## EARL O'DAY SERVES AS NEW RELOCATION OFFICER

Paul G. Robertson, Southern California Area Supervisor of the WRA, recently announced the transfer of Earle O'Day, reports officer, to the new post of Special Relocation Officer.

Eddy Eckels of Los Angeles, advertising executive and press representative, was appointed Reports Officer.

O'Day will serve directly under Robertson in liaison work with organizations assisting return of evacuees to the nine counties comprising the area.

## MINNEAPOLIS WOMAN FIRES AT NISEI HOME

CHICAGO -- A 50-year-old Minneapolis woman fired a shotgun shell into the home of a Nisei soldier Technical Sergeant Kay Tagami, 25, 4153 38th Avenue South, Minneapolis, Chicago Area WRA Relocation Officer Pruconce Ross said.

Neither Kay, his wife nor son, Gerald, 1-year-old, was injured.

The Minneapolis Morning Tribune reports that the woman is being held for observation at the general hospital and neighbors said that she had been acting queerly.

## KIN OF SERVICEMEN ELIGIBLE FOR WAR HOUSING PROJECTS

Parents, wives and children of Nisei servicemen and Nisei veterans are now eligible to occupy certain public war housing projects on the same basis as immigrant war workers, the Washington Office of the War Relocation Authority announced.

This provision, applying to the distressed families of all servicemen and veterans, went into effect recently when President Truman signed an amendment to the Lanham Act. The Federal Public Housing Authority defines "distressed" as a family without housing because of eviction or inability to find housing which the family can afford.

In notifying centers and field offices of the new law, Ottis Peterson, acting relocation division chief, emphasized that turnover in public war housing projects is generally high, particularly now with the labor situation in a flexible state.

"This makes it more important than ever for eligible families to relocate and to file their applications for dwellings at the earliest possible date to take advantage of vacancies that occur as a result of turnover," he declared.

### JUSTICE DYE'S EXAMPLE

(Following editorial was taken from the Philadelphia Record, July 22, 1945.)

We salute Justice Milo Dye, of Walnut Grove, Calif.

He has sentenced a woman to 30 days in the Sacramento county jail for threatening a Japanese American soldier and his family.

The conviction, as Secretary of the Interior Ickes points out, is the first jail sentence imposed for threatening returned Japanese Americans.

Such action takes courage in some parts of the West Coast, as action against lynching takes courage in some parts of the South. No one has been jailed in 24 incidents of violence against Japanese Americans returned to California from relocation centers.

Hoodlumism against our fellow citizens, many of whom fought bravely in our army, must be stamped out. We Hope Justice Dye's example will be followed.

### HOSPITAL REVEALS NEW DENTAL CLINIC RULING

Due to the acute shortage of personnel and the limited amount of supplies, the Hospital Dental Clinic will not be able to accept any new patients requiring general fillings, treatments and extensive dental restorations, announced Dr. Agnes V. Bartlett, acting principal medical officer.

All such dental treatment already in process will be completed. The residents and appointed personnel are requested to come to the clinic only on conditions of acute necessity.

### VETERAN'S CLEAN CEMETERY

STOCKTON, Calif.—Approximately 28 discharged veterans of the South Pacific war, now students at the College of the Pacific, have voluntarily repaired the damaged Japanese cemetery in Stockton and have restored it to its original condition, the Washington, D.C. Post disclosed.

The Post stated that the veterans denounced what they termed the "hate campaign" against Japanese Americans, and quoted Veteran Bo McDonald of Los Angeles as saying, "I thought we were fighting against this sort of thing, not for it."

### CPL. RIYOJI TERADA RETURNS FROM EUROPE WITH 93 SERVICE POINTS

WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, ITALY—Cpl. Riyoji Terada of Terminal Island, Calif., son of Mrs. Masa Terada of 9-1-5, Manzanar, Calif., is returning to the United States from the Fifth Army in Italy with an adjusted service rating score of 93.

Cpl. Riyoji Terada is a medical aid man with the 442nd Japanese American Combat Team. He entered the service July 15, 1941, and went overseas in May, 1944. He wears the European Theater Ribbon, Silver Star, Purple Heart with Oak Leaf Cluster, Medical Badge and Good Conduct Medal.

Lanham Act permits distressed families of servicemen and veterans to live in all public war housing projects which are not specifically designated for the exclusive use of war workers for certain industries or installations or for military personnel of the army or navy. FEHA stated that the term "family" includes mothers and fathers as well as wives and children. There is no citizenship requirement for federal war housing projects.

Eligibility extends to honorably discharged veterans unable to find a residence because of the shortage. It also includes the families of deceased servicemen and veterans.

Lists of projects open to the families of army personnel and exservicemen will be forwarded to centers as soon as such lists are completed, the Relocation Division announced.

## CALIFORNIA EDITOR REPLIES TO SUBSCRIBER

From the editor of the San Luis Obispo, Calif., Telegram-Tribune comes this reply to a subscriber who resents the publication of a photo of a lisci soldier greeting his father, an Okinawa native:

"It is our feeling that any soldier who went through the Okinawa campaign, be his name Smith, Jones, O'Driscoll, Greenbaum or Higachi, is more than worthy of having his picture on the front page of any newspaper in the land. T/4 Higachi was good enough for the United States Army --good enough for combat service in one of the most perilous spots of the Pacific war. That makes him good enough for our front page."

## TWO CENTER PAPERS SUSPEND PUBLICATION

Due to declining population of the center and lack of personnel, two center papers announced that they have suspended publication in regular newspaper form.

The first to close was the Rohrer Outpost, which issued its last English paper on July 21. The Heart Mountain Sentinel discontinued publication on July 28.

The Outpost stated that the Japanese section will continue as before for the time being, and that the English section will combine with the Rohrer Relocator and appear as a weekly bulletin.

Residents of Heart Mountain will continue to receive official WRA information and other current developments in mimeographed form, it was announced.

## WRA PROVIDES CARS

### TO INDEPENDENCE TO OBTAIN LICENSES

Because so many people applied for transportation to Independence to obtain driver's licenses, conditions under which the WRA will provide such transportation have been limited, declared Walter A. Heath, relocation program officer.

WRA will continue to send a car to Independence on Monday afternoons for people who have no valid licenses, if they plan to drive a private car from the center upon relocating or for those who will have to operate a motor vehicle in a state outside of California when they relocate.

For the time being, private cars may continue to go to Independence to obtain driver's licenses if the Relocation Division is given a day's advance notice so that Army clearance and an escort may be provided.

Only people who do not have a valid license or whose license will expire within the next month should go to Independence. If too great a number of people go for driver's licenses in private cars, it may be necessary to limit these, Heath said.

## JAPANESE STILL BANNED FROM COAST WATERFRONTS

OAKLAND, Calif.--Japanese, whether U.S. citizens or not, are still banned from the Pacific Coast waterfronts, the Oakland Board of Port Commissioners was warned by Captain Paul E. Conk, in charge of waterfront activities for the Coast Guard, the Oakland Tribune reports.

## TRUMAN AUTHORIZES

### DEPORTATION OF ENEMIES

WASHINGTON, D.C.--A proclamation authorizing the attorney general to deport any enemy alien deemed "dangerous to the public peace and safety of the U.S." was issued recently by Harry S. Truman, the Washington Star announced.

The announcement stated that all enemy aliens who are interned or may be interned are subject to the deportation orders.

## TELL OF ICE SHORTAGE

Henry Haberle, supply officer, announced that delivery of ice to the administrative offices probably will not be made for from 60 to 90 days due to an acute shortage at the ice plant.

## KENNY ASKS PROTECTION OF JAPANESE AMERICANS

SAN FRANCISCO--Robert W. Konny, attorney general of California has written the law enforcement officers of the state calling upon them to see that returning Japanese-American people are given full protection. In his letter he quotes the text of a statement issued by the State Law Enforcement Advisory Committee after a special meeting called at the suggestion of Governor Earl Warren.

The statement follows:

"We consider it our sworn duty as law enforcement officers to fully cooperate with the Army authorities in dealing with the return of the Japanese residents of this state. All persons, regardless of race, are entitled to the full protection of the (Cont'd on page 4)

law. The Army has carefully investigated each person to be permitted to return and will not allow those who are potentially dangerous to return.

"There should be no difficulty involved in this transition unless incidents are provoked by intemperate words and thoughtlessness.

"During this period of adjustment the reputation of each of our California communities will be at stake. We have faith in the good judgment of the people of California. We confidently expect all citizens to join with us in furthering full respect of the individual rights involved."

LAND PROVES ACCIDENTAL

SAN JOSE—Two small grass fires occurred recently on the premises of Ryohitsu Shibuya, at his ranch home near Mountain View, the San Francisco WRA Office announced.

Investigation by a WRA representative confirmed the report of a constable that the fires were doubtless of accidental origin.

Each occurred along a fence and were probably the result of cigarettes tossed from passing cars. No damage was reported.

GAS STOVES NOW OFF

Gas cooking and heating stoves, which had been rationed since August 24, 1943, with only those holding certificates eligible to purchase them, went off the rationing system today in Inyo County, Bishop Ration Board Chairman H. A. Van Loon announced, according to the Inyo Independent.

The elimination of the rationing system was made possible due to a substantial increase in the production of gas cooking and heating stoves.

Oil-gas combinations, oil cooking and oil heating stoves and combination oil-gas stoves will be oil conversion burners for stoves.

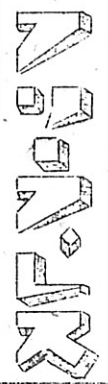

最後の通牒に答辯の價值なしと述べし鈴木首相は日本は長期戦の準備をなし飛行機工場は地下に移され増産されつゝ有る而して増産されつゝある飛行機は常陸防衛の大作戦に備へて蓄へられて居ると發表した。又同首相が記者團に向つて約した「来るべき市街戦」と云ふ演説は實現しなかつた。

東京放送は去る主曜日に期待された十一ヶ所の内六都市が空襲を蒙り、鈴木首相はボースマン最後通牒は單なるカイロ宣言の展開で有ると見てゐることを考慮し各地を飛行機生産のため全力を集中し敵の空海攻撃などの警備は軽く受け流して居り戦争の進行に對し政府の根本政策

は云ふた更だ地下工場は海岸にも連続して居り工場労働者の衛生上に考慮したため能率も中々好んだ。

首相の答辯は大體賛賞長南大將の英水支よりの最後の通牒と罵倒した後であり他の輿論はボースマン宣言は聯合國の戦に疲勞し沈滞せる民心の鼓舞と爲るの宣傳と見てゐる。

首相は食料の一刻を削減せし事に對し長期戦の準備をせむに於て將來の食料供給は敵と此れ結局は平寧に復帰すべしと説いた。

更に三倍の爆弾を積載するから、斯る事業は空軍指揮官の放逐に依り發表せられた。大爆撃機と輕便な戦闘機で海軍の母艦隊と除きて濟せらるゝであらう。
