SIX MANZANAR BOYS GET NOTICES TO REPORT FOR ARMY PHYSICALS

Pre-induction physical notices to report for examinations in Los Angeles on Tuesday, were received this week by six Manzanar boys, according to an announcement from Thelma Kellesvig, head of the Manzanar Selective Service matters.

The boys were Kay Takashi Osumi, 6-3-5; Kohei Nakaji, 24-14-2; Mamoru Shishido, 3-7-1; Haruki Murakami, 2-14-5; Akisuga Saka, 2-1-3; and Seizo Tanabata, 10-13-3.

The group will leave Monday night, 9 p.m. for Los Angeles on a special bus from Bishop, Cal.

Three other groups were previously called for their pre-induction physicals in Los Angeles.

Ministers Appalled At Japanese Haters

Ministers were "appalled" at Seattle's "Promoters Arthur Ritchie's idea to 'band the national Japanese haters together and put the whole business on the paying basis," the Time Magazine relates.

Time states that Ritchie and a friend, A. E. McCorskey, are Owners' Protective League and are charging \$10 initiation fees, and \$1 a month dues, and have hundreds of paying members.

"We'll hire lobbyists, legal aid... get a constitutional amendment to take the Japs' citizenship away and move them out," Ritchie said.

He added, "We'll go national as soon as we are solid on the West Coast. Why you're going to have ten million soldiers coming back from Japan all maimed and crippled and every one a missionary for this movement."

Carey McWilliams Hits Anti-Japanese In PM Newspaper

NEW YORK—In his first of the series of articles for the PM on the West Coast racial situation, against the background of the San Francisco Conference, Carey McWilliams, the well-known writer, predicts that the WRA's whole program will be profoundly "affected by what happens on the West Coast within the next three months.

He notes that leaders like Dr. Paul S. Taylor of the University of California, Attorney General Robert W. Kenny, and Frank A. Clark, editor of the San Francisco News, "have been reminding Californians—and with telling effect—that the eyes of the world will be riveted on the West Coast during the conference." He says that it is possible that the conference may induce the region to try to beat down agitation against returning evacuees.

On a recent West Coast trip, McWilliams says that he found general improvement in the attitudes, along with some attempts to renew organized anti-evacuee activities.

He notes the lack of incidents in the state for Washington, as contrasted with the anti-evacuee activity in Oregon, where boycott of R. Taubota in a Portland market has caused some evacuees in the centers to delay their return pending the outcome of this discrimination.

McWilliams thinks that the War Food Administration should be concerned about this "spite boycott" in the view of the general food crisis, and says that a concerted action by the federal agencies aided by organized action in Portland, could break the boycott.

According to the author, New York City is one of the best markets for Hood River apples and growers have become concerned over the reports that these apples have been boycotted in New York.

"With the growing realization that the boycott is a two-edged weapon, a gradual change of attitude is likely to occur (particularly if New York consumers will be so kind as to continue to apply a little discreet economic pressure)," he concludes.

Akron Companies Discredit Claim Of J. O'Donnell

CLEVELAND, Ohio, May 19—Akron, Ohio, rubber companies and manpower officials have flatly denied the recent charges by Columbus John O'Donnell of the Washington Times-Herald that worked in Akron factory and their output had exceeded that of white workers, and that the government would not permit publication of reports or pictures of it.

The refutation said in part, "executives of rubber companies, U.S. Employment and Manpower officials, labor leaders, and army officers who have intimate knowledge of operating conditions in the rubber factories here have given flat denials that any Japanese Americans ever were tried out here on any production jobs."

The Great Lakes WRA office made a check and found less than 15 evacuees working in Akron at the present time.

Hiro Neeno Praises Wisconsin Reception

"I cannot praise too highly the friendly reception accorded me during my stay in Milwaukee," declared former Manzanar resident Hiro Neeno, who stopped here briefly on his way to Los Angeles.

He continued: "It is an ideal residential city with numerous job and recreational facilities for everyone. To those who are intending to relocate in the Milwaukee.

"My stay of two years in Milwaukee has made me overcome the fright or fear as one may have who resides in the center."

From Los Angeles, Hiro Neeno reports that he has not yet been discriminated.

"Since coming to Los Angeles, I have visited numerous eating, entertainment and recreational places but have found no discrimination. People on the streets accept us as any other pedestrian. Housing is acute, jobs available, and the weather mild.

"I took advantage of the established hostel to get my footing as many others are doing. I have been reinstated to my Federal Civil Service job and am quite pleased.

Hiro Neeno relocated to Milwaukee, Wis., on March 17, 1943. While in Manzanar, he was mail coordinator, Block 32 Manager, president of the board of directors of the Manzanar Co-op and chairman of the work corp.

His family still resides in the center at 32-12-2 and consists of his father, Masaburo; mother, Shigeko; sister, Lillian; and another sister, Mrs. Hiromu Yamada.

Japanese In Chicago Shot by Negro Boy

CHICAGO, Ill.—Keigo Miura, Stevens Hotel employee was wounded slightly by a bullet fired by a Negro youth recently in Chicago, the Chicago WRA office reports. He has already returned to work.

Miura said that he and several Negro boys and girls age 16 and 17 were standing on the Safety Island at 61st and State Streets at 10 p.m. when one of the boys suddenly produced a small pistol and shot him.

He was not robbed and there is no apparent motivation for the shooting, the WRA said.

VANDALS DEFACE HOME OF NISEI

SEATTLE, Wash., May 19—A home owned by a Japanese American was recently defaced by vandals in the Beacon Hill district, according to the Seattle Times.

A visiting Chinese American soldier, Pfc. Fred Long is quoted as saying that "it is just acts as this that will breed another war. Just when you think that you have things straightened out, someone starts hating again and hate breeds wars."

Besmirch Principles

"In California, since the beginning of this year, there have been 16 shooting incidents directed at American citizens of Japanese ancestry. The Americans who were targets of this terror had returned to their homes with the express permission of the United States Army. Their loyalty had been carefully scrutinized and certified by army authorities. Some of them had been honorably discharged from the army itself. Some had been released from the camps of the War Relocation Authority after the Supreme Court of the United States had declared the detention of loyal citizens on grounds of race to be unconstitutional. These Americans are being persecuted because of their racial background—in the same way and for just the same reasons that prompted the Nazi persecution of racial minorities. When we gape at German atrocities, we might cast a backward glance at these atrocities of our own.

"A California jury has acquitted three men who were charged with having planted a dynamite bomb on the farm of Sumio Doi, recently released from a relocation camp. We do not know the details of the evidence against these men. But we do know that the presiding judge permitted the introduction of questions respecting the validity of Doi's purchase of his ranch under the California Alien Land Act and that the defense attorney was allowed to tell the jury, 'This is a white man's country. Let's keep it so.' We had supposed that 'trials' of this character had ended with the collapse of Hitler's fortress.

"These atrocities have been happening not far from San Francisco, where the representatives of 48 nations—comprising people of every race and color—are striving to create a new organization to keep the peace. They are besmirch our principles and our pretensions. They are perpetrated, to be sure, by no more than a few bigoted hoodlums. Nevertheless, they do injury to all—not only to our good name but also to the institutions upon which our own security and orderly way of life is founded. If California authorities cannot uphold the law and protect the citizens of their own state, they should call for help from the federal government. Terrorism is no less ugly at home than abroad."

Purely Personal

May 8, 1945. Today is V-E Day. Europe after more than five years of bloodshed, destruction and suffering will now know the lonely emptiness of quiet. Guns will be silent. The khaki of the military, the rumble of heavy trucks will still be there to keep vigil with those who sleep in eternity. Yes, the enemy has laid down his arms and what do you think as you read the blazing black headlines that tell of the beginning of the end?

You see the picture of *Il Duce's* body sprawled in the soil that he stained with the blood of a thousand youths. You read the eyewitness description of war victims kicking and spitting on the body. Did you turn away from the paper to find yourself, sick in the stomach? You didn't believe that men could crawl to the low level of primitive animals. You asked your friends angrily: "What good is it to spit and kick a dead man? Will it bring back the men who fell in battle?" Will it bring back the laughter to the families whose war ended with the receiving of a 2-started telegram? You're sick because men can't find decency and common goodness in their seeking for revenge. No one has the right to give an order deliberately snuffing out innocent lives. It has been done. It can not be undone by demanding an eye for an eye a tooth for a tooth. War criminals haven't enough eyes, enough teeth to pay for the broken hearts, the burning cities, the world-wide desolation.

You notice the shining eyes of your friend are dull. She married an officer in March, spent two weeks with him. He was killed last Fourth of July. You hold a Christmas package in your hands. It was mailed early in October and came back in January. An unfamiliar handwriting: "Deceased sixth November 1944." In a restaurant you overhear a soldier: "Why celebrate V-E Day? My buddies are still in the Philippines." His service stripes signify six years in uniform, two and one-half years in the Pacific area.

You read a soldier's mail—slightly wounded, he writes, nothing serious. The same day your girl friend calls to tell you that Pvt. So and So was killed in Italy. Only a few days before Italy surrendered.

The switchboard buzzes all morning at the library. "Will you be open all day today? Old Glory flies from buildings everywhere—there's one whipping bravely beside a gold star service flag. At 8 p.m. you go to services at the Presbyterian Church. You pray for those who made the supreme sacrifice. You asked for courage for the wounded—faith for the bereaved. You asked that peace and harmony cover the land and the world that you love. You wonder how your fellow countrymen will react when full Allied Forces turn to the Pacific. It was just last night when an Israel said: "You're American but you can't change your features. And there are still some people who don't understand." This is your reaction to V-E Day, May 8, 1945.

When a man gets sick, he will go to the doctor. When the doctor leaves him, he will think that his life is ended. After that, he will think that he belongs to the undertaker's department. That is the way people think in the present day. But there is a group of men who go between doctor and the undertaker. They will treat the sick who are in critical condition and lead him to recovery.

In the practical life, they will have a certain amount for medical expense figured in their budget. Such life as in Manzanar where medical fee is granted by the government is a very rare system indeed.

After evacuees relocate, their first thought is this medical problem. Therefore, a way to study his health concern or health engineering must be very important.

This writer has been attacked by gout since four months ago. Although I was under the care of a doctor for three weeks, I didn't feel any improvement.

Fortunately, I met a man who is master of Nishi System Health Engineering. Following his advice I am doing pretty well now. This method of health keeping is very easy to practice although it is pains-taking effort to follow.

Its principle is very deep and scientific. Let us listen to what Mr. Nishi says. (Excerpt from Mr. Nishi's Lecture) "Let us talk about the sugar. It will be better not to use much sugar for a man my size (he weighs about 150 pounds). One day's dose of sugar shouldn't exceed more than five cubes. If you take over this dose your blood will oxidize and get disease of calcium shortage." (To be continued)

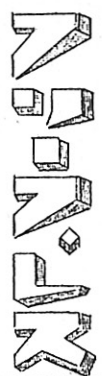
