## Coastal Return By 12,000 Estimated

WASHINGTON, D.C.- Dillon S. Myer, war relocation authority director, disclosed recently that an estimated 12,000 Japanese Americans will return from reocation centers to civilian life California by January 1, 1946 stated the Los Angeles Daily News.
Myer added that some 11,420 others have indicated their intention to resettle there, and tha some 580 evacuees have already returned to southern California. Some 55,000 persons are still in relocation centers who have been cleared by the army and are
therefore eligible for relceation.

"I'm a mother with two boys lying wounded in a hospital, and another in China. All I can say is get out of our city. We . . have too many worries at presen to rid the town of Japs-but wait until this war is over. You will see."
This and other letters were turned over to the WRA. They advised her not to fear for "you will be protected. This must be a law-abiding nation. If you re-
quest protection, you will get it."
