There are numerous job opportunities for both Issei and Nisei in the Central Ohio District according to an announcement from the Ohio WRA office, Relocation Program Officer, Walter A. Heath announced.

These jobs are;

AUTO MECHANIC—Unlimited number wanted but must be skilled and have tools. Wages are 85 cents to one dollar hourly and the earnings average \$60 to \$90 weekly with non-union. Columbus.

BAKERY WORKERS—Openings for male and female in a nationally known firm in maintenance, ovenwork, loading and packing departments. The wage is 60 cents per hour with automatic raises. Columbus.

CLERKS — Filing clerks wanted with pay of \$90 to \$100 monthly. Part-time student workers at university at 85 cents per hour. Columbus.

FARM ESTATES — Issei or Nisei couple wanted. Woman to assist in housework; man for raising vegetables, fruit and berries on 7 acres of land. The wage

WORKERS NOW NEEDED IN DENVER DISTRICT

Denver Chamber of Commerce is in urgent need of workers in the movement of vegetables from Colorado to out-of-state markets. Men are also needed in vegetable sheds, ice servicing and ice warehouses.

WRA office also announced that other jobs are available in Denver:

Dehydrating plants need 250 workers, the vegetables packing sheds need 500 workers, lumbering need 350 workers, sheet metal need 50 workers, foundry wants 200 workers.

Housing is the most difficult problem in Denver. The head of the family should go to Denver first and locate the house for the family.

HEATH ASKS RESERVATION BE MADE BEFOREHAND

Those who go to Los Angeles and expect to live at the hostel should have a reservation made before hand, Relocation Program Officer Walter A. Heath disclosed. He said that he will assist in making the reservations.

"Those who will use the hostel, or who will want to purchase food should take a food ration book with them," he said.

Henry Yamaguchi Gets
Favorable Impression
Toward Philadelphia

Henry Yamaguchi, one-
time block manager of
block 11 and interviewer
in the Relocation Office,
reports favorable impres-
sions of Philadelphia and
Cleveland. He recently
relocated from Manzanar.

Yamaguchi reports Phila-
delphia as being a friendly
and religious town where
no signs of discrimination
are shown. He inspected a
toy factory and a meter
factory in Philadelphia
where jobs are offered to
Issei, and is particularly
impressed with possibili-
ties at the toy factory.

Housing, says Yamaguchi,
is probably easier to find
in Philadelphia than in
other eastern states, al-
though wage rates are not
quite as high there.

The former Manzanite has
finally settled in Cleve-
land where possibilities
in the dry-cleaning field
seemed to be superior. He
says that in Cleveland
there are all kinds of
jobs to choose from, and
that he has gone to work
in a place where several
Nisei are employed, and
that his treatment is ex-
cellent. He says he be-
lieves public sentiment
towards Japanese to be as
good in Cleveland as it is
in Philadelphia.

His report came in a

half years including, Paul
Nakamoto, Mr. and Mrs. Ta-
keoka and family and Dor-
othy Inaba, all formerly
from Manzanar.

Before finding their home, the family stayed at the temporary Buffalo Hostel, located at 39 St. John's Place, Buffalo, New York.

The children of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Fukuda, Milton, 17; Robert, 14; and Lorraine, 10; are happy in their new schools.

The temporary hostel is a five-room furnished apartment with facilities available for cooking. The charge for a family is \$10 a week; a married man who is waiting for his family to join him may arrange to stay at the hostel for \$5 a week.

RECEIVE PAMPHLET ON PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Published by the Pittsburgh Pa., Board of Public Education, a new pamphlet, entitled "Your Public Schools--in War and In Peace" has just been received by the Relocation Office, Building 1-4, announced Relocation Program Officer Walter A. Heath.

A Caucasian friend loaned them the money to take over the shop lease. They say "Business is good; all our old customers come back, including Caucasians; everyone comes in and says 'hello!'".

SHIMASAKI FAMILY BUYS 28-ACRE FARM NEAR MADISON, WISCONSIN

MADISON, Wis.—The first purchase of rural property in Wisconsin by resettlers, the Utaro Shimasaki family of Auburn, Washington, and Hoert Mountain, recently acquired a 28-acre farm on the outskirts of Madison.

The purchase was made by William Shimasaki, Nisei-employee of the Department of Interior's local Geological Survey office, but it could have been made as well by his father, as Wisconsin has no alien land laws.

"I believe we could have purchased more advantageously, from a financial standpoint, farther out in the country," the older Shimasaki said, "but we felt it was more important to be near the University of Wisconsin and the Madison schools."

Besides William, Mr. and Mrs. Shimasaki have five other children: Lillian, who is working part-time and attending college in Chicago; Mary, employed in a Chicago dress shop; and Annie, Gladys, and Dorothy. The senior Shimasaki, who is already at the farm, expects the other members of his family to join him in the near future.
