

## HOSTEL OPENS IN FRESNO

Formal opening of the Fresno Buddhist Church Hostel was reveal id by tho Rev. Z, Fujinaga, supervisor of the hostel, end is nov ready` to accommodate about 100 returnees, announced Walter A. Heath, relocation program officer.

The hostel is located at 1340 Kern Street, four blocks west of the Southcon Pacific Railroad statimon.

Rates for room and board que \$l per day for the dirst 10 days, $\$ 1.50$ per day after ten days or on being employed, and childron under ton arc only charged half price. Thc rate for rooms only is 25 cents per day per person; for a family of fire membors or less, the rate is $\$ 25$ for the first month and - $\$ 30$ for the second month. For a family of six or more members, room rates are $\$ 30$ for the first month and $\$ 35$ for the second.

Light, gas, and water are furnished. Cooking may be done in the basemont kitchen. Meals will bc served at 7:15 acme, 12 noon, and 6 pom.

All work at the hostel will be done cooperatively, ana everyone will be expectod to contribute his share of duties for the upkeep of the hostel.

She relocated to Chicago two years ago with her sister, Alice, and has been engaged in assisting resettlers with the auspices of Brethern church since that time. Her parents who formerly resided at 15-3-1 in lianzanan are joining their two daughters in Chicago on indefinite leave.

ROME-The 442nd Infantry Regiment, composed of Americans of Japanese descent, whill become part of the strategic reserves when 1t returns to the Undted states, army headquarters announced, according to an Assoclated Press ds spatch.
