Or shall we throw into the building of Manzanar the creative energies of a gifted people, the labor of a folk to whom toil is traditional, the gaiety of young men and women who know that the human soul can be defeated by nothing except itself.

Mount Whitney already knows the answer: One day the world will know.

EDITORIAL • INDEPENDENCE DAY-1942

Fourth of July this year will have poignant meaning and value for an America gripped in a death struggle for the very principles affirmed in the Declaration of Independence.

For American citizens of Japanese ancestry herded into camps and guarded by the bayoneted sentries of their own country, it will be a doubly strange and bewildering day. For they remember, too well, the carefree Fourth of last year, when they stood along Broadway to cheer the nisei soldiers who marched shoulder to shoulder with American soldiers of all races.

But let us think twice, lost in our understandable and human bitterness, we dismiss this day with an ironic shrug and a customary wisecrack.

It is too late to argue on the injustice of this gigantic upheaval that finds us today in Manzanar. Our leaders had repeatedly reiterated our willingness to evacuate our homes should it ever be considered a military necessity. Now we are here.

Let us stop living in a dreamy, nostalgic past. Let us stop wallowing in a mire of self-pity and work out our destinies in a practical manner.

We, nisei, have temporarily put our individual freedoms on ice so that national morale might remain sound, and the fight for world democracy might continue unfettered. Of all diverse American groups, we are in the best position to appreciate the blessings of liberty.

For those whose faith in America burned bright--who were eager to give their blood to prove that faith--this is a difficult test, a Valley Forge.

On the day that the gates of Manzanar open wide for us again, let us step out into a victorious America, more vigilant and jealous of the independence we have regained through patient cooperation and waiting.

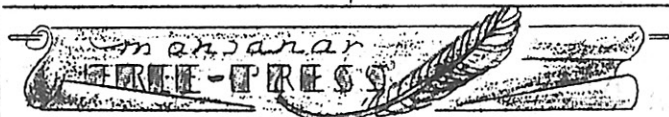
Music Hour

FIRE FORCE LAUDED

That Manzanar has one of the best fire protection and prevention records of any center was the declaration made by William E. Hoffman, Regional Fire Inspector for the W.R.A. who made a two-day inspection of the center this week.

"However, vigilance cannot be relaxed," he stated. "There is a high fire hazard here and cooperation of every resident is needed to prevent any damaging blaze. Prevention is the best policy."



In anticipation of moving, residents have placed padlocks on new apartments before moving permits have been issued. This makes it difficult for the linoleum crew to do their jobs on schedule, and unless apartments are left open, lining of the floor will be delayed, warned the housing department.

REPORT DIARRHEA CASES TO DOCTORS

Diarrhea cases are asked to be reported by the Public Health office so that the cause may be traced to its source.

"Many people have the impression that reporting diarrhea cases will incriminate the kitchen staff," said Dr. Yoshiye Togasaki, public health administrator. "This is not so. We want to help prevent diarrhea, and the only way to do so is to find out what causes it."

Facts wanted by the Public Health office are: name of individual, last three meals before diarrhea attack, and date.

On the Trail

Police are hot on the trail of typhoid inoculation dodgers, the Medical Clinic warned today. If local police warnings are not heeded, the Military Police may be called in.

Pertussis Shots

Pertussis (whooping cough) vaccinations will be continued every Thursday afternoon until all babies have been vaccinated.

ON THE FARMING FRONT

HARVEST TIME NEAR FOR LOCAL FARMS

In spite of adverse weather conditions, the vegetable plants in the Manzanar farms are standing up fairly well. With \$214 worth of radishes already harvested and distributed to the mess halls, other crops will soon be ready for local consumption.

MELONS MOST ADAPTED

...Melons show the best growth and are most adapted to local weather conditions. At the present rate of growth, they will be ready for harvest the first of September, before the freeze period begins. Seventeen acres are devo-

ded to melons.

...Tomatoes are doing nicely. Flowers have begun to set on the tomato plants. If no buds drop, there will be more than enough for the entire camp.

WINDBREAK NEEDED

...The winds seem hard on bunch vegetables. Present lack of windbreak works hardship on all tall growing plants. Vine type of vegetables, such as cucumbers and fruits like melons, appear to be doing better.

...Yoshio Sugihara, assistant supervisor of the farm project, has had many years of experience in pro-

duce business.

...K. Kawase, head farm foreman, used to operate a big farm in Canoga Park. "Our battle against the elements is difficult but, as a whole, we are doing very well. Our men work exceptionally hard and are all great farmers."

...Banichi Iguchi, issei; in charge of field No. 2, operated a farm in Seagus and now specializes in watermelon growing.

...Johnny Fukazawa, foreman for fields Nos. 3, 4, 5, and 6, heads a 20-man crew. Incidentally, he is the only nisei in his department.
