HOSTEL OPENS IN FRESNO

Formal opening of the Fresno Buddhist Church Hostel was revealed by the Rev. K. Fujinaga, supervisor of the hostel, and is now ready to accommodate about 100 returnees, announced Walter A. Heath, relocation program officer.

The hostel is located at 1340 Kern Street, four blocks west of the Southern Pacific Railroad station.

Rates for room and board are \$1 per day for the first 10 days, \$1.50 per day after ten days or on being employed, and children under ten are only charged half price. The rate for rooms only is 25 cents per day per person; for a family of five members or less, the rate is \$25 for the first month and \$30 for the second month. For a family of six or more members, room rates are \$30 for the first month and \$35 for the second.

Light, gas, and water are furnished. Cooking may be done in the basement kitchen. Meals will be served at 7:15 a.m., 12 noon, and 6 p.m.

All work at the hostel will be done cooperatively, and everyone will be expected to contribute his share of duties for the upkeep of the hostel.

60 LEGAL AID SOCIETIES AID JAPANESE AMERICANS

More than 60 Legal Aid Societies throughout the country will cooperate with WRA in assisting Americans of Japanese ancestry who are unable to employ the services of a lawyer, the National Association of Legal Aid Organization announced in a statement unanimously adopted at a recent meeting of its Executive Committee.

Member organizations have been advised of the resolution and encouraged to offer their services accordingly, the statement declares. Services of some non-member cooperating groups also will be made available to evacuees.

The service of these voluntary organizations cover both advice and representation in court for all types of civil matters. Some organizations also

handle criminal matters. Among the more common problems requiring legal aid handled by Legal Aid Societies are: installment contracts, wage claims, landlord and tenant relationships, recovery of personal property, small loans, family relations and workmen's compensation.

Persons able to pay are not accepted as clients of Legal Aid Societies, but will be referred to capable and honest attorneys who will charge a fair fee, or a reduced fee if necessary.

Some representative cities in which members of the National Association of Legal Aid Organizations are located as follows: Buffalo, New York; Denver, New Haven, Washington, Miami, Atlanta, Chicago, Indianapolis, New Orleans, Baltimore, Boston, Cleveland, Tulsa, Philadelphia, Providence, Dallas, Salt Lake City, Milwaukee, Detroit, Minneapolis, Kansas City and Cincinnati.

Relocation officers have been instructed to maintain contact with the Legal Aid Society in each area, to develop sound relationships which will be beneficial to evacuees.

655 RESIDENTS RELOCATE FROM MINIDOKA IN JUNE

During the month of June, 655 residents of the Minidoka Center in Hunt, Ida., relocated, according to word received from Minidoka Community Council Chairman Iwao Oyama.

Of this, 201 resettled to Washington, 114 to Oregon, 104 to California and 330 to other points.

The total population of that center as of June 30 was 4943.

She relocated to Chicago two years ago with her sister, Alice, and has been engaged in assisting resettlers with the auspices of Brethren church since that time. Her parents who formerly resided at 15-3-1 in Manzanar are joining their two daughters in Chicago on indefinite leave.

ROME--The 442nd Infantry Regiment, composed of Americans of Japanese descent, will become part of the strategic reserves when it returns to the United States, army headquarters announced, according to an Associated Press dispatch.

The dispatch declared that the announcement was made to correct a previous report that the 442nd--which will be one of the last American units to leave the Mediterranean theatre--would become part of the tactical reserve for the Pacific war. The tactical reserve is held in close support for combat duty.

The 442nd Infantry Regiment fought with distinction in Italy and France.

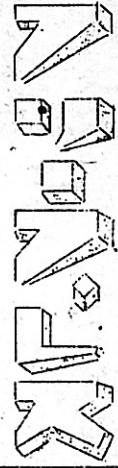
