DR. NAGAMOTO HOLDS PARTY IN NEW HOSTEL

CHICAGO Dr. George Nagamoto, director of the Kansas City Hostel and instructor at the University of Kansas City School of Dentistry, entertained at the newly-opened hostel in honor of dental college graduates and their friends last Saturday.

Some 33 persons, including some evacuoe students, attended the party.

The hostel is located at 1340 Kern Street, four blocks west of the Southern Pacific Railroad sta-

Rates for room and board are \$1 per day for the dirst 10 days, \$1.50 per day after ten days or on being employed, and children under ten are only. charged half price. The rate for rooms only is 25 cents per day per person; for a family of fire members or less, the rate is \$25 for the first month and \$30 for the second month. For a family of six or more members, room are \$30 for the first month and \$35 for the second.

Light, gas, and water are furnished. Cooking may be done in the basement kitchen. Meals will be served at 7:15 a.m., 12 noon, and 6 p.m.

All work at the hostel will be done cooperatively, and everyone will be expected to contribute his share of duties for the upkeep of the hostel.

60 LEGAL AID SOCIETIES AID JAPANESE AMERICANS

More than 60 Legal Aid Societies throughout the will country cooperate with WRA in assisting Americans of Japanese ancestry who are unable to employ the services of a lawyer, the National Association of Logal Aid Organization announced in a statement unanimously adopted at a recent meeting of its Executive Committee.

Member organizations have been advised of the resolution and encouraged to offer their services accordingly, the statement declares. Services of some non-member cooperating groups also will be made available to evacues.

The service of these voluntary organizations cover both advice and representation in court for all types of civil matters. Some organizations also

655 RESIDENTS RELOCATE FROM MINIDOKA IN JUNE

During the month of June, 655 residents of the Minidoka Center in Hunt, Ida., relocated, according to word received from Minidoka Community Council Chairman Iwao Oyama.

Of this, 201 resettled to Washington, 114 to Oregon, ten to California and 330 to other points.

She relocated to Chicago two years ago with her sister, Alice, and has been engaged in assisting resettlers with the auspices of Brethern church since that time. Her parents who formerly resided at 15-3-1 in Manzanan are joining their two daughters in Chicago on indefinite leave.

ROME--The 442nd Infantry Regiment, composed of Americans of Japanese descent, will become part of the strategic reserves when it returns to the United States, army head-quarters announced, according to an Associated Press dispatch.

The dispatch declared that the announcement was made to correct a previous report that the 442nd--which will be one of the last American units to leave the Mediterranean theatre-would become part of the tactical reserve for the Pacific war. The tactical reserve is held in close support for combat duty.

The 442nd Infantry Regiment fought with distinction in Italy and France.
