BOARD NAMED TO HEAR ALIENS

Frank E. Holman and J. Speed Smith, Seattle attorneys, and Leslie A. Stone, vice president of the Orting State Bank at Orting, were appointed this afternoon by the United States attorney-general as members of Seattle's enemy-alien hearing board.

The board will conduct hearings for the 150 enemy aliens being detained here and make recommendations to the attorney-general as to whether they should be interned.

United States Attorney J. Charles Dennis, who was informed of the appointments by telegram, said the board probably will begin its hearings shortly after Christmas in the grand jury room of the United States Courthouse. Evidence at the hearings will be presented by agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation and Dennis' chief assistant, Gerald Shucklin.

Stone was named chairman of the board.

F. B. I. TO PROBE JAP BIRTH DATA

Names of a number of Japanese who have obtained birth certificates under suspicious circumstances were ordered sent to the Federal Bureau of Investigation today by City Health Commissioner Frank M. Carroll.

Dr. Carroll said he took the action after it was learned a Japanese yesterday obtained another man's certificate without the oth-

er's knowledge or consent.

Nearly 900 Japanese have applied for birth certificates since the opening of hostilities between the United States and Japan December

7, Dr. Carroll said.

"My staff has instructions to list the names of persons they believe to be suspicious," Dr. Carroll said. "We have no means of investigating these persons. We are turning the names over to the F. B. I. for hatever use they can make of mem."

Dr. Carroll said about 500 persons with German and Italian names also have applied for birth certificates since the Japanese began hostilities.
