What's the attitude of union labor in California?
That's a broad question and cannot be answered in a fer words. `However, the firm stand taken by the CIO Iongshoreman's Union in the so-called "Stockton incident" in insisting on strict compliance with the nowdiscrimination -duetto-race-color-or-creed provision of the Mitscellaneous Employees Union 110, AFL in San Francisco. Rated as one of the most progressive unions in the citf, already many Issei and Nisei have secured employment as dishwashers and bus-bo s , tinrougn the aid of the latter.

## HiVANO'S TOFU FAGTORY OPENS IN MINNEAPOLIS

MNNEAPOLI S- -Mr . and Mrs . Toraji Tom Hayano, formerly of $20-14-E$, Heart Mountain Relocation Genter, have purchased a home at 2735 Colface South in Minneapolis, zhere they will establisin tine bisiness of manufacturing tofu for the three jajanese restaurants in íninneapolis, as well as for resettlers here, the Chieago TRA office announced.

The secretary of the union is of Chinese ancestry. Complete absence of racial prejudice is one of the cardinal principles of 110. Proof? \#enry T, , a Nisei from Topaz, was roferred to Solari's Grill, one of $\mathrm{S}_{3} \mathrm{n}$ Francisco's leading cafes, by 110 . There he went to work, on a friendly basis, with nine Chinese dishmashers: This union is credited in achieving, in large part, a self respecting and decent wage and standard of living for a group formerly grossly under aid.
The union recently an-" nounced they could absorb 40 to 50 evacuees within the next fev veaks. Minimum pay is 90 cents per hour plus meals. All evacuees lino apply are referred directly to the union niring hail, and from there to the specific jobs.
