DOCTOR CARTER ACCEPTS JOB AS DIRECTOR OF RESEARCH

Dr. Genevieve Carter, superintendent of the Manzanar Schools, will resign her present position to accept employment as a director of the research division in Los Angeles Council of Social Agencies. Dr. Carter will leave at the end of the month and will report for her new work in July. Her assignment will be concerned with research and coordination information concerning the 95 Los Angeles host agencies.

Before coming to Manzanar, Dr. Carter had a background of teaching, was a school supervisor, chief juvenile probation officer, director of the San Francisco host agency and a member of the University of California staff.

She has a doctor's degree from the University of California and has done

graduate work at Columbia University and at the University of New Mexico. She also did graduate training in education administration, psychiatry, social work and clinical psychology. She also holds California superintendent of school credentials.

Dr. Carter came to Manzanar in May 1942, as a member of the University of California staff, to write a report of the progress of evacuation program which was not yet initiated. She returned to Manzanar on June 15, 1942 as a member of the WRA staff and began work on the tremendous problem of recruiting teachers, finding buildings, ordering equipment and organizing a school program.

FORMER MANZANAR GIRLS AMONG STUDENTS AT UCLA

Michiko Kataoka and Moriko Hoshiyama, both from Manzanar, are among the Nisei students at University of California in Los Angeles, the Los Angeles WRA officer reveals.

Miss Kataoka is a freshman and Miss Hoshiyama is a Junior. Both of them found a part-time household job in Santa Monica where they live and earn while attending UCLA.

Before their removal from the coast in 1942, Michiko Kataoka lived in Tujunga and Moriko Hoshiyama in West Los Angeles.

Miss Kataoka's mother is still at 35-7-5, Manzanar, and Miss Hoshiyama's parents at 35-2-3, Manzanar. The girls haven't been away from the center long, and hope in time to find houses so their folks can join them.

The Reverend Kano, formerly of Scottsbluff, Nebraska, is at present studying at the Episcopal seminary in Neshotah, Wisconsin. He received his bachelor's degree from the Imperial University in Tokyo and his master's from the University of Nebraska. His wife and daughter Adelino, who has just completed her freshman year at Milwaukee Downor College, make their home in Milwaukee.

Newcomers to the city are specially invited to attend the services.

FORMER BASEBALL STAR HIRES JAPANESE ON FARM

FRESNO.—H.B. "Dutch" Leonard, former Major League baseball star and presently a ranch operator, announced that he is now hiring several Japanese families on his farm, the Los Angeles Times stated.

When the quote is met, Leonard expects to have 75 former evacuees employed.

ST. PAUL PIONEER PRESS PRAISES NISEI SOLDIERS

ST. PAUL, Minn.—Formation of the Japanese American 100th Infantry Battalion at the beginning of the war was an inspired act, the St. Paul Pioneer Press declared editorially recently.

"In three years of fighting, the outfit earned a service record that is unexcelled in the entire history of the U.S. Army.

And yet, some Nisei soldiers, "invalided home early in the war, found themselves the target of violent prejudice in the West. They were kicked out of restaurants and barber shops, their homes were fired upon and they were reviled.

"Publication now of the summary of the battalion's achievements should call a complete halt upon persecutions ... of all Nisei. From now on, the courage and the blood, invested by the 100th in Italy should pay handsome dividends."

CLEVELAND ISSEI PUBLISHES REPORT

CLEVELAND, Ohio—Of special interest to center Issei is the "Cleveland Issei Club Report", which is about Issei resettlement there. It is prepared and written in Japanese by the club.

This report, in booklet form, is now in all of the WRA center libraries and relocation offices. The publication describes the Cleveland district, the experiences of some of the city's Issei and, in general, tell about living conditions there.

The four officers of the Issei club who edited the pamphlet are President George Tange of Cleveland; Vice President H. Matsu-shige of Hollywood, Secretary Masao Kondo of Long Beach and Treasurer S. Mori of Olympia, Wash.

CALIFORNIA 'HOODLUMS' CRITICIZED BY SIXTEEN

SAN FRANCISCO—The almost daily cowardly attacks by California hoodlums on the homes of loyal American Japanese citizens must be stopped, once and for all by the rapid and firm action of the respectable citizens of the state, 16 San Francisco citizens declared in a letter to the editor adding, "Unfortunately, facts seem to indicate that the local authorities are basically sympathetic with the actions of the vandals, since very few of these bullies have been arrested and none have been convicted."

The letter continues:

"As citizens of California we ask Attorney General Robert Kenny that the state authorities intervene in the matter and demonstrate to the rest of the country that all Californians are not latent fascists."

VANDALS ATTEMPT TO BURN GARAGES OF TWO JAPANESE

EAHANFORD—Vandals attempted to burn three garages owned by Americans of Japanese ancestry in this valley, the Los Angeles Times reports.

A highly inflammable oil had been spattered over the floor of one garage where the fire started. This garage was not in use for several years, and is owned by George Omata.

The other two garages are owned by Harry Totsukawa.

Fires were extinguished with a loss of \$250.

COMMUNITY LEADERS HOLD MEETING IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, D.C.—An interested group of local resettlers, welfare workers, and community leaders, including about 80 Issei and Nisei, attended a public forum on the topic, "After The WRA—What?", sponsored by the Nisei Resettlers Council of Washington, D.C. recently at the New York Avenue Presbyterian Church.

The meeting was arranged by the council's Family Service Committee.

Each speaker represented a community resource which is implementing the WRA relocation program in Washington.

OREGON READER LEE COMMENTS ON HATRED

PORTLAND, Oreg.—A few weeks ago, a reader of the Portland Oregonian wrote a letter to the editor in which he expressed his hatred against persons of Japanese ancestry and called himself a true American.

This week in a letter to the Oregonian, Ontario reader Robert Lees declared that the letter which was authored by Richard Scotts a few weeks ago reminds him of the Ku Klux Klan official who attacked Ella Jaws and Negroes and called him a "100 per cent American."

Concluding his letter he stated that "I'm a 200 per cent American...I hate everybody."

DILLON MYER DETERMINED TO CLOSE CENTERS

"Despite all the emphasis that has been placed by this office on the closing of centers by January 2, 1946, I am still receiving reports which indicate that some of our project personnel remains skeptical," WRA Director Dillon S. Myer declared in a letter to all project directors, except Tule Lake.

His letter continues:

"Some staff members apparently are not only dubious in their minds of our ability to complete the relocation job on schedule, but many of them are openly expressing their doubts in the presence of evacuee residents.

"If these reports are true, I am deeply disappointed. Personnel members who engage in this kind of activity are not only disloyal to the program of which they should be an integral part but are doing a serious disservice to the residents by building up expectations which cannot and will not be realized. The status of our operating funds and our relocation plans is such that there is no feasible alternative to closing the eight relocation centers on schedule even if we felt postponement would be desirable which we do not."

MAJOR HOTCHKISS WRITES OF JAPANESE AMERICANS

Japanese American soldiers are mentioned in Major Ralph R. Hotchkiss' recent article, "This Is Our Road Home" which appeared this month in the Saturday Evening Post.

One of the Japanese American soldiers mentioned by Major Hotchkiss is "Candy", a lieutenant.

"He has fought in Italy and France and now is bound home to Hawaii for 30 days," Hotchkiss said.

Referring to the Missi Major Hotchkiss declared, "They have fought like fiends, these Missi, and the other GIs all know it and give them respect, which is an accolade the GIs give very sparingly, even on the troopship. It is evidenced in many ways -- a smile and a 'howdy' on the docks; an offer of a cigarette or stick of gum; an invitation to join in a crap game -- a lot of little things that add up. It's a nice thing to see and it makes you realize that the code that binds fighting men doesn't draw the same kind of distinctions that they used to draw at home, and maybe still do."

OREGON MAN WALKS OUT OF ANTI-NOISEI RALLY

TIGARD, Ore. -- At a Japanese Exclusion League rally recently in Tigard, Ore., one Oregonian stood up as league officers began collecting funds for their hatred campaign and asked, "Can those who believe in fair play leave?"

He then stalked out. About two-thirds of the audience went out with him, the Newsweek Magazine reports.

TO SEEK RULING ON ALIEN LAND LAWS OF CALIFORNIA

SAN DIEGO, Calif. -- Steps to secure an early ruling, first from the Supreme Court of California and then from the Supreme Court of the United States, upon the constitutionality of the California Alien Land Law were taken at San Diego recently by A.L. Wirin and J.B. Tietz, attorneys for Yoshitaro Yoshimura, with the filing of a motion in the San Diego Superior Court that a judgment should be entered in the escheat proceedings filed by the State of California against Yoshimura and other Japanese defendants, so that an immediate appeal can be taken to the higher courts, in an affidavit submitted to the court by attorney A.L. Wirin.

KOJIMA ESCAPES INJURY IN EUROPEAN BATTLE

Henry Kojima, son of Harry Kojima of 34-2-1, miraculously escaped possible injuries while on a bombing mission with the 13th Air Force, the Manzanar Catholic Church reports.

Henry, who is a Catholic, was among those in a big liberator which sighted two Japanese transports at anchor in the river at Saigon.

Braving heavy flak and five zero planes, they succeeded in downing two of the zeros and in releasing their bombs for a direct hit on one of the transports. The crew emerged from the plane and one man suffered injuries.

"My prayers are being answered and God is protecting him", declared Harry Kojima, father of Henry, when informed of the "Miracle Mission".

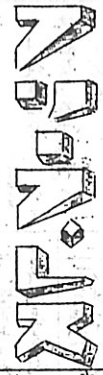
