 OBSERVE MEMORIAL DAYIOS AIGDILS, June 6--Approximately 100 Iisei and Issea were on hand to witness the first Yemorial Day services for the dead of Japanese ancestry in Los Angeles since the year of evacuation at the Los Angeles avergreen Cemetery, on May 30, the Los Angeles. WRA Office reports.

The evacuecs laid flowers on the graves, and then listencd to five ministers of different faiths who spoke to the assemblage from the basc of the memorial tower in the center of the Japaisese section of the cemetery.

All Japenese graves were found to be in perfect order.

SACRAMMITO, Junc 6 -Amoricans of Japancso ancostry who arc "disloyel" to the Jnited States, will be doniod the right to own land in California undor the terms of a bill disclosed this wook by Domocratic Sonator Hugh M. Burns of Frespo, the San Francisco Chronicle announcod.

## ASK PROOF

The Chroniclo stated that tho bill providos that the burden of proof would be on the individual to show ho is not practicing dual citizenship, through maintenazco of allegiance to any foreign government omperor, prince or potentato within the provisions of tho Celifornia alion land law of 1920.


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## 100 DELEGATES SUPPORT ASSEMBLY BILL THREE

SAN FRAiICISCO--About 100 delogates from all over the state, including business, civic, racial, religious, and labor organizations, presented thoir reasons. for the support of Assembly Bill Thrce in a hoaring bofore the Assembly Ways and !:cans Committce recently. They declered that this logislation was essential in the reconvursion and postwar periods.

The delcgation, which was poverfully represented in California, was opposed by threc special interest lobbyists who, in the final vote secmed to cerry much moro veight than said peoplc. By a votc of 13 to 7, with five members abstaining or abscnt, the committ:c took the bill "under gubaission."

Ordinarily an "undor submission" vote is not encouraging. Howover, through lettcrs, telcgrams and postcards which woro sent by many who are in support of the logisla tion, therc arc now two mothods of gctting action of the prosent situation, said Franl: L. Stout, oxecutive secrctary of tho Statewidc Comittoc for a California Fair Employmont Practices Comassion.

1. Projonients of the bill may subuit amendments. which will not woakon tho bill but will tend to mako it morc acco teble so that tho commiticc will at loest give itte "do pass" recommondetion.
2.. Propoinents may ask that the bill bc withdrawn from committice (a majority vote) where it can be
threshod out on the floor and passod.
"To propare for oithor. approach our rolo as cibizons is to writo to our own assomblymen making cloer that wo undorstand what can bo dono and asking thoir support," Stout concluded.

Among thosc spoaking in favor of tho legislation worc Stout; Joseph R. Zazucta, vico-prosident of tho Moxican Chamber of Commerce; Manucl Ruiz Jr., presidont of the Co-ordinating Council of Latin Americen Youth; Arthur Reicher, owner of the Bettor Foods Markets; Herry Kingman, West Coest Dircctor of the Prosident's Fair Employment Committoc; Morvyn Ratinbornc, secrotary of the California CIO Council; Rovols Cayton, vice-president of the California CIOC Council Elizabcth Williams, Borkoloy Inter-Racial Committoc member; Konneth Fung, an attorncy ropresonting tho Chineso Amorican Eitizons Allianco; igustus Hawkins, nomber of the Fair Bmployment Practices Commission; and Sgt. Paul Sakai, votoran of World War II.

## WRITER PRESCOTT CRITICIZES MAKI'S BOOK ON JAPAN

NEW YORK- "The Japeneso poople aro.not.likely to ontor into tho paths of rightoousness after tho war," John M. Malci, author of a now book on Japan declarod, according to tho Now York Daily Vous.

In a book roview appoaring in the How York Timos; Writer Orville Prescott doscribes Maki's now book as "scholerly and informa tive" ${ }^{\text {If }}$ - but "monstrously dull", of valuc chiofly to officials concernod with the - war and future poaco in the Pacifici, but "of littilo coriseqience" to tho general public.

It is not a history of Japan, according to Proscott, "but raticr a treatisc on Jepancso institutions that citos ruch his. tory to malce its points:"

Author: Meki says that
the Japanoso pooplo hevo not taken any part in thoir own government sinco 660 $B C$, so that both thoy and the imperor havo beon poworloss in tho hands of the militaristic ruling cliquo。

The United Nations, he says, must roindoctrinato a nation by outlawing tho vicious "thought police", abolition of stato control of education, elimination of great monopo lics, and organization of popular govornmoñ:-

John Maki was born in Tacoma, Wash., of Japanoso parents añ"was lator adoptod by a Caucasian family. Ho studiod in Japan for two ycars and taught Japer. nosé studios at tho Univorsity of Washingtonuntil 1942, when ho camo to Weshington, D.C. to do war work.
