EVACUEE SALES INVESTIGATED

Because forced sele was imposed on a great many evacuees prion to doparture to assembly conters, L. A. District Attorney John Dockwoiler and State Attorney Grann Earl Warren revealed that investigations are under way of person suspected of defrauding Japanese.

Dockweiler told L.A.County Supervisors that a thorough investigation of various transactions was under way in which mercantile enterprises and farm properties charged hands as Japanese were compelled to evacuate. Prosecutions will follow immediately, he said, in all cases where criminal or civil offenses are involved.


