### GILA TO OPEN OWN VEGETABLE PACKING SHED

Approval by the administration of the construction of a packing shed was announced by Carl Kawagoye, packing house chief foreman. The Brown Construct-Co. have contracted for the job, and the building is expected to be completed in two months.

Since the price of any commodity is determined by supply and demand, residents are urged to increase their farm production, thereby lowering vegetable prices. This resultant minimizing vegetable expenditures will automatically crease the alloted budget for other type of food.

### Harvest Peak Around Bend

Vegetables estimated at \$1300 have been sold to date to the mess halls from the center farms. Crops under harvest at present include red and white radishes, and summer and Italian squash.

Field 69 under Foreman Johnny Oshige is rapidly rounding into full . time harvest peak. George Nagamatsu's field 48 presented a trial package of white radishes to the camp last week and is expected to enter the production line soon.

### Ranch Employment Urged

The greatest problem that we residents of relocation centers face is that of food. We know the problem of food is too acute outside of these centers to expect any help from outer sources. The solution, we know, must be met by us.

Technically we Gila residents have not a worry inthe world. We have acres of fertile soil; we have

'adequate climate; we have available manpower.

The problem, however, is this. The available manpower that we have is not being harnessed towards the production of food. That is why when the agricultural productions project calls for 2,000 acres of vegetables, we have only 500; that is why when 1,200 workers are needed on farms, we have only 450.

Gila residents, you have a responsibility to perform -- a responsibility that is, in the words of Project Director Fryer, "as important to the national war effort as any defense industry." This is the only center climatically suited for an all-year-round production of food. Minidoka, Manzanar, Poston, Tule, and all the other centers are relying upon us for win-

tor crops. We must meet their demands.

The age old theory of "Let the other fellow do it" must be forgotten. The problem is too acute. You who are physically fit--you who are not responsibly employed owe it to the community and to your fellow evacuees to allay the critical farm labor shortage. Application of this policy applies to both men and women. departments which require

Please report to the employment office and take your place with others in this program of human subsistence. The community needs you now.


