

# Treasury Department Unblocks Accounts Of Cleared Evacuees

The Treasury Department has informed the WRA that they will unblock all but a limited number of accounts of evacuees on the army clear list to aid the WRA in its relocation and liquidation program, according to an announcement from the Department of the Interior in Washington, D. C.

Forms to request unblocking orders will be forwarded to the Federal Reserve Bank in San Francisco through the project director. The bank will determine whether the statements on the individual forms are correct. Individual unblocking orders will be mailed in care of the project director, and private banks will be notified.

Evacuees in the following categories are ineligible to apply for unblocking orders through this special arrangement with the Treasury Department.

1. Persons not on the army clear list.
2. Those who have been issued specific blocking orders.
3. Evacuees who have represented or acted as agents for any person outside the continental United States on or since July 26, 1941.

4. Persons who now hold funds belonging to blocked nationals.

Those who are eligible may, however, apply for reconsideration of their cases by filing Form TCU-1 with the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco. Business enterprises may apply for unblocking through the same procedure.

Unblocked persons and business enterprises are subject to specified reporting and other requirements.

## ACLU Attorney Hits Orders Of Military

LOS ANGELES—American citizens of Japanese descent are treated with less respect for their legal rights than . . . civilians under martial law, or even enemy nationals in a conquered city, A. L. Wirin, counsel for the Southern California Branch of the American Civil Liberties Union told Judge Pierson M. Hall of the Los Angeles Federal District Court in arguing for an injunction to restrain Western Defense Commander General H. C. Pratt from excluding three Japanese Americans from the West Coast.

The three Japanese Americans Dr. George Ochikubo, Oakland dentist; Kiyoshi Shigekawa, San Pedro fisherman; and Elmer Yamamoto, Los Angeles attorney, were barred from the West Coast by individual army orders after they had been certified as loyal by the WRA after FBI investigation, the ACLU attorney declared.

He stated that the United States must be prepared to extend the hand of fellowship to the remaining Japanese "if we are to continue believing in our principles of democracy."

## WAR VETERAN VISITS CENTER ON FURLOUGH

Pfc. Toshio Yamabe, son of Mrs. Tomiye Kijima of 13-4-3, who was wounded in action while fighting with the famed 442nd Japanese American Infantry Regiment attached to the 36th Division of the United States Seventh Army, was a visitor to this center last week.

## Camp Roberts

Inducted into the armed forces on September 25, 1941 in Los Angeles, Calif., Pfc. Yamabe received his 13 weeks of Infantry basics at Camp Roberts, Calif. After the basic was completed, he was assigned to the M Company of the 159th Infantry, and later transferred to the 13th Engineers on January 1942.

In March, 1942, he transferred to the Sixth Service Command, with headquarters company at Fort Custer, Mich., and worked in the Personnel Office of the post headquarters.

## Camp Blanding

He was later transferred to Camp Blanding, Florida for 17 weeks Infantry Training and went overseas to Italy in September 1944.

He saw no action in Italy and was transferred to France in October 1944 and assigned to the 442nd Infantry Regiment.

Pfc. Yamabe participated in the capture of Bruyeres and Belmont, France and in the flanking movement with the O'Connor's task force to relieve the stalemate between the Allied and German armies.

## Lost Battalion

He also had a part in the rescue of the First Battalion of the 141st Regiment of the 36th Division known as the "Lost Battalion."

After setting up defensive positions, he was hit by a fragment of a land mine and was hospitalized November 7, 1944 for the wound and trench foot. He was then evacuated to the United States on March 28, 1945.

## Awards

Among the citations and decorations which cluster his uniform are the Purple Heart, Presidential Unit Citation, C-T-O Ribbon, American Defense Ribbon, Good Conduct Ribbon and Combat Infantryman Badge.

Prior to the evacuation, Pfc. Yamabe resided at 2449 South San Gabriel Boulevard, Garvey, Calif., and was a nurseryman.

# Sole Surviving Son To Be Placed In Inactive Duty

In a joint extension of their "sole surviving son" policy, the War and Navy Departments have announced that they will place in non-hazardous duty other service members of families in which two or more persons have died in line of duty or are reported missing in action or prisoners of war, the Department of the Interior reported this week.

War and Navy Department officials estimate that the new policy will affect approximately 10,000 individuals in both services. They stated that no action to reassign surviving members by the servicemen involved or will be taken unless requested by a member of his immediate family.

Requests involving army personnel should be addressed to the Adjutant General, Washington, D. C. Cases which previously have been submitted and denied should be resubmitted for consideration under the new and broader policy, the point statement advised.

## Japanese Returnees Treated 'Kindly' In Los Angeles Area

Everyone in Los Angeles treats all Japanese kindly and it is just the same as before the war, H. A. Bernardo, Los Angeles district manager of the Central Life Insurance Co. of Illinois declared in a letter to Kay Kubota of 5-2-5, in disclosing that there are many persons of Japanese ancestry who have or are re-establishing themselves in Los Angeles.

The letter reads in part:

"Mr. Kiichi Uyeda of your co-op store there opened his 5 and 10 store on April 5. Next door to him, Mr. Kawa, formerly owner of the Enbun Grocery on East First Street near Weller, is opened a fish market on April 15. These (stores) are close to the former Miyake Hotel. Mr. T. K. Sanyanagi owns the buildings. He also owns a store building on North Main where he used to have a general store. Mr. Kiyoto will open his sweater store on First and Weller in the near future. The New King Hotel on 208 S. Broadway was just bought by a Japanese fellow, I do not know his name.

Mr. Fong of the Yet Quong Low Chinese Cafe on 339 1/2 East First opened a hotel on April 10 at 321 E. Second Street. . . . He is renting the rooms exclusively to Japanese. It is a 40-room hotel and there will be community kitchens, with price of rooms at about \$10.50 per week for a couple. I have met many of my old friends at the Yet Quong

## GERMANY SURRENDERS TO ALLIES UNCONDITIONALLY IN ALL FRONTS

Announcing the crushing defeat of the German Nation, President Harry Truman went on the radio on Tuesday morning at six o'clock and dedicated the war effort to bringing the Japanese Nation to unconditional surrender.

The president was joined in the announcement of the end of hostilities in Europe by Prime Minister Winston Churchill who emphasized that Japan remains "unsubdued" and must be brought to justice.

On Wednesday, Marshal Stalin proclaimed the surrender of Germany to the people of Russia.

Actually the last shot in a war that has inflicted an estimated 4,000,000 casualties was fired at 11 p.m. Monday evening (P.W.T.) when Gen. Patton's 3rd Army, deep in Czechoslovakia received its "cease firing" order.

## Eisenhower

General Eisenhower told his troops in an order of the day that "the crusade on which we embarked in the early summer of

1944 has reached its glorious conclusion. It is my especial privilege in the names of all nations represented in this theatre of war to commend each of you for valiant performance of duty," he stated.

Under the hard terms laid down at Casablanca the guns of Germany are silent and what remains of her once famed Luftwaffe is grounded. Under orders from her high command her submarines are headed for home ports and the Europe which once was Hitler's is now completely in the hands of the Allied powers.

The German capitulation was made by Gen. Gustav Jodl German Chief of Staff when he affixed his name to the document of unconditional surrender and delivered the former Nazi controlled country to the Allied powers.

The crushing defeat of the German nation was announced to the American people at six o'clock (P.W.T.) Tuesday morning, May 8.

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## V-E DAY

Following announcements from the heads of Allied Nations the bells of victory in Europe tolled throughout the world. Peace had come in one of the two great areas of combat after five years eight months and a few days of fighting. A mighty enemy had gone down to unconditionally surrender before the power of most of the civilized world.

In factories throughout the nation there was no interruption of the tremendous effort to continue turning out the great engines of war that will travel across the Pacific Ocean to loose their destructive power against one nation. One nation stands alone against a world and that world now gives assurance that from the battlefields in Europe will come seasoned and victorious warriors bringing with them the equipment no longer needed to battle the German nation.

Until now Japan has felt the power of a United States which was fighting with one hand tied behind its back. It has scarcely felt the power of the British who have been preoccupied with the now vanquished Nazis.

Even so Japan has suffered reverses since McArthur's little band of Yanks landed on the shores of Guadalcanal in August of 1942. Reverses which now find the fighting in the Ryukyus a few hundred miles from the home island. Reverses which have caused the great cities of the Island Empire to lie in ruins.

To Manzanar residents it means that the end of the Pacific war can now be seen. Relocation can not be put off much longer. It is a fact that must be faced and a fact that is being faced by many residents. The latest figures show that the total remaining population of Manzanar is 4856. Only two weeks ago the population dropped for the first time below the 5000 figure. Bus loads of people are leaving almost weekly. Daily they go out to jobs and homes where once again they can be happy in normal communities.

Times are changing rapidly. Manzanar, once a place that promised long time residence has fulfilled that promise as many people celebrated their third anniversary in this camp last month. But times have changed and the pace of change is increasing as the final phases of the unhappy war in the Pacific moves into its latter stages. Those who have waited for the war to end are watching the sand run low in the hour glass.—A.W.D.

## Relatives of War Heroes Warned Against Swindlers

Next of kin of war heroes should guard against fraudulent schemes based on published casualty lists the War Department recently warned.

Varying forms of such swindles by individuals and groups have come to the attention of army officials. One of the commonest is to write the next of kin, as taken from newspaper casualty lists, seeking further information on the soldier listed as a casualty. The next of kin is advised that the deceased soldier is to be given a special niche in a so-called "hall of fame," a "hero's memorial book" or photographic layout.

Deposits in advance or other cash requirements are set forth. As soon as the remittance is received from the next of kin, the transaction is closed and another American fighting man's family has been victimized.

The United States Post Office Department is taking vigorous action against all such cases involving illegal use of the mails.

Low. It is the headquarters for the Japanese. You know, Mr. Fong's wife is a Japanese.

"It will be about six months before the real adjustment of return of Japanese can take place as the housing shortage is terrible.

"Dr. Ichioka and his wife, who is also a doctor, have opened their clinic on the east side a couple of months ago and are doing a land office business. Dr. Murakami and Mr. Suzuki came over from Poston. Suzuki was formerly an X-ray man at the Japanese hospital. Dr. Murakami will open his office soon. The daughter of Mr. Kusayanagi is a doctor and is the wife of Dr. James Goto. They will open a clinic soon. There will be three or more business houses open on East First in the next month or so and more to follow.

"Pasadena and Beverly Hills people want many gardeners, domestics and cooks. So far there has been very few white collar jobs offered but they will come along in due time.

"Everything is okay for the return but it is in the early stages and therefore it is not very easy to find just the right kind of a job. The government is building thousands of housing units all over the country. 2000 units going up right now in Watts for Colored. Also in Long Beach and South Gate, in Burbank and on the west side, more (are) going to be started soon. So this will relieve the situation."
