TWENTY-THREE FARM JOBS AVAILABLE IN EAST

Twenty three farm offers with housing for 10 couples and 19 larger families are on file at the Philadel-phia WRA Office.

Twelve of the farms are vegetable or partly vegtable farms. The others are general, poultry, dairy, fruit, or combinations of these. Five of the offers have sharecropping possibilities.

DISCRIMINATION AGAINST NISEI 'OUTRAGEOUS'

ROME En route from Berlin to confer with Field Marshall Sir Harold R.L.G. Alexander, the Allies' commander here, and other Mediterranean theatre leaders about the cocclusion of the military structure in this theatre, Assistant Secretary of War John J. McCloy said discrimination against Japanese Americans veterans in Spokane anywhere also is "outrageous" and the War Department will do everything in its power to combat it, according to the New York Times.

He stated that the discrimination seemed localized and blamed "hoodlums." and "vigilente" elements.

The Assistant Secretary of War "unstintingly praisod the 442nd Japanese American Infantry Regiment, "notably the old 100th Battalion, which has had one of the finest combat records in the Italian and Southern French campaigna" the New York Times added.
