

## WOUNDED WORLD WAR II VETERAN PFC. TAKETOMO VISITS PARENTS

Pfc. Shuji Taketomo, wounded veteran of World War II, and son of Mr. and Mrs. Seibei Taketomo of 6-7-3, is now visiting his parents and sister, Grace, on a brief furlough.

He was inducted into the army on March of 1941 in Hollywood, Calif., and was placed ved as a radio operator while in the army and went overseas in Aukust, 1944.

He was wounded in the leg while in Europe and was sent to the United States for further treatment.

Pvt. Taketomo is the wearer of a Purple Heart with clusters.

Asked about his overseas experience, he declared, "This is not for public knowledge."

Previous to joining the armed forces, Pvt. Taketomo attended the University of Cincinnati and worked as a clerk of a produce firm.

## Original Marauder Visits Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES—T-Sgt. Thomas K. Tsubota of Honolulu, one of Gen. Frank Merrill's original Marauders who raided behind the Japanese lines in Burma last year, visited Los Angeles recently according to the Daily News.

T-Sgt. Tsubota is a patient in the army hospital at Palm Springs for treatment of chronic malaria which he contracted in jungle fighting.

Enlisting in the army in June 1941, he was one of the 14 Nisei sent to General Merrill in India in September 1943. Although thoroughly trained as an interpreter, he went through a stiff course in commando an jungle fighting in India "because all Merrill's men were combat troop."

His group went up the Ledo road, out into the jungle and raided back of the Japanese lines, destroying communications, attacking enemy patrols and outposts.

The first enemy in the Pacific was captured by two Nisei from his outfit, who nabbed a Japanese submarine operator off a Hawaii reef on December 8, 1941.

## HOLD SERVICES FOR HASHIMOTO

Funeral services for the late Tatsuji "Dagwood" Hashimoto, who passed away on June 28 at the Manzanar Base Hospital, were held Tuesday afternoon at Mess Hall 16 with the Rev. Yuchi Naito officiating at the last rites.

"Dagwood" is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ryokichi Hashimoto of 9-13-2.

Prior to the evacuation, he resided at Terminal Island in Los Angeles, and worked as a fisherman.

After being evacuated from Terminal Island, he moved into the city of Los Angeles and attended the Frank Wiggins Trade School.

Arriving in Manzanar in Apr. 1942, he was employed at the Parcel Post Department until the early part of this year.

Wake services for Tatsuji was held at Mess Hall 16 on Monday night with the Rev. Seiya Sakai officiating.

## Add Murray Kandel To Appointed Staff

Honorably discharged after serving in the armed forces of the United States for four years, Lieut. Murray Kandel is now serving as Internal Security officer here.

Lieut. Kandel served over two years as an enlisted man. He was sent to Ft. Benning, Ga., Ft. Sam Houston and to Ft. Custer, Mich., where he received a commission in February, 1943. He then transferred to Miami Beach, Florida, where he trained MP companies for overseas duty. After six weeks at Ft. Harrison, Ind., Lieut. Kandel was sent to the Port of Embarkation, New Orleans, La. Here he said goodbye to the USA in July 1943.

At his new destination in Recife, Brazil, Lieut. Kandel spent six months as assistant provost marshal. His organization had to guard the US Army Force South Atlantic Theatre Headquarters, which is considered quite an honor among MP Detachments. He came out of that city with a good knowledge of the Portuguese language.

In January 1944 Lieut. Kandel transferred to a city near the equator, San Luis, Brazil, where he was again assigned as assistant provost marshal.

Lieut. Kandel returned to Miami, Florida, October 1944 and was sent ATC headquarters at Cincinnati, Ohio. From there he went to Seymour Johnson Field, N. C. and became an adjutant.

Lieut. Murray Kandel arrived here May 30, 1945 to work with the WRA.

## Lack of Teachers Closes Classes

The program of the Art Center, Sewing School, and Embroidery Class are suspended because of the resignation and forthcoming relocation of the instructional staff, announced Rollin C. Fox.

Mrs. Chiyo Fuchi, Mrs. Chiyo Ishii and Shinobu Kitada were teaching at the Sewing School in 16-7.

The Art Center, 12-15, is closed for the time being due to the resignation of Takeo Itokawa. It does not appear likely that the Art Center will open because of relocation.

Mrs. Fusae Kadota, who has been teaching the embroidery classes in 18-20, has resigned and this program is temporarily disbanded.

## 200 JAPANESE WORKERS SOUGHT B CONSTRUCTION CORPORATION

In conjunction with the Philadelphia Housing Authority, the Naval Section of the Petroleum Authority for War, the War Manpower Commission and the United States Employment Service, the Philadelphia district office of the War Relocation Authority has been able to work out an arrangement with the Lummus-Kellogg Corp. construction engineers, for the employment of 200 Nisei and Issei in general construction work, Relocation Program officer W. A. Heath announced this week.

## Dorothy Takechi Attends Meeting

Going to Los Angeles from the National Headquarters of the Y-WCA to work with that organization locally on a survey Dorothy Takechi, resident of this center, attended a meeting at Clifton's Cafeteria in Los Angeles recently at which the noted author, Carey McWilliams, was the speaker.

McWilliams pointed out that the methods of California race-baiters were identical with those used in Germany by the Nazis in the early days of Hitlerism.

"You can't confine race prejudice to one race," he stated. "This anti-Japanese agitation will spill over against the Negroes and the Jews if it isn't stopped now."

"People who should speak up have been intimidated but they should realize that the only sentiment of value is public sentiment and otherwise."

## JOSEPHS TO MAKE DELIVERIES HERE

Beginning July 12, Josephs grocery store in Lone Pine, Calif., will again make deliveries to Manzanar.

All orders must be in by Tuesday night and merchandise must be picked up at the Police Station at 2:30 p.m.

At the last east coast area conference, one of the recommendations made was that mass group employment and housing offers be developed of a type similar to that of Seabrook Farms has provided to be such a spur to relocation. Although this involves a different type of work, the offers are similar in that they include housing.

This firm offers 90 cents per hour on a 48 hour week basis, time and one half for over 40 hours. Average wage is approximately \$46.80 a week.

Two Nisei, Koshi Seko and Hiroshi Kayasuga, both of Manzanar, have been employed at the Lummus-Kellogg plant for two weeks.

The hiring is done through the AFL, Common Laborers Local, which has indicated acceptance of Issei and Nisei into the Union with full union rights and benefits.

The reception accorded them by the management, unions, and their fellow workers has been excellent, and as a result this mass offer was made. No PMGO clearance is required.

As this is a top priority construction job, the workers are eligible for public housing.

This construction job will last from six to nine months.

Interested residents should contact the Relocation Office, Building 1-4, immediately.

SEATTLE, Wash.— Staff Sgt. "Horizontal Hank" Goshō has just completed a series of public appearances and talks before a great many interested groups in the northwest area and those who heard him commented that he really "mowed 'em down."

Receiving a medical discharge two months ago because of malaria, Sgt. Goshō recuperated at the Fitzsimmons Hospital in Denver before joining his wife Jeanne and their fourteen months old daughter Carol Jeanne at Minidoka.

In Minidoka he received many invitations to talk to various groups and went on a tour of Portland, Hood River, Puyallup, Tacoma and Seattle.

In Portland he spoke to the 150 members of the City Club, a group of important civic leaders. He was allowed to talk only five minutes but in those few minutes he stole the show.

He made radio transmissions over radio stations KEW, KGW, and KOIN in Portland, and was the honored guest at the reception given for him by the Portland Press Club.

On Sunday, June 3, Sgt. Goshō drove up to Hood River with Clyde Linville of the Portland office, and reported that an American Legion man came up to him and said he wanted to apol-

ogize to him for the previous action taken by the Hood River American Legion. He said it was the action of a minority who "pushed the thing through" before the others realized what was going on.

## Purely Personal

On April 16, Life Magazine carried the story of the "Forgotten Front" in Italy. The article made no mention of the 442nd Combat Team whose spearhead attack aided in the final capitulation of the enemy.

The casualty list revealed in center papers was long. It was heartbreaking, for six boys I know were on the list.

In a moment of disappointment I wrote to the editors of Life:

"Can the story of the Italian campaign from Cassino to Rome be told without including the 100th Infantry Battalion? Or are we exaggerating their importance for the terribly simple reason that we know so many who won't be coming back?"

Answering for the editors, Miss Seawell replied:

"Thank you for your letter of April 17 in which you call Life's attention to the fact that no mention was made of Japanese American troops in our article 'Forgotten Front.'"

"At the time the April 16 issue went to press we were under the impression that these troops were already on rotation and therefore were not at the front. An Associated Press report came out later in the day giving details of their part in the action, which made us realize our error of omission.

"Certainly these Japanese American troops deserve the gratitude of all Americans for their part in bringing about victory in Europe."

Probably many of you know the story behind the expression "Kotonk" which the Hawaiian Nisei use in speaking of the mainlanders. We'd like to repeat it for those who haven't heard it. When the mainland boys and the island boys met in Camp Shelby, Miss., to train as the 442nd Combat Team, they had a great many disagreements. The islanders in ihaki usually won over the mainland boys when fists began to fly. And when the loser fell, the island boys tell us, his head hit the ground with a "kotonk". Thus the nickname struck to the G.I. soldier from the mainland. Now it is used to indicate any Nisei who is not from Hawaii.

The islanders like to call themselves "Butaheads," which translated literally means "pig-head." Both parties get along wonderfully well now, each respecting the other's personality.
