Mrs. Eda Kakoi and her two daughters Alice and Lily arrived in Yellow Springs, while Jitsuo Nakahama and family arrived at the Family Hostel.

ISSEI, NISEI WORK ON SHEEP RANCH IN COZAD

COZAD, Neb. -- Approximately 48 Issei and Nisei workers are on the payroll of the huge sheep ranch at Cozad. Fifty Issei families are needed as soon as housing can be provided.

WRA OFFICE WORKERS MEET WITH RESETTLERS

CINCINNATI, Ohio -- Tom Sashihara and Everett Dakan of the Cleveland WRA office are in Cincinnati meeting with resettlers who are interested in small business.

Sashihara and Dakan are making a survey of business opportunities, contacting governmental agencies on rationing, supplies, and transportation. They are also gathering information from the city on the licensing of various types of business. Brokers and real estate agents are being contacted to get an idea of the types of businesses that are available and the price. They are gathering this information for the guidance of prospective resettlers interested in establishing themselves in a small business.

CATHOLIC CHARITIES OFFER HOUSING, WORK FOR SIX FAMILY UNITS

CINCINNATI, Ohio—The head of the Catholic Charities in Cincinnati, has offered housing accommodations and employment for six family units, with or without children; and 15 single men; and eight single girls and women.

The Catholic Charities have a well-equipped and well-trained staff to counsel and assist evacuees in relocating in Cincinnati and vicinity.

PITTSBURGH HOSTEL OPEN TO RESETTLERS

PITTSBURGH, Pa.—Pittsburgh's family hostel is now open to resettlers as originally planned. This large building with spacious dining rooms and living rooms as well as family accommodations for a number of families, sets in the center of a five-acre plot of ground just on the edge of one of Pittsburgh's finest parks.

NISEI ELIGIBLE FOR HOUSING PROJECT HOME

CINCINNATI, Ohio—The executive officer of the Metropolitan Housing Agency has informed the WRA office that Nisei couples with or without children are eligible to file an application with the War Housing Authority for a dwelling unit in the housing projects if they have lived in Cincinnati for one year.

JOBS OPEN IN CHICAGO CANNING ESTABLISHMENT FOR ISSEI AND NISEI

CHICAGO—A group of Nisei approached a large canning establishment in Chicago for jobs for Issei and Nisei. As a result, there will be an opportunity within a few weeks for a number of relocatees to obtain full time and permanent positions with this company.

The average salary for girls will be around \$38 a week, depending on the individual's ability. The men will be paid a little more.

A test group of ten Japanese American workers will determine how soon many jobs will be available to relocatees.

WPA is searching the neighborhood of the plant for housing.

RED CROSS GIVES AID TO EVACUEE FAMILIES

CHICAGO—According to W. W. Lessing, Chicago district office, some 45 evacuee families in Chicago have been referred for financial aid to the Red Cross.

Since a delay usually of three months often occurs between the time application is made for a soldier's dependency allotment and the actual check is received, families greatly in need have been able to obtain supplemental aid through the Red Cross.

In order to obtain Red Cross funds, a family must meet the Red Cross' standards of actual need. Not all evacuee referrals have been able to qualify for this emergency assistance, so families having had other resources, according to Lessing.

ROHWER RESETTLERS ARRIVE IN LOS ANGELES

LOS ANGELES—After a tedious trip, 96 out of 417 who embarked at Rohwer, reached the end of the line at Los Angeles 8 a.m. Tuesday, July 31, the others having left the train at points enroute for northern California and elsewhere. Reporters from the daily press were generous in their write-ups, and also the papers carried photos of groups going through the depot. The throngs passing through the station gave hardly a second glance to the returnees.

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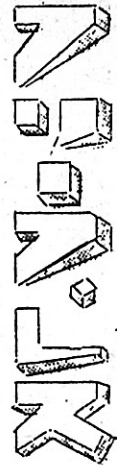
