

## Meet to discuss Charter, election COMMISSION TO MEET DELEGATES

Discussion of the Manzanar Charter and preparation for the election to take place Monday, Nov. 9, will be aired in a joint meeting between Block Managers and Block representatives with the Commission on Self-Government this afternoon, 1:30 p.m. at Mess Hall 1.

Each Block Manager has been notified to be accompanied by five representatives to be chosen from his block for the purpose of participating in the discussions, it was stated.

Sho Onodera, Chairman of the Education Committee of the Commission on Self-Government, is to preside. Japanese translation of the Charter will be distributed. Translation work was done under the supervision of a committee composed of Choyei Kondo, Rev. Shingo Nagatomi, Walter Watanabe and Jack Iwata.

## OVERAGE AND PROFIT NOT SAME

To avoid misinterpretation the word "overage" as used by the Manzanar Cooperative in its statements to the members was explained by a member of the Board of Directors.

The word was coined by cooperative business to avoid confusion with the popular term "profit" since in the exact phraseology cooperatives are essentially non-profit organizations and what is popularly considered as profits are in co-ops better indicated as "overage" or "savings."

### DENOTES DIFFERENCE

Overage, in other words, denotes the differential between the cost of the product plus the operating expenses involved in the transaction and the sale price of the product usually sold at the minimum price exacted by state regulations.

A simple example to illustrate the point was given by a hypothetical sale of a can of peaches. If the cost of the can was 20 cents and the selling price was 30 the natural difference, or profit, would be 10 cents minus the handling costs. Assuming that running expenses on that item ran to 2 cents and also assuming that the company had 4 members, the profit that each member would receive would be 2 cents.

### IN NON-PROFIT CO-OP

Now, in a non-profit cooperative store, there would be no profit for all overages are returned to members as patronage refunds. In this case the purchaser would receive 8 cents patronage dividend return to make the ultimate price of his peaches 22 cents. Those members who did not purchase any items would not have returns since there is no patronage, but each one may be able to purchase any items at cost plus operating expenses. In this way, the price placed on the

## Nineteen kitchens paid to date

The first part of the payroll arrived from Los Angeles, Wednesday afternoon with the remainder coming on Thursday. Recreation and Education departments were paid following the payment of all mess hall workers.

## ALL-CLEAR SIGN IN SOUTHLAND

The "all-clear" signal rang Wednesday in southern California as the last 500 Japanese departed from Santa Anita Assembly Center, leaving less than 100 Japanese, patients of the General Hospital and tuberculosis sanitariums.

Following the first group which left on Mar. 21, altogether 110,599 Japanese were removed from "strategic" areas under military proclamation. Pioneers in the evacuation picture was the group coming to Manzanar.

## Co-op renders Cashing service

## OPENING OF SHOE SHOP DUE

Establishment of a check-cashing service by the Cooperative Enterprises was announced by the Board of Directors following a meeting held Tuesday evening at the Town Hall. Ironing room in Block 10 was selected for this purpose.

The decision was reached after the WRA disclosed that there was no provision made for the cashing of pay checks, which is to be the mode of payments for workers beginning with the September pay. The Board felt that the best possible solution, and at the same time the most convenient for the residents, would be to establish a separate cashier service, which would prevent a disruption in the normal Canteen and Department store business.

### SHOE REPAIR SHOP
