SIGNED PERMITS NECESSARY FOR ALL VISITORS

Special permits signed by either Project Director Roy Nash or Assistant Director Ned Campbell are required of all non-Japanese persons entering or leaving the Manzanar Relocation Center, according to proclamation of Lt. Gen. J.L. DeWitt of the Western Defense Command and Fourth Army.

RECORD TO BE KEPT

Each permit must show the hour of entry and departure and the terms and conditions upon and the purpose for which it is granted. A complete record of all such permits will be kept and maintained at the center.

KITCHENS TO CLOSE

For general cleaning and repairing of the kitchens, beginning today with Kitchen 16 mess halls in numerical order will remain closed on consecutive days with the exception of Sundays.

On days that their kitchens are closed, people will eat in the two nearest mess halls.

RETURN ALL EMPTY POP BOTTLES

A camp-wide drive for empty pop bottles is being launched this week by the canteen as the serious mortgage of bottles is threatening the stoppage of all pop sales.

All residents are requested to collect empty bottles and turn them over to the leader of their respective block by Thurs-

day morning. Those residing in blocks without leaders are asked to leave the bottles by the men's latrines where they will be picked up by a truck.


