late Sgt. Tad Tokuro Tazuka, son of Tokujiro Tazuka of 29-12-3, will be held Friday night, February 9, 7 o'clock at the Buddhist Church.

A graduate of the University of Southern California as a pharmacist, he was inducted into the United States Armed Forces on January 8, 1942 while in Los Angeles.

He went overseas in August, 1944 and died on a battlefield in France on October 17, 1944.

WISCI TRIO ENCOUNTERS
MISTREATMENT IN IDAHO
Three Wiscio youths reporting to Fort Douglas, Utah for active duty in the Army from Caldwell, Ida. were subjected to maltreatment and beating by a Caucasian serviceman recently, the Hunt, Ida. Ninidoka Irrigator revealed.

It stated that approximately 40 Japanese residents of Caldwell and vicinity were present to see the boys off. One of the crowd members, I. Hagilko, a 70-year-old man, was pushed from the station platform.

The soldier has a past criminal record.

The three boys who left for active duty that day were Utsuo, Kyong, Seiso, Akhota and Tom Miyanaga.

The War Department has taken over the matter.

A greenhouse and nursery, now operated by two Japanese-Americans in Omaha, Neb., is for sale, the Relocation Office disclosed.

The operators, H. Akihashi, formerly of Indio, Calif. and Frank Kuwahara, of San Fernando and Poston, have been in charge of the greenhouse but now wish to return to California.

BUDDHIST PRIESTS PAY FINAL RESPECTS TO WIFE OF BISHOP I. MATSUKAGE

People from all over the United States, totaling to about 1000, were present recently at the Topaz Utah Relocation Center to pay their final respects to the late Mrs. Isuo Matsukage, wife of Bishop Ryotai Matsukage, highest ranking Buddhist priest in America.

The Reverend Motoyoshi delivered the main memorial address. Buddhist followers were represented by Yutaka Makayama while the Reverend S. Nagatomi of Manzanar Relocation Center spoke in behalf of Bishop Matsukage.

Incense offerings were made by representatives of various Buddhist groups in the center and those of other centers.

Among the Buddhist priests present were the Reverend Nagatomi of Manzanar, formerly of San Francisco; the Reverend Kono, of Chicago, adviser of Midwest YBA and formerly of Hanford; the Reverend Kow of Heart Mountain, formerly of Los Angeles; the Reverend Terakawa of Salt Lake City, formerly of Marysville; and the Reverend Kunata, of Ogden, formerly of Topaz and San Francisco.

PLAN WAR PRISONER CAMP

WASHINGTON—Removal of Japanese American evacuees from the Hunt, Ida, Minidoka Relocation Center so that it might be used as a branch of the prisoner of war camp at Rupert, Ida., had been requested by Idaho State Supervisor of Farm Labor B. L. Fourn, the Minidoka Irrigator disclosed.

Fourn said his request was made because of the difficulty in transferring prisoners of war from Rupert to work on farms near the WRA center.

DISCHARGED WAR VETERAN ROBS FATHER STEINBACH

Hearings for A. J. Ashworth, 32, discharged veteran of Okladis, La., who pleaded guilty recently to charges of stealing \$157 from Father Leo Steinbach of the Manzanar Catholic Church, was set for February 13 by Judge William D. Dohy in Lone Pine, the Inyo Independent revealed.

Entering the home of Father Joseph Smith, the suspect puttered about the room.

Both Father Smith and Father Steinbach thought the other was the one disturbing the peace, until the suspect tried to enter Father Smith's room. The Father held his door closed and took careful observance of the intruder.

Learning that his wallet containing \$157 and other valuables was missing, Father Steinbach together with Father Smith began a quick search.

Found and identified in a cafe, the suspect earlier alleged that he had found the wallet that day.
