RULES ON EQUIPMENT DISPOSITION GIVEN

General instructions on how to dispose of equipment in the WRA centers were sent to the various projects by WRA Director Dillon S. Myer.

The instructions state that refrigerators are to be disconnected, and cleaned. The large refrigerators are to be left in the building, but the small refrigerators are to be moved to the warehouse or to the central location. The same applies to stoves, kitchen ranges, toilets, bowls, sinks and tubs.

Hot water systems, tanks, boiler (furnaces) are to be disconnected, drained, oiled, and left in the building.

Tables in the mess halls are to be surveyed and the materials used in the manner are to be left in the individual mess halls.

NEW RULING GIVES TEMPORARY AID TO FAMILY RESETTLERS

Temporary assistance to relocating persons will now be provided at the center instead of through the Social Security Board and welfare departments throughout the country as heretofore, according to Walter Heath, relocation program officer and Mrs. Margaret D'illo, welfare counselor.

Under procedure received from Washington, each center has been given a small allotment to take care of critical needs of relocating families. The method of giving assistance and the amount of assistance given to families will be exactly the same at all

centers.

Money is available for second hand furniture for those families who have none and cannot find furnished apartments, and for paying expenses of moving personal property from the freight depot at the place of relocation to the new home. In all ordinary cases, it is expected that the regular grant of \$25 per person will be used to pay grocery and rent until pay checks are received.

Although sufficient money is available to take care of critical needs, the total amount of money (Continued on Page 4)

ARMY DISBANDED ERC STATUS FOR NISEI

Persons of Japanese ancestry will no longer be placed in the Listed Reserve Corps, according to a letter written by Lt. Col. R. J. Miller, Infantry, chief of recruiting and induction branch officer of Fort Douglas, Utah. The Minidoka Irrigator disclosed.

The Irrigator states that upon induction into the service, persons of Japanese ancestry will be immediately shipped to a reception center as are all other inductees.

At press time no such information was available at Manzanar.

available is so small that expenditures will be greatly limited. In order to save money for large families who would find it impossible to relocate without government assistance, no aid can be given to single people and childless couples. More money will be given to large families with only one wage-earner than to families with more than one wage-earner, and families of three or four with two wage-earners will not be assisted except in emergency cases.

CONTINUE AID

The Social Security Board and welfare departments will continue to care for dependent families that will need government help through the months ahead. Welfare departments on the outside will continue to have federal money to take care of unforeseen emergencies such as sickness or need caused by loss of employment.

ESSENTIAL NEEDS

Merritt, the project director, said that by the new plan for assisting the relocation of large families people will now know before leaving the center how much they will receive and will receive the check by mail on arrival at their destination. He warned, however, that the amount of money allocated to Manzanar is so small that only essential needs of a small number of families can be taken care of. Families having critical need should apply to the Relocation Office.

ARGUMENTS HEARD ON

ANTI-JAPANESE LAND LAW

SACRAMENTO — Arguments for a bill which would prevent Japanese Americans from owning land or boats unless such citizens can prove their loyalty to the United States were heard by the Senate Judiciary Committee, according to the San Francisco News.

Another hearing on the bill is scheduled.

J.M. Inman, former state senator and representative of the California Preservation Association — for formerly the Anti-Japanese Committee — told senate committee, "We are inclined to be too tender to persons of Japanese ancestry."

Inman added that he knew of hundreds of cases where, if proper steps were taken, it can be proven Japanese have acquired land fraudulently. He said that he has petitions signed by 8000 persons wanting the bill.

Don't get excited and listen to me and I'll explain. The reason I adopted this method to cure this wound is reasonable and the right thing. To his comprehension then, he looked at his watch and he said it is time to test her temperature and went into the patient's room. If any member of your family get hurt, I dare not say to keep away from a doctor but if the hospital is situated near by, get your wound bound to stop the bleeding and walk around the hospital building two, three rounds, for about one hour and get into the surgical room.

I am sure that you will hear the doctor saying, "Why are you here - I am told that you were hurt but I don't see any wound on you."

About forty or fifty years ago, it was declared by physicians that it is harmful to treat a newly arrived baby with preparation of intestes (this is customary method in ancient Japan).

In present day Japan, the physical condition of youth is bitterly low and while Japan is endeavoring to learn the cause of this disadvantage and restoration of health, I can point out that one of the major cause of this physical declination of Japanese is due to the change of infant treatment of about half century ago following direction of medical theory of that time.

It passed about twelve years since publishing of *Nishi System of Health Treatment*. (This lecture was made in the year 1939).

If people will thoroughly understand *Nishi* theory there should be no sickness among human society.

Nishi way will take human body as a whole---every organ with intimate connection. For instance, if a man gets liver trouble which means gall-bladder is hard, gall-bladder trouble means Jaundice, has connection with bladder, or the vesicle connected with kidney. Therefore, it will be impossible to cure a disease without studying this connection. (To be continued).
