# INDUCTION INTO RELOCATION CAMPS

Forsons peroled from interment camps will no longer be eligible for induction into the relocation conters as residents, in accordance with the post-exclusion pelicy of WRA on inductions and reinductions, Relocation Program Officer Valter A. Heath revealed.

He said that the Imnigration and laturalization Service, administering interment camps, has been advised of the ruling.

The relocation program officer said that internoca who ney be paroled in the futuro, howover, will have the privileges of visiting contors for poriods of not more then 30 days for relocation planning purposes, provided sponsorship arrengononts are made before loaving internment camps end advance approval (by submission of Forn MRA 388) is obtained from the director of the contorte bo visitod.

#### TOOELE 'SUCCESS' USE OF NISELAT

As a result of the "un-usual success" of persons of Japanese ancestry working at the Tooele, Utah and the Sioux, Nebraska Ordnance Depots, the War Department has agreed that persons of Japanese ancestry who are free to travel anywhore within the United States may make application and will be accepted for employment at Ordnance Depots in exactly the same mennoras any other citizen applying for ordnance depot work, Relocation Pro-Officer Walter A. gram Heath disclosed.

He said that this will mean that it will no longer be necessary for evacuees to fill out the Personnel Security Questionnaire and obtain a prior clearance from the Provost Marshal Office before General's

Persons of Japanese ancestry may make application simply by filling out a. do so. Such boys can make Personnel Security Quos- arrangements to report tionnaire the same as any other employee before entoring on duty, but pre-

clearance of this questionnaire will not be required as in the past.

Heath advised however, that evacuoes request proclearance which they may still obtain by filling out the Questionneire and sending it to the depot with a covoring Letter of explanation at the same time application forms aro forwarded. PiGO has denied clearance to a large .per cont of those who have applied in the past.

The depot can then deal directly with the PMGO in handling the PSQ. It will not be necessary for conters or field offices to forward the Personnel Security Questionnaire to the Provest Marshal Goneral's Office as in the past.

It was also rovoeled that mon in the Inlisted Reservo Corps who wish to obtain employment at the Tocolo Ordnanco Dopot in Utah may directly to the depot and work until they are called for activo duty.
