Coop Licence Rejected;WRA Seeks Reversal

Rejection of the application of the Gila River Co-operative Enterprises for a license to do business in Arizona on Satur-day, June 5, by the Arizo-Corporation Commission immediately set the Project machinery into operation to counter the move.

In the mos time the Project office. as busy. Project Direct L. H. Bennott said ho and his staff were doing every-Cooperative to carry on as planned. He hoped that the hitch would be straightened out within the ten days.

The Corporation Commission cancelled the filing of the application on the grounds that the Cooperative, which filed as a non - profit corporation, does not comply with Arizona's laws governing nonprofit corporations that its 7,879 members would benefit through sayings in the services it was organized to render.

Bennett refuted the contention of the Commission, declaring that the Co-operative, which is organized under the laws of t h e District of Colum bia, is a non-profit organization. He said that the Articles of Corporation had been approved by the Arizona Attorney Gen-

PHOENICIANS SAY HELLO

Efforts of the Butte high school journalism class came in to the NEWS-CORIER: feature stories on a recent one-day sojourn in Phoenix.

A generally healthy attitude is reflected in most of the papers, though one soid, "Camp during the year had become home! I was glad that I was going home." The same writer also stated, "What I had been hearing must have been some politicians dream. We were not treated as "Those Japs" but as Americans who saluted the same flag, spoke the same language, and were brought up in the same American tradition."

This latter idea was a source of surprise, pleasure, and comment by all of the young journalists. Wrote an analytic fellow, "as a whole they are willing to accept the evacuees. They are friendly." An observation by another is recorded thus: "Some even say "hello" as they pass."

Only one unpleasant incident was noted. The Owl Drug store refused to trade with two students. (The new state law was probably incorrectly interpreted by the store).

Significant is the evidence of tolerance found in Phoenix contrary to the unfriendliness of the newspapers and some frequently quoted politicians. This feeling that the people of Arizona are not as unfriendly as some would have us believe, has been the principal observation of most visitors.


WRITE TO HOME FRIENDS

It is important for the evacuees to keep in touch with their Caucasian friends and ecquaintances in order that they do not lose faith in the evacuee..."

"Your editorial of last Friday on the Japanese-American Situation was very heartening. You stand to lose circulation by it; but you no doubt have the thrill of living dangerous-

"When one organization after another -- Native Sons, American Legion, Chamber of Commerce, Farm Bureau. all take the same action asking that their former neighbors be retained behind barbed wire and armed guard--even women, children, high school students -citizens : o f the ; United States, guaranteed liberty end justice by our Constitution, it appears to me that honest and patriotic people, are being stamped-ed. They think that this action is patriotic, but I wonder whether they are not falling for something. This would be hard to prove, or even to discover, since those that started it would be under cover and by now far in the background. But the fact background. But the fact that this is the very thing which Hitler boasted he would do--destroy us from within by setting one group against another. leads me. to suspect that fifth-columnists are pulling the strings.

"Mn Hitler decrys democracy, and says it is breaking down in America, its most shining example; and if we continue this injustice to our fellowcitizens, he can point to it as proof of his assertion.

"On board ship in time of storm, members of the crew who have been locked up are released, for the help of every member is needed. Our country is now like a ship in storm; we need the help of every member of the crew, of every loyal citizen, for this war can only be won by a united people."

"I am one of the lucky 2,800 contingent of Hawaii volunteers of Japanese ancestry stationed here in Camp Shelby for combat Prior to our training. departuro t o Schofield Barracks, from the island of Kauai, we were all given sweaters by the Hawaii chapter, American Red Cross. I was surprised to receive one from the Gila chapter.

There was another incident that touched me deep-While confined to the post hospital for a few days, I asked the ward attendant to purchase me some toilet articles and other small items. H e back with them and eame when I offered to pay him, readily replied it was with the compliments of the Red Cross.

It had to take such minincidents to awaken me and make me realize the value of the Red Cross.

So, in closing, I hope small contributions will also go to make someone else happy."
