Manzanar will join the nation in remembering the dead and their loved war ones next week as center residents will participate in the Poppy Day sale Monday and Tuesday, May 26, 27. This campaign is conducted annually by the American Legion and V.F.W: to raise funds for widows, and orphans of men who gave their lives in earlier wars.

Girl and Boy Scouts will handle individual sales for the local drive, which is being sponsored by the center administration, block leaders and Commodore Perry post representatives. Kengo Ki-yohiro is general chairman.
