BARTLETT HEADS HOSPITAL AS DOCTOR LITTLE RESIGNS

Resignation of Dr. William M. Little from the Manzanar Hospital was received Thursday afternoon, said Project Director Ralph P. Merritt at the Town Hall meeting last Friday. Dr. Little, who has been Principal Medical Officer of the local hospital since October

TRAIN TO LEAVE ROHWER

First complete railroad train carrying evacuees back to California will leave the Rohwer center on July 26 with 425 passengers, according to a teletype received last week.

Secretary of the Interior Harold L. Ickes said the arrangement was in conformity with the Office of Defense Transportation regulations.

The teletype continued:

"In addition to a diner and two baggage cars, the train will include seven day coaches and one tourist sleeper, reserved for the use of the aged, infirm and sick. The all evacuee train is scheduled to reach California about July 31."

The train will accommodate 125 families from Rohwer, including nearly 100 children under 15 years of age. A few families are planning resettlement in the mountain states

ROBERT KENNEY SPEAKS IN FAVOR OF NISEI

CALIF.--Speaking before the Monterey Inter-Racial group recently, Attorney General Robert W. Kenney condemned minority groups in California which he called "the disturbing element" affecting the return of Japanese Americans to the state, the Merced, Calif., Sun-Star reports.

Kenney pleaded for public support of law enforcement officers and condemned some minority groups which he said are "masquerading under the pretense of flag-waving patriotism but actually are seeking financial benefits by keeping out of the state those who will work at low cost."

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AGRICULTURE SECRETARY
HITS SEATTLE BOYCOTT
ON JAPANESE PRODUCE

Declaring that the refusal of Seattle produce merchants to deal in produce grown by Japanese Americans is "unjustified and must be corrected", newly-appointed Secretary of Agriculture Clinton Anderson sent the following teletype to Northwest Produce Association Secretary Adwin of Seattle:

TELETYPE...
"This department is receiving numerous protests against refusal of Seattle produce farms to handle produce grown by Japanese Americans. In view of present food situation, we believe such discrimination cannot be justified and urge you cooperate in correcting situation. The department has sent copies of this wire to all its offices on the West Coast advising them that its action is to be regarded as a policy statement from the cabinet head pending settlement of the Seattle marketing difficulties. The War Relocation Authorities are aiding evacuee growers who have returned to the Seattle area to market their produce through other channels.

Those who did not register as alien enemies and secure certificates of identification because they were in internment camps during the period of registration in the early part of 1942, those who did not register and secure certificates of identification because of simple neglect or other reasons, those who registered but never received their certificates of identification, and those who once had certificates of identification but have lost them, are requested to see Campbell at once at 1-2-1.

MANZANAR MAN WORKS
AT MARYKNOLL HOME

Yasutaro Naido, Issai widower from the Manzanar Relocation Center is now back on the job as head gardener at the Maryknoll Home, 425 S. Boyle Ave. Los Angeles.

Naido, who left Manzanar in the middle of May, lives at the Maryknoll Home, which was formerly a residence for 50 Japanese children of all faiths, though the home is Catholic in management. Caucasian children are there now, and it is part of the Community Chest system. Next door is the International Institute.

Shigako Mary Naido, Yasutaro's daughter, has been a patient at the Manzanar Base Hospital. His two sons, Umaji and Toshio work in Chicago.

JAPANESE CIVILIANS DETAINED AT REDFORD

WASHINGTON, D.C.—About 132 Japanese civilians, captured in Germany, will be brought to the United States this month and detained at the Redford Springs Hostel at Bedford, Pa., until arrangement can be made for exchange, the State Department stated, according to the San Francisco Chronicle.

The group include diplomatic and consular officers and their dependents who were stationed in Germany when the Allies moved in.

MYER URGES IMMEDIATE LIQUIDATION OF CENTERS

The sooner the relocation centers "are liquidated and forgotten, the better it will be for everyone concerned," WRA Director Dillon S. Myer declares in his article which appears in the June edition of the New Republic.

"One of the more surprising aspects of the movement to date has been its geographic trend. Of the more than 10,000 people who have left the centers since the first of the year, nearly 7000 have chosen to resettle in states other than the three on the Pacific Coast where they used to live. I say this is surprising because we had expected that at least half of the evacuees moving out of the centers this spring would return to their former homes, I still believe, however, that the percentage of those returning to the coast will increase in the months ahead and that by the end of the year we may have 35,000 or more of the 110,000 original eva-

FEHR GIVES JAPANESE AMERICAN FRIENDS \$1500 TO EXPRESS THANKS

ST. LOUIS, Mo.—Thomas Fehr, an 81-year-old gold miner, traveled in a day coach from California to give his Japanese American friends \$1500 because he wanted to repay the kindness shown to him by them in the past, the Los Angeles Times stated last week.

Thomas Fehr stood during much of the trip and was taken to a hospital where he succumbed to a heart ailment. He lived with the Hara family for eight years in Los Angeles.

Mr. and Mrs. Yamoto Hara and their four daughters said they will open a rooming house with the money. They were sent to a relocation center in Arizona in 1942 and came here last June.

DENIAL OF NISEI RIGHTS UNFAIR, DECLARES FIELD

LOS ANGELES—At a press conference in Los Angeles, Marshall Field, famous philanthropist, industrialist and publisher, declared that it is unfair to deny persons of Japanese ancestry their right to return to the West coast.

"We have a definite obligation (toward Japanese Americans) because the army promised them they could return. It is so unfair to deny these people their right to return that I don't think it is American. Some groups of course, would like to keep them out for their own interest," Field said.

ATTORNEY BIDDLE GIVES STATISTICS ON PAROLEES

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Attorney General Francis Biddle announced this week that since the cessation of hostilities in Europe, the Department of Justice has paroled 20 Italian aliens who were in internment centers until VE Day; unconditionally released 197 remaining Italian aliens who were on parole and who have faithfully observed the conditions of their parole; classified 600 to 900 German residents in the United States to repatriate to Germany; and are reviewing for release on parole some 2299 German alien cases.
